# **POLICY INFORMATION**

# STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

#### STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

#### 1. GENERAL

Students at the University of Nebraska-Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture (NCTA) are members of both the College community and the larger community of which NCTA is a part. Students are entitled to all of the rights and protections enjoyed by members of the larger community. At the same time, as members of the College community, students have the responsibility to conduct themselves in a lawful manner and in compliance with the College's standards for student conduct. The purpose of this Code is to specify acts of student misconduct for which an offending individual or student organization will be subject to disciplinary sanctions under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.

#### 2. **DEFINITIONS**

The following definitions shall apply to the Student Code of Conduct and to the NCTA Disciplinary *Procedures:* 

**2.1** Alcoholic Beverage. Alcoholic beverage shall include alcohol, spirits, wine, beer, and every liquid or solid containing alcohol, spirits, wine or beer and capable of being consumed as a beverage by a human being.

**2.2** Campus. Campus shall mean all land, buildings and facilities of or owned, used or controlled by the Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture, all student housing units, and all streets, alleys, sidewalks and public ways abutting any land of the College or the land upon which a student housing unit is located.

**2.3** College. College shall mean University of Nebraska -Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture (NCTA), Curtis.

**2.4 Dangerous Weapon.** Dangerous weapon shall mean any firearm, knife, bludgeon, or other device, instrument, material, or substance, whether animate or inanimate, which in the manner it is used or intended to be used is capable of producing death or bodily injury.

**2.5 Drug.** Drug shall mean any controlled substance included in Neb. Rev. Stat. 28-405 (1999 Cum. Supp.) or as it may be amended, which lists controlled substances regulated under Nebraska criminal laws relating to drugs and narcotics. The controlled substances listed in Neb. Rev. Stat. 28-405 include those drugs listed in the University of Nebraska Policy Statement on Drugs.

**2.6** *Firearm.* Firearm shall mean any weapon which is designed to or may readily be converted to expel any projectile by the action of an explosive or frame or receiver of any such weapon.

**2.7** *Hazing.* Hazing shall mean any activity by an organization or by a member of an organization in which a member, prospective member, pledge or associate of the organization is subjected to acts which cause harm or create risk of harm to the physical or mental health of the

member, prospective member or pledge. Hazing includes, but is not limited to, any act or activity which causes or might reasonably be expected to cause fear or intimidation, extended deprivation of sleep or rest, forced consumption of any substance, physical exhaustion, physical harm (beating, boarding, paddling, branding or exposure to weather), or damage to property.

**2.8** Judicial Officer. Judicial Officer shall mean the Director of Student Services or a College official authorized by the Dean of NCTA to impose sanctions upon students or organizations found to have violated the Student Code of Conduct or other published College policies and regulations prescribing standards of student conduct.

**2.9** *Member of the College Community. Member of the College community shall mean any person who is a student, faculty member, College official or any other person employed by the NCTA.* 

**2.10** *Misconduct. Misconduct shall mean any act of misconduct proscribed in this Code of Conduct or violation of any other published College policy or regulation prescribing a standard of student conduct.* 

**2.11** Organization. Organization or student organization shall mean any student group recognized by the College pursuant to any policy of the College relating to student organizations. The term organization shall include any fraternity or sorority and any student organization established by or recognized by an academic or administrative unit of the College.

**2.12** Student. Student shall mean any person taking courses on the campus of The Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture, either full-time or part- time. Persons who are not officially enrolled for a particular term but who have a continuing relationship with the College, such as completion of academic work from a prior term, shall be considered students for the purpose of this Code of Conduct and NCTA Disciplinary Procedures. An individual who was an enrolled student at the time of any alleged misconduct shall be considered a student for the purpose of this Code of Conduct and the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.

**2.13** Student Housing Unit. Student housing unit or living unit shall mean any College residence hall, any fraternityhouse, any sororityhouse, or any other student housing facility recognized by the College.

**2.14** Unlawful. Unlawful or unlawfully shall mean in violation of any local ordinance or in violation of any law or regulation of the United States, the State of Nebraska or any other state.

