RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Authorize the issuance and sale of Revenue Bonds, Series 2001, in an

amount not to exceed \$23,000,000, by Nebraska Utility Corporation (NUCorp) at a public sale or a negotiated sale and at rates as determined by its Board of Directors, and 2) authorize the execution of an Energy & Utility Service Agreement by the Vice President for Business and

Finance or his designee.

PREVIOUS ACTION: June 23, 2001 – The Board authorized short-term borrowing not to

exceed \$18,000,000 by NUCorp in the manner deemed most

advantageous by the Board of NUCorp and authorized the expenditure

by NUCorp of up to \$18,000,000 for utility related projects, capitalization of the corporation, capitalized interest, and working

capital.

April 15, 2001 – The Board approved the Interlocal Agreement, Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws of the Nebraska Utility Corporation.

In the June 23, 2001 meeting, the Board of Regents approved a short-

term borrowing by NUCorp with the understanding that any issuance of

bonds would come back to the Board for its approval.

Since that time, interest rates relating to long-term borrowing have decreased and have become very attractive when compared to historical long-term rates. Accordingly, the NUCorp Board of Directors seeks to take advantage of those rates by issuing revenue bonds. The difference between the \$18,000,000 previously approved and the \$23,000,000 sought under this action primarily relates to bond reserve funds and issuance costs required as a normal part of any financing and capitalized interest.

The security for the bonds will be the revenue stream provided to NUCorp through the attached Energy & Utility Service Agreement. In executing the Energy & Utility Service Agreement, the Board covenants that it will make energy payments to NUCorp versus payments formerly made to external energy suppliers. The energy payments are roughly equivalent to those currently paid by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

PREVIOUS ACTION:	None.
EXPLANATION:	UNeMed Corporation was formed in 1991 as a Nebraska for-profit corporation to assist the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) in the development and commercialization of biomedical technology invented or discovered at UNMC. All of its common stock is owned by the Board of Regents in the name of UNMC.
	Approval of this agenda item will authorize the University administration to transfer the common stock of UNeMed from the University of Nebraska to the Nebraska Technology Development Corporation (NTDC) or any successor corporation thereof.
	NTDC is a nonprofit corporation governed by a board of directors appointed by the President. It coordinates University technology transfer operations on a University wide basis, and acts as a holding company for the technology transfer enterprises serving the University's campuses. It is currently being reorganized as a new corporate entity for the purpose of obtaining qualification as an IRC § 501(c)(3) tax exempt nonprofit corporation. Thus, this agenda item also authorizes transfer of UneMed stock to the successor corporation of NTDC.

It is proposed that the Board adopt a policy that allows the Corporation Secretary to set a records retention schedule in accordance with applicable law. Attached is a copy of the records retention plan and schedule that would be initiated with approval of the Regents' Policies below.

	RP-1.7.1 Custodian of Records The Corporation Secretary shall serve as the custodian of the records of the Board and all documentary files thereof. The Corporation Secretary shall be responsible for disposition and/or preservation of records of the Board.
	RP-1.7.2 Disposition and/or Preservation of Records Records shall be disposed of and/or preserved as set forth in a records retention schedule approved by the Corporation Secretary in accordance with applicable law.

## UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA BOARD OF REGENTS' RECORDS RETENTION PLAN

#### **Purpose**

The University of Nebraska serves the citizens of the state and has a responsibility to preserve the history of the university for future generations. The goals of this records retention plan are:

- 1) to identify documents related to the Board of Regents that must be retained permanently or temporarily due to federal or state legal requirements or for valid administrative reasons;
- 2) to provide guidance and clarification on which documents have lasting archival value to the people of the state and should be preserved in the University Archives; and
- 3) to provide for the routine and timely disposal of documents which need not be retained for legal or administrative reasons and have no historical value.

#### **Scope**

This plan applies to the records of the Board of Regents kept by the Corporation Secretary at the chief governing administrative unit of the University of Nebraska.