# 3. NCTA DISCIPLINARY JURISDICTION.

**3.1** Applicability of Code and Disciplinary Procedures. The provisions of the Student Code of Conduct and the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures shall apply to individual students and to student organizations.

**3.2 On-Campus Jurisdiction.** NCTA disciplinary jurisdiction shall extend to any case of alleged misconduct by any student or organization occurring on the campus.

**3.3** Student Housing Unit Jurisdiction. University disciplinary jurisdiction shall extend to any case of alleged misconduct by any student or organization occurring on the premises of any student housing unit.

**3.4** Off-Campus Jurisdiction. NCTA disciplinary jurisdiction shall extend to any case of alleged misconduct by any student or organization occurring at an off-campus activity or event of or sponsored by the College or an organization. Other alleged misconduct by any student or

organization occurring off-campus shall not be subject to NCTA disciplinary jurisdiction unless the misconduct adversely affects the educational interests of the College. Off-campus misconduct in violation of a criminal law or involving falsification, alteration or fraudulent use of any College document, record or instrument of identification may, depending upon the nature and gravity of the circumstances, constitute misconduct adversely affecting the educational interests of the College for which an offending student or organization will be subject to disciplinary proceedings and sanctions under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures. Any misconduct associated with the use of a College vehicle shall be subject to disciplinary proceedings and sanctions. The Dean of NCTA and the Judicial Officer shall be the College officials having authority to determine on a case-by-case basis whether NCTA disciplinary proceedings shall be instituted for off-campus misconduct adversely affecting the educational interests of the College.

**3.5** NCTA Disciplinary Proceedings Independent of Civil or Criminal Proceedings. NCTA disciplinary proceedings may be instituted against a student or organization charged with violation of a law, which is also misconduct under this Code without regard to the pendency of civil litigation or criminal prosecution. NCTA disciplinary proceedings may be carried out prior to, simultaneously with, or following civil or criminal proceedings off campus.

# 4. MISCONDUCT

The following acts constitute misconduct under this Student Code of Conduct and the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.

# 4.1 Disruption or Obstruction of College Operations, Activities or Functions; Unauthorized Occupation of College Premises.

- a. Participation in a demonstration on the campus which materially and substantially disrupts the normal operations of the College and infringes upon the rights of other members of the College community.
- b. Leading or inciting others to materially and substantially disrupt scheduled activities at any location on the campus.
- c. Material and substantial disruption or obstruction of teaching, research, administration, or other College activities, including its public service functions on or off campus, or other authorized activities on the campus.
- *d. Material and substantial disruption of any activity or event of or sponsored by the College or an organization, either on or off campus.*
- e. Obstruction of ingress to or egress from the College building or facility or any student housing unit.
- f. Obstruction of the free flow of pedestrian or vehicular traffic on the campus.
- g. Unauthorized occupation or use of or entry into any College building or facility or any student housing unit, including both indoor and outdoor facilities.

# 4.2 Academic Dishonesty.

- a. The maintenance of academic honesty and integrity is a vital concern of the College community. Any student found guilty of academic dishonesty shall be subject to both academic and disciplinary sanctions. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, the following:
  - 1. <u>Cheating.</u> Copying or attempting to copy from an academic test or examination of another student; using or attempting to use unauthorized materials, information, notes,

study aids or other devices for any academic test, examination or exercise; engaging or attempting to engage the assistance of another individual in misrepresenting the academic performance of a student; or communicating information in an unauthorized manner to another person for an academic test, examination or exercise.