For the purpose of this plan a Board record is any paper, book, map, photograph, electronic file, original microfilm, cassette or video tape or other documentary material regardless of physical form or characteristics, made, produced, executed or received by the Corporation Secretary in connection with the transaction of Board of Regents University of Nebraska business.

#### **Retention Schedule (attached)**

The attached schedule has guidelines for the appropriate retention of several types of records with regard to the Board of Regents. Records will be kept in the custody of the office of the Corporation Secretary. If, after consulting this plan and the schedule attached, there exists a question regarding the proper disposition or retention of a particular document or class of documents, it shall be the responsibility of the Corporation Secretary to determine the proper disposition of the item(s) in consultation with the Office of the Vice President and General Counsel for appropriate action.

#### Storage of records

Records that are ready to be put in storage, based on the attached schedule, should be kept in the designated areas until the time that they are archived or disposed of. Records must be labeled using the procedures in effect at the time of storage, which will include, but are not limited to the subject, date created, department and disposition or archiving date.

#### Archival records

Records created through Board activities are the property of the University of Nebraska. These include, but are not limited to: papers, correspondence, official printed material, minutes, committee files, financial and associated records in any form or format.

Inactive records that may be considered of historical or legal value which should be transferred to the University Archives in compliance with the records retention schedule include: agendas, minutes, handouts, resolutions, employee service awards, correspondence, voting records, and signed copies of agreements, leases, and contracts related to a Board of Regents meeting; correspondence relating to policies, procedures, and major transactions; and correspondence relating to certain topics of public interest and of historical value.

The University of Nebraska Archives, located and functioning on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus, shall be the repository of records of the University of Nebraska Board of Regents. The University Archives retains custody of the records after transfer. Use of the records by the transferring office must follow normal University Archives policies.

#### **Disposal of non-permanent records**

Examples of inactive records that may be discarded in compliance with the records retention schedule include: routine financial and administrative records such as requisitions; travel expense vouchers; accounting reports; drafts of reports or correspondence; routine acknowledgments such as notifications, requests, transmittals, multiple copies of a single document; convenience copies of publications; copies of widely distributed documents that have originated in other offices such as policies and procedures, files, and manuals; publications including announcements, newsletters, programs, brochures, and promotional literature.

Records will be disposed of based on the attached schedule by the Corporation Secretary. Sensitive, financial or confidential records should be shredded before disposal.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve a supplemental Resolution providing for the inclusion of the

Colonial Terrace Apartments complex as facilities under the Resolution of the Board dated December 1, 1964 and authorize the expenditure of \$60,000 from the 1986 Surplus Fund to make certain repairs and

renovations to the Colonial Terrace Apartments.

PREVIOUS ACTION: On September 11, 1972, the Board approved a right-of-entry agreement

with the City of Lincoln to permit construction of a storm sewer on

complex property.

EXPLANATION: Colonial Terrace Apartments complex was acquired from the Colonial

Terrace Corporation in 1956. The facilities include 32 two-bedroom apartment units and four three-bedroom units located near the University of Nebraska-Lincoln East Campus. The apartments are administered by the Division of University Housing and are used for student family housing. Rental rates have been adequate over the years to provide the normal operation and maintenance as well as modest renewal and replacement. The facility is currently in need of modernization and

repair.

The attached resolution makes the Colonial Terrace Apartments complex a part of the facilities under the 1964 Bond Resolution and provides confirmation of that commitment by the Board of Regents. Accordingly, revenues derived from the facility are pledged for the retirement of revenue bonds, and funds to repair and maintain the Colonial Terrace Apartments Complex will be provided through the revenue bond

program.

#### RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska (the "Board") as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Definitions</u>: In addition to words and terms elsewhere defined herein, all words and terms used in this Supplemental Resolution (the "Supplemental Resolution") which are defined in the Resolution of the Board adopted effective December 1, 1964 (the "1964 Resolution") as from time to time amended and supplemental (collectively, the "Bond Resolution") shall for all purposes of this Supplemental Resolution have the meanings specified in the Bond Resolution.
- Section 2. <u>Findings and Determinations</u>: The Board hereby finds and determines:
  - a). The Colonial Terrace Apartments complex consists of four duplex and seven four-plex apartment units, located at 3320-22, 3330-32-36-38, 3340-42, 3344-46-48-50, 3400-02-06-08, 3301-03-07-09, 3315-17, 3323-25-27-29, 3333-35, 3345-47-53-55, 3401-03-07-09 Starr Street. Situated near the East Campus of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, these units are owned and operated by University Housing and leased primarily to students at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln who require family housing.
  - b). The Colonial Terrace Apartments complex is the type of facility specified in Section 85-403 of the Act and is a facility from which the Board has and will derive revenues, fees and earnings.
  - c) The Board has owned and operated the Colonial Terrace Apartments for at least two years prior to the date of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution as a part of an institution of higher learning.
  - d) It is necessary, desirable, advisable and in the best interest of the Board that the revenues, fees and earnings of the Colonial Terrace Apartments be subjected to the lien of the Bond Resolution and that the Colonial Terrace Apartments become a part of the Facilities as defined in the Bond Resolution.
  - e) As set forth in the Certificate of the Board specified in Subsection 2(b) below, in the opinion of the Board, the revenues, fees and earning to be derived by the Board from the operation of the Colonial Terrace Apartments during each of the five Fiscal Years next succeeding the date of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution will be at least equal to 1.10 times the estimated costs of Operation and Maintenance of the Colonial Terrace Apartments during each of such years, such estimates being based on the Board's experience in operating comparable buildings and facilities and on its schedule of rates, fees and charges now in effect.
  - f) Section 6.2 of the Bond Resolution requires the Board to keep the "Facilities" in good repair, working order and condition and to make all necessary and proper repairs, renewals, replacements, additions, extensions and betterments thereto. Section 6.12 of the 1964 Resolution also requires the Board to comply with all statutes of the State of Nebraska

- g) The Colonial Terrace Apartments require certain renewals, replacements, additions, betterments and equipment in order to (i) operate efficiently, (ii) maintain the revenues, fees and earnings herein pledged under the Bonds Resolution, (iii) maintain the Facilities as revenue-producing enterprises and (iv) meet all applicable health and safety code provisions of the State, the City of Lincoln, Nebraska and the Board.
- h) In order to accomplish such renewals, replacements, additions, betterments and acquisitions of equipment, the sum of \$60,000 should be expended from the 1986 Surplus Fund as indicated on the attached schedule.


#### Section 3. Actions: The Board hereby approves and orders the following:

- a) All of the revenues, fees and earnings to be derived by the Board from the ownership and operation of the Colonial Terrace Apartments shall be subject to the lien and pledge of Article III of the Bond Resolution, such revenues, fees and earnings shall be paid to the Bond Fund Trustee as provided in Article III of the Bond Resolution and shall be a part of the Revenues, and the Colonial Terrace Apartments shall be deemed to be part of the Facilities.
- b) The Board requests that (a) the opinion of counsel required by Subjection 8.1.8(i) of the Bond Resolution be delivered to the Bond Fund Trustee, (b) the certificate of the Certified Public Accountants required by Subsection 8.1.8(ii) of the Bond Resolution be delivered to the Bond Fund Trustee, and (c) the certificate of the Board required by Subsection 8.1.8(iii) of the Bond Resolution containing (I) the estimates of revenues, fees and expenses and (II) costs of Operation and Maintenance of the Colonial Terrace Apartments be delivered to the Bond Fund Trustee.

EXPLANATION: The technology demands of users in the University community continue

to increase. University-wide SAP, Student Information Systems at UNL and UNO, budget and other critical systems rely on the same mainframe environment for computing support. The number of users, coupled with increasing transactions and records has surpassed the systems' rated capacity. The current system, acquired in 1999, now runs consistently at 90% or more of available capacity. Normal operations should see the system working at 60-70%, which would yield better response times and provide capacity for unexpected user demand peaks. Without the added capacity, the system will be inadequate to support all of the functions

needed in administrative and academic computing.