- 2. <u>Fabrication and Falsification</u>. Falsifying or fabricating any information or citation in any academic exercise, work, speech, test or examination. Falsification is the alteration of information, while fabrication is the invention or counterfeiting of information.
- 3. <u>Plagiarism</u>. Presenting the work of another as one's own (i.e., without proper acknowledgment of the source) and submitting examinations, theses, reports, speeches, drawings, laboratory notes or other academic work in whole or in part as one's own when such work has been prepared by another person or copied from another person.
- 4. <u>Abuse of Academic Materials.</u> Destroying, defacing, stealing, or making inaccessible library or other academic resource material.
- 5. <u>Complicity in Academic Dishonesty.</u> Helping or attempting to help another student to commit an act of academic dishonesty.
- 6. <u>Falsifying Grade Reports.</u> Changing or destroying grades, scores or markings on an examination or in an instructor's records.
- 7. <u>Misrepresentation to Avoid Academic Work.</u> Misrepresentation by fabricating an otherwise justifiable excuse such as illness, injury, accident, etc. in order to avoid or delay timely submission of academic work or to avoid or delay the taking of a test or examination.
- 8. <u>Other.</u> Academic units and members of the faculty may prescribe and give students prior notice of additional standards of conduct for academic honesty in a particular course, and violation of any such standard of conduct shall constitute misconduct under this Code of Conduct and the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.
- b. In cases where an instructor finds that a student has committed any act of academic dishonesty, the instructor may in the exercise of his or her professional judgment impose an academic sanction as severe as giving the student a failing grade in the course. Before imposing an academic sanction the instructor shall first attempt to discuss the matter with the student. If deemed necessary by either the instructor or the student, the matter may be brought to the attention of the student's major advisor, the instructor's department head, or the Dean of NCTA. When an academic sanction is imposed which causes the student to receive a lowered course grade, the instructor shall make a report in writing of the facts of the case and the academic sanction imposed against the student to the instructor's department head and to the Judicial Officer. The Student shall be provided with a copy of the report. Further, the instructor may recommend the instructor in the exercise of his or her professional judgment believes that such action is warranted.
- c. In cases where an instructor's finding of academic dishonesty is admitted by the student and an academic sanction is imposed by the instructor, which the student believes to be too severe, the student shall have the right to appeal the severity of the academic sanction through the grade appeal procedure.

d. In cases where an instructor's finding of academic dishonesty is disputed by the student, the matter shall be referred to the Judicial Officer for disposition in accordance with NCTA Disciplinary Procedures. An academic sanction imposed by the instructor shall be held in abeyance pending a final decision of guilt or innocence under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures. If it is determined through these procedures that they student is not guilty of academic dishonesty, the instructor's academic dishonesty, the imposed in addition to any disciplinary sanction which may be imposed under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures, subject to the student's right to appeal the severity of the academic sanction through the applicable grade appeal procedure.

#### 4.3 Falsification or Misuse of NCTA Identification and Other Documents

- a. Forging, altering or otherwise falsifying any NCTA document, any NCTA record or any NCTA instrument of identification, or assisting another student in such misconduct.
- b. Borrowing, lending or improperly possessing any NCTA instrument of identification.
- c. Submitting false information to any member of the faculty or staff or to any NCTA office.

**4.4 Misuse of Computers or Computing Resources.** Computing resources at the College exist for the purposes of education, research, service and administration. The use of computing resources for any purpose other than the purpose for which they are intended is an act of misconduct. Misuse of computers shall include:

- a. Accessing or attempting to access computing resources or computer-based information without proper authorization.
- b. Disrupting the intended use of computers or computer networks.
- c. Damaging or destroying computer equipment or computer-based information.
- d. Using a computer for an unauthorized purposed.
- e. Violating copyright laws or license restrictions with respect to the copying or use of computer programs, data, materials or information.
- f. Unauthorized use of another person's identification or password.
- g. Unlawful or unauthorized access to or use of computers, computer networks and computer data, programs, material or information. See Neb. Rev. Stat. 28-1343 through 28-1348 (1995 Reissue) or as amended.
- h. For further information on computer use and related violations, see Executive Memoranda No. 16, "Policy for Responsible Use of University Computers and Information Systems".

**4.5** *Alcohol. Unlawful of unauthorized possession, use, distribution, dispensing, delivery, sale or consumption of any alcoholic beverage.* 

**4.6 Drugs.** Unlawful or unauthorized possession, distribution, delivery, dispensing, manufacture or sale of any drug, unlawful possession of any drug with the intent to distribute, deliver, dispense, manufacture or sell any drug, or being unlawfully under the influence of any drug.

4.7 Smoking. Smoking in any College facility or vehicle.

4.8 Physical Abuse. Physically abusing or threatening to physically abuse any person.

**4.9 Disturbing the Peace.** Any act occurring on the College campus or on the premises of a student housing unit which intentionally disturbs the peace and quiet of any person or group of persons.

#### 4.10 Harassment

- a. Engaging or attempting to engage in any act for the purpose of injuring, threatening, or unreasonably alarming another or for the purpose of unreasonably interfering with any person's work, education, or the environment or activities surrounding one's work or education.
- b. If a person has been advised not to engage in certain acts and subsequently does so, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that the subsequent acts were done for one or more of the purposes set forth in the above paragraph.
- c. This section shall be strictly construed so as not to infringe upon the constitutional rights of free speech and expression of any person; and shall apply only to those acts described in paragraph (a) of this section.

4.11 Sexual Assault. Sexual assault or any other uninvited behavior of a sexually explicit nature.

**4.12** Dangerous Conduct. Conduct which is unreasonably dangerous to the health or safety of other persons or oneself.

4.13 Theft. Theft or attempted theft of any property.

**4.14** *Property Damage.* Damaging or attempting to damage property of the College or of another individual.

**4.15** *Fireworks and Explosives.* Using of possessing bombs, explosives, incendiary devices, or fireworks.

**4.16** *Fires.* Setting or attempting to set any fire on the campus or on the premises of any student housing unit, except in fireplaces or other facilities designated for fires.

**4.17** False Alarm. Turning in a false fire alarm or bomb threat or misusing fire safety equipment on the campus or on the premises of any student housing unit.

**4.18** *Failure to Report Fire. Failing to report a fire or any other extremely dangerous condition when known or recognized on the campus or on the premises of any student housing unit.* 

**4.19** Firearms, Ammunition, Dangerous Weapons and Dangerous Chemicals. Possessing or selling firearms, ammunition, or other dangerous weapons, or dangerous chemicals on the campus or on the premises of any student housing unit.

**4.20** Obstruction of Law Enforcement Officers, Firefighters or NCTA Officials. Obstructing or failing to comply with the directions of a law enforcement officer, firefighter or NCTA official in the performance of his or her duty on the College campus, on the premises of any student housing unit or at any activity or event sponsored by the College or an organization.

**4.21** Hazing. Hazing any person. The intent of any person engaging in hazing activity or the consent or cooperation of any person who is a victim of hazing will not constitute a defense to an allegation of misconduct for hazing.

4.22 Indecent Exposure. Committing any unlawful act of indecent exposure or public indecency.

**4.23** Gambling. Any gambling activity in violation of the laws of the State of Nebraska or of the United States.

**4.24** Unauthorized Use of College Property. Unauthorized use of any College property, facilities, equipment or materials.

**4.25** Unauthorized Keys or Unlocking Devices. Possessing, producing, manufacturing, or having manufactured without proper authorization, any key or unlocking device for use on any College facility or lock.

**4.26** *Traffic Violations.* Serious traffic violations on the campus, including operating any vehicle while intoxicated, speeding, reckless endangerment, or reckless driving.

**4.27** *Regulations. Pertaining to Student Housing Units. Violation of any student housing unit policy, rule or regulation.* 

**4.28** Insufficient Fund or No Account Checks. Failure to redeem or make arrangements to redeem, within one week after receipt of written notice, an insufficient funds or no account check submitted to NCTA for cash or for payment of NCTA goods of services.

**4.29** Abuse of Disciplinary Proceedings. Abuse of College disciplinary proceedings shall include the following:

- a. Failure to obey a request to appear before a Judicial Officer or Judicial Board.
- b. Falsification of testimony before a Judicial Officer or Judicial Board.
- c. Disruption or interference with the orderly conduct of any Judicial Board hearing.
- d. Attempting to discourage any person from using NCTA Disciplinary Procedures or participating in any disciplinary proceeding.
- e. Filing a malicious or frivolous complaint under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.
- f. Attempting to influence the impartiality of a member of a Judicial Board prior to or during any disciplinary proceeding.
- g. Verbal or physical harassment or intimidation of a member of a Judicial Board prior to, during or after any disciplinary proceeding.
- h. Failure to comply with any sanction imposed under the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures.
- *i.* Violation of the privacy rights of any student or College employee in regard to any disciplinary proceeding.
- *j. Influencing or attempting to influence another person to commit an abuse of disciplinary proceedings.*