The estimated cost includes hardware costs of approximately \$800,000, with the remainder of the cost being licensing payments to vendors to allow movement of operating systems to the new computer, one-time costs associated with the migration, and software maintenance fees.

This action would also allow the Vice President for Business & Finance to utilize the Master Lease Program to finance this purchase.

EXPLANATION: The Board of Regents, in 1997, approved the purchase of the

SAP software system for use in University-wide administrative computing. The contract provides for an annual maintenance fee. Maintenance fees (annual usage fees) are fixed at a percentage of the current market price of the product. For that payment, the University is allowed a certain number of user licenses (named persons who can use the product). Within the allowed licenses, users are allowed differing latitudes of access to the system. Any usage in excess is subject to additional charges by the software provider. Our original agreement is set

to expire on March 31, 2003.

The implementation of SAP has progressed to a point where the number of licenses and types of licenses needs to be increased and reconfigured. In addition, SAP's strategic development direction has shifted since our original contract was put in place in 1997, with enhancements concentrating on web-based access which puts needed information on a users desktop. This enhanced user interface is known as MySAP.com©.

SAP, in exchange for extending the contract before the end of calendar 2001, has agreed to expand our license to include the MySAP.com functionality. Additionally, concessions on back license fees would be made while future maintenance fees would be locked in for a multi-year period yielding an overall savings to the University versus continuing the current contractual arrangement and its escalating cost.

This action would also allow the Vice President for Business & Finance to utilize the Master Lease Program to finance a portion of this enhancement over the life of the license extension.

# UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA MEDICAL CENTER PROGRAM STATEMENT

#### I. GENERAL INFORMATION AND SITE LOCATION

#### A. Project Description

The University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) proposes to renovate approximately 33,000 gross square feet containing 28,700 net square feet of space on Level 2, of the 4230 Building, located on the UNMC Campus. The area to be renovated is currently leased to Nebraska Health Systems and houses service vehicles and records storage. Approximately 20,000 net square feet of space will be converted into an anticipated 16 research laboratory modules and support space. An additional 8,700 net square feet will be renovated for use as investigator offices, conference rooms, restrooms and circulation space.

The 4230 Building was originally constructed to house an Omaha Public Power District operations center and includes extensive garage areas designed with high ceilings and heavy structural capacity to accommodate large service vehicles. The floor loading capacity and ceiling heights in the garage areas of the 4230 Building are similar to those required for research labs and therefore make those portions of the building well suited for renovation into a research facility.


#### B. Summary of Major Project Goals and Objectives

The goal of this project is to provide additional biomedical research laboratories for the UNMC College of Medicine required for recruiting and providing laboratories for the additional funded investigators necessary to achieve UNMC's strategic objective to grow research and to fulfill current research commitments.

#### C. Project Need and Justification

UNMC is focused on a strategic goal to double externally funded research activity on the campus within five years and triple it in ten years. The increased emphasis on research growth has resulted in an increased rate of research growth as illustrated by the following graph:

#### C. Project Need and Justification, Continued



Over the past two years, UNMC's research funding from external sources has increased by 38 percent moving from \$30.0 million annually to \$41.3 million. Plans to sustain or accelerate the rate of growth are being implemented. At this point in time the only significant impediment to sustaining the rate of growth is the availability of research labs. UNMC's success in increasing research has resulted in an acute shortage of laboratories despite rigorous reallocations of space based on research merit. While the Research Center of Excellence (RCE) building will provide excellent state-of-the-art facilities to facilitate recruitment when it is completed in late 2003, it will not be available to meet short-term requirements. Additional labs are needed and proposed for construction to bridge the gap and to provide for projected needs beyond those to be served by the RCE. A partial list of research initiatives contributing to the lab shortage includes the following:

- (1) Five new clinical department chairs have recently been appointed. To solidify the College of Medicine's support for achieving the strategic research goal, each of the new appointees has been charged with the responsibility of developing a significant research presence on campus. Appropriate plans are in place to recruit additional clinical and basic science investigators. The shortage of labs to house the new recruitments will put UNMC at a considerable recruiting disadvantage or at best delay plans. At present, the recruitment of individual NIH-funded investigators has been a challenge based on space limitations alone.
- The Tobacco Settlement Biomedical Research Program will further aid in promoting the UNMC research enterprise, recruitments are in progress in the fields of eye research and organ and tissue transplantation immune system research. The tobacco settlement is also likely to be associated with time sensitive re-assessment of our use of funds so that limitations in recruitment based on the availability of research space would be detrimental to both the legislature's goals and our own.

(3) Center for Neurovirology and Neurodegenerative Diseases (CNND) has been awarded an NIH renovation grant that will require a reduction in available labs to accommodate construction. In addition to this opportunity, expansion of the



CNND due to extensive funding growth will require relocation of other programs from existing lab space.

A recent review of research space use within the College of Medicine and on the UNMC campus indicates that only a fraction of the space needed to accomplish strategic goals would become available as a result of reassignment, remodeling existing labs or other space recovery options.

The following graph compares the UNMC laboratory capacity, assuming the implementation of the proposed project, with the previously described demand for laboratory space over the short term and illustrates the current shortfall in research labs:

#### UNMC RESEARCH LAB CAPACITY and DEMAND



Prior to the initiation of the Research Center of Excellence (RCE) project in April 2000, UNMC occupied the equivalent of approximately 250 research laboratories on campus with approximately 44 of those being in substandard condition and in critical need of replacement. The demolition of the University Geriatrics Center to provide a site for the RCE has reduced the number of available labs. Renovation planned to facilitate the expansion of existing funded research programs described above will further reduce the

number of available labs over the short term. Although the RCE project will both replace the demolished and substandard labs and provide a net addition of 72 labs, construction will not be completed in time to satisfy current demand. The additional labs proposed for construction will help satisfy demand prior to completion of the RCE and serve the needs of the campus well into the future.

#### D. Information About Similar Projects at Peer Institutions.

Research laboratory modules, offices and laboratory support spaces for the proposed project will be similar to those planned for the Research Center of Excellence, which was extensively benchmarked by the research lab consultant for that project

#### E. Summary of the Background and History of the Project

The Board of Regents approved the purchase of an Omaha Public Power District building, now identified as the 4230 Building, on February 28, 1999. Two subsequent program statements to renovate portions of Levels 2 & 3 of the building into office space were approved by the Board of Regents on January 15, 2000 and June 17, 2000. The Board Regents has taken no previous action related to this project.

#### F. Master Plan Compliance

The project site, located on the perimeter of the UNMC Campus, west of the intersection of 42<sup>nd</sup> and Leavenworth Streets is identified in the 1997 UNMC Facilities Master Plan as a future location for support service functions. The site, however, is only about one block from the core of the campus and is also well located for research functions.

#### **G.** Describe Other Alternatives Considered

Other locations were considered for the research laboratories, including additions to Swanson Hall and the Munroe-Meyer Institute. After analysis of each location option, the proposed location was identified to be, the most economical option and the only option that could be completed in the time frame necessary to meet research goals. It is also the most suitable of available existing buildings for conversion to long-term laboratory occupancy. Portable modular labs were also considered and rejected due to the high cost of extending the required utilities infrastructure required the lack of a suitable site as well as the need for permanent rather than temporary laboratories.

#### H. Physical and Functional Facility Deficiencies

In addition to the construction of laboratories, utility services will be extended to the building from the campus central utility plant, energy code requirements, life safety code and ADA compliance issues, and building envelope improvement needs will be addressed.

#### J. Replacement Cost (for renovation projects only)

Cost to replace the building shell based on a three story, brick office building of 54,000 gross square feet with an exterior perimeter of 1,220 linear feet would be approximately \$8,100,000 at \$150 per square foot.