**4.30** Other Unlawful Acts. Any act by a student which occurs on the campus, on the premises of any student housing unit or at any activity or event sponsored by the College or an organization which is in violation of any law of the State of Nebraska or of the United States, or in violation of any ordinance of the City of Curtis, shall constitute misconduct.

# 5. DISCIPLINARY SANCTIONS

One or more of the following disciplinary sanctions may be imposed as provided in the NCTA Disciplinary Procedures whenever a student or student organization is found to be guilty of misconduct under this Code of Conduct or under other published policies or regulations of the College prescribing standards of student conduct:

**5.1 Warning.** Written notice to the student or organization that continuation or repetition of specified misconduct may be cause for other disciplinary action.

**5.2 Restitution.** Reimbursement for damage to or misappropriation of property or reimbursement for medical expenses incurred by a third party as a direct result of misconduct. Reimbursement may take the form of service, other indirect compensation or direct financial compensation.

**5.3 Confiscation of Dangerous Weapons**. Weapons, firearms, ammunition, or other dangerous weapons possessed, used or stored on the campus in violation of the Code of Conduct may be confiscated.

**5.4 Probation.** A specified period of time during which a student or organization is warned that any further violation of the Code of Conduct will be cause for further disciplinary action. During the period of probation, the student or organization may be prohibited from participating in specified activities.

**5.5 Behavioral Requirement.** Written conditions imposed by a Judicial Board or judicial officer which establish specified requirements for the student or organization.

**5.6 Suspension.** Exclusion from all or specified classes and/or exclusion from all or specified privileges or activities of the College and/or exclusion from the campus for a specified period of time. In cases involving organizations, suspension may include loss of all privileges, including loss of College recognition for a specified period of time.

5.7 Expulsion. Permanent termination of student status or organizational status at the College.

# 6. REFERRAL TO CIVIL AUTHORITIES

When circumstances warrant the NCTA Administration will referacts of misconduct to appropriate civil or criminal justice authorities.

# NCTA DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

# 1. GENERAL

**1.1 Right to Disciplinary Proceeding.** Except in cases of temporary suspension ordered by the Dean as hereafter provided, suspension, expulsion or other disciplinary sanction for misconduct may not be imposed without a disciplinary proceeding in accordance with the following NCTA Disciplinary Procedures, hereafter referred to as these Disciplinary Procedures.

# 2. INITIATION OF DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS

**2.1 Complaint.** Any member of the College community may file a written misconduct complaint against a student or organization alleging misconduct under the Student Code of Conduct or other published College policy or regulation prescribing a standard of student conduct. Misconduct complaints shall be filed in the Office of the Dean or the Student Services Office.

**2.2 Responsibility of Judicial Officer.** If the Judicial Officer determines that the misconduct alleged in a complaint warrants the institution of disciplinary proceedings, he or she shall insure compliance with these Disciplinary Procedures.

**2.3 Disqualification of Judicial Officer.** In the event the Judicial Officer may be a material witness in any disciplinary proceeding or for any reason cannot perform his or her duties under these Disciplinary Procedures, the Dean shall appoint an acting Judicial Officer to perform such duties. **2.4 Review of Complaint.** The Judicial Officer shall make a preliminary investigation of each complaint to determine whether it may be disposed of without institution of disciplinary proceedings. Within 20 school days after receipt of a written misconduct complaint against a student or student organization, the Judicial Officer must decide on one of three courses of action:

- a. dismiss the complaint,
- b. propose an administrative disposition to the student, or
- c. initiate a disciplinary proceeding before the NCTA Judicial Board.

**2.5 Informal Meeting.** The Judicial Officer may conduct an informal meeting with a student or organization accused of misconduct to discuss the misconduct alleged. Prior to any such informal meeting the student or organization accused of misconduct shall be apprised in writing of the following:

- a. The source and nature of the misconduct complaint which has been filed.
- b. That the student or organization is entitled to be accompanied by counsel or an advisor at the expense of the student or organization at any meeting or hearing relevant to the misconduct alleged in the complaint.
- c. That the student or organization is under no obligation at any time to admit the misconduct alleged or to make any other statement at any meeting or hearing relevant to the misconduct alleged.
- *d.* That any statement that the student or any representative of the organization may make can be used against the student or organization under these Disciplinary Procedures.

During any such informal meeting the Judicial Officer may proceed with administrative disposition of a complaint pursuant to Section 4.2 of these Disciplinary Procedures if the Judicial Officer determines that administrative disposition is appropriate and if the same is accepted by the student or organization as provided in Section 4.2

**2.6 Failure to Appear.** If a student or organization accused of misconduct fails to appear at an informal meeting requested by the Judicial Officer pursuant to Section 2.5, within ten school days after the request document was postmarked, the Judicial Officer may initiate disciplinary proceedings before the NCTA Judicial Board.

# 3. TEMPORARY SUSPENSION

Pending initiation of disciplinary proceedings by the Judicial Officer, the Dean may at any time temporarily suspend a student from the College or deny a student readmission when the Dean finds and believes from information coming to his or her attention that the presence of the student on the College campus would seriously disrupt the College or constitute a danger to the health, safety or welfare of persons on the campus. If a student is temporarily suspended by the Dean, the Dean shall promptly instruct the Judicial Officer to initiate appropriate disciplinary proceedings against the student within two (2) working days after temporary suspension is imposed. If a student placed on temporary suspension is ultimately found not guilty of misconduct, such student shall be allowed if at all possible to make up academic work missed while on suspension.

# 4. ADMINISTRATIVE AND JUDICIAL BOARD DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS

**4.1 General.** If the Judicial Officer determines that the institution of a College disciplinary proceeding for alleged misconduct is necessary, such proceeding shall be instituted against the student or organization accused of misconduct in accordance with the procedures for administrative disposition or the procedures for Judicial Board disposition hereinafter provided.

**4.2** Administrative Disposition. The Judicial Officer, in the exercise of his or her professional judgement and when agreed to in writing by the student or organization, shall have authority by administrative disposition of a disciplinary proceeding to impose any of the disciplinary sanctions provided in Sections 5.1 through 5.7 of the Student Code of Conduct. Where an administrative disposition proposed by the Judicial Officer is not accepted in writing by the student or organization,

the student or organization shall have the right to have the matter of the alleged misconduct referred to the NCTA Judicial Board. The student or organization shall have three (3) school days within which to accept or reject an administrative disposition proposed by the Judicial Officer. If the student or organization fails to accept or reject the proposed administrative disposition within such three day period, rejection will be presumed and the matter shall be referred to the NCTA Judicial Board.

**4.3 Judicial Board Disposition.** If a student or organization rejects administrative disposition of a disciplinary proceeding proposed by the Judicial Officer, the Judicial Officer shall institute a disciplinary proceeding against the student or organization before the NCTA Judicial Board for the misconduct alleged in the complaint. Further, the Judicial Officer in the exercise of his or her professional judgement may institute a disciplinary proceeding for alleged misconduct directly before the NCTA Judicial Board without first offering administrative disposition to a student or organization accused of misconduct.

**4.4 Jurisdiction.** The NCTA Judicial Board shall have general original jurisdiction under these Disciplinary Procedures to hear and decide any disciplinary proceeding against a student or organization accused of misconduct.

# 5. NCTA JUDICIAL BOARD PROCEDURE

**5.1 Notice.** All disciplinary proceedings before the NCTA Judicial Board shall be instituted by written notice delivered to the student accused of misconduct. Such written notice shall contain the following information:

- a. Source of the misconduct complaint.
- b. Statement of alleged facts constituting misconduct under the Student code of Conduct or other published College policy or regulation prescribing a standard of student conduct.
- c. Citation of the specific provision(s) of the Code of Conduct or other College policy or regulation alleged to have been violated.
- d. Description of the evidence to be offered in support of the alleged misconduct.
- e. Date, time, and place of the hearing before the Judicial Board. Each hearing shall be at least three (3) school days after the date of receipt of the written notice.
- f. A statement that the student or organization accused of misconduct may be accompanied by counsel or other advisor at the hearing before the Judicial Board at the expense of the student or organization, and that such counsel or advisor may advise the student or organization, but may not directly participate in the hearing.
- g. That the student or organization accused of misconduct is under no obligation to admit the truth of the alleged misconduct or to make any other statement at the hearing relevant to the alleged misconduct, and that refusal to testify or make a statement will not be considered as an indication of guilt.
- h. That the student or organization accused of misconduct has the right to inspect before the hearing in the Student Services Office any affidavits, exhibits or other documentary evidence or physical evidence which is intended to be offered at the hearing, and that the student or organization will be advised in writing prior to the hearing of any subsequently discovered evidence which is intended to be offered at the hearing and will be provided with a

description of the evidence and allowed to examine the same if it is documentary or physical evidence.

**5.2 Failure to Appear.** The student accused of misconduct or a student officer of the organization accused of misconduct will be expected to be present at the hearing before the Judicial Board. If the student or a student officer or the organization fails to appear at the time and place designated for the hearing, the Judicial Board shall proceed with the hearing if a majority of the Judicial Board members present are satisfied that the student or organization has received written notice as required in Section 5.1. The Judicial Board will then proceed in the absence of the student or organization to hear and weigh the evidence in support of the alleged misconduct and render a decision.

**5.3 Quorum.** Every student or organization accused of misconduct in disciplinary proceedings before the Judicial Board is entitled to a hearing by a quorum of the Board. A quorum will consist of at least three faculty and staff members and one student member of the Board. If a quorum is not present, the student or student officer of the organization, as the case may be, and the Judicial Officer may stipulate and agree in writing that the Judicial Board hearing may be conducted and the case may be decided by those Judicial Board members present even though a quorum has not been established.

**5.4 Status Pending Judicial Board Proceedings.** The status of a student accused of misconduct shall not be altered and the right of a student to be present on campus and to attend classes shall not be suspended during the time of any disciplinary proceeding against the student unless the Dean determines that suspension of the student is required for compelling reasons in order to protect the student's physical or emotional health or safety or for compelling reasons in order to protect the health, safety or welfare of other members of the College community. The status of an organization accused of misconduct shall not be altered during the time of any disciplinary proceeding against the organization, unless the Dean determines that suspension of the college is required for compelling reasons in order to college community.

#### 5.5 Disqualification of a Board Member.

- a. If any member of the Judicial Board feels that his or her relationship with either a disciplinary proceeding to be heard or any individual or organization involved in the proceeding would affect his or her ability to render a fair and impartial decision, such Judicial Board member shall disqualify himself or herself from participation in the proceeding. Additionally, a member may elect not to serve on the Judicial Board for a particular proceeding if the member in the exercise of reasonable discretion believes there may be an appearance of impropriety by his or her serving as a member of the Judicial Board for that proceeding.
- b. The student accused of misconduct or a student officer of the organization accused of misconduct may question any Judicial Board member with regard to his or her attitude or knowledge about the disciplinary proceeding to be heard. If a member of the Board is challenged for cause by the student or organization, the other members of the Board present shall, without the presence of the challenged member, vote upon the challenge. If a majority of the members present vote to sustain the challenge, the challenged member shall be excused from further participation in the proceeding. The foregoing shall not relieve the

*Judicial Board from the requirement of maintaining a quorum for the hearing as required by Section 5.3 above.* 

**5.6 Judicial Board Hearings Closed.** All hearings of the Judicial Board shall be closed to the public in order to comply with the requirements of the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. **5.7 Right to Separate Hearing.** In proceedings involving alleged misconduct against more than one student or organization, any student or organization accused of misconduct may request and shall be granted a separate disciplinary proceeding before the Judicial Board.

**5.8 Hearings During Finals Week, and Summer Sessions.** Judicial Board hearings may not be available during the last week of each semester (Finals Week) and during summer school sessions. During these time periods the Dean may designate one or more hearing officers who shall be authorized to conduct hearings and render decisions in disciplinary proceedings in accordance with the procedures governing the Judicial Board.

**5.9 Decisions.** The Judicial Board shall render a written decision in each proceeding in accordance with the requirements of Sections 7.1 and 7.2 of these Disciplinary Procedures.

# 6. RULES FOR CONDUCT OF JUDICIAL BOARD HEARINGS

6.1 General. Judicial Board hearings shall be conducted in a manner which will provide substantial justice for the student or organization accused of misconduct and for the College community.
6.2 Order of Evidence and Closing Arguments. Evidence shall be submitted in the following order:

a. evidence by the College in support of the alleged misconduct,

b. evidence by the student or organization accused of misconduct, and

c. evidence by the College confined to rebutting evidence presented by the student or organization.

After the presentation of evidence the Judicial Officer shall be given the opportunity to present a closing argument followed by a closing argument by the student or organization.

**6.3 Examination of Witnesses.** The student or organization accused of misconduct, the Judicial Officer and each member of the Judicial Board shall be allowed to hear and question all witnesses appearing at the hearing.

**6.4** Attorney or Advisor Not Allowed to Participate in Hearing. An attorney or other advisor for a student or organization accused of misconduct may be present at the hearing to counsel the student or organization, but may not directly participate in the hearing. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing sentence, an attorney or other advisor shall not be permitted to make oral presentations or arguments, examine or cross-examine witness, or object to testimony of witness or to introduction of other evidence.

**6.5 Evidentiary Rules.** The Board shall not be bound by the formal rules of evidence applicable to a court of law. It may admit and give probative effect to evidence, including hearsay evidence, which possesses probative value commonly accepted by reasonably prudent persons in the conduct of their affairs. Incompetent, irrelevant, immaterial and unduly repetitious evidence may be excluded. The Judicial Board shall designate one of its members to make rulings on admission of evidence.

**6.6 Verbatim Record.** The Judicial Board shall make a confidential verbatim record of each hearing. Such verbatim record shall be made by tape recording or verbatim transcription by a court

reporter and shall be the property of the College. Copies of such record may be obtained by an accused student or organization upon payment of the cost of duplication and used only for the purpose of an appeal under these Disciplinary Procedures or proceedings in a court of law. In no event shall the record of a Judicial Board hearing be used in a manner which violates the privacy rights of any student, College employee or other person.

**6.7 Burden of Proof.** In all cases the College shall have the burden of proving the misconduct alleged against the student or organization by a preponderance of the evidence received at the hearing. Preponderance of the evidence is not determined by the number of witnesses who testify concerning a disputed fact, but rather is that amount of evidence which on the whole, and when fairly and impartially considered, produces the stronger impression on the Judicial Board and is more convincing of the existence of the fact when weighed against the evidence in opposition thereto. If the evidence concerning a disputed fact is evenly balanced or if it preponderates in favor of the accused student or organization, then the College will havefailed to meet the required burden of proof. The Judicial Board is not limited to consideration of evidence introduced by the College in determining whether the College has met its burden, but should consider any evidence tending to establish the College's contention of a disputed fact, even though such evidence is introduced by another.

# 7. JUDICIAL BOARD DECISIONS

**7.1 Form of Decision.** After a hearing in a disciplinary proceeding the Judicial Board by a majority vote based upon the evidence received shall render a decision as follows:

- a. Not Guilty. Misconduct has not been proved; or
- b. Guilty. Misconduct has been proved. In this case the Judicial Board may decide not to impose a disciplinary sanction, if mitigating circumstances warrant that no sanction be imposed, or it may decide to impose disciplinary sanctions as follows:
  - 1. Warning,
  - 2. Restitution,
  - 3. Conduct Probation,
  - 4. Behavioral Requirement,
  - 5. Suspension, or
  - 6. Expulsion.

Sanctions listed in (1) through (6) above may be combined. See Sections 5.1 through 5.7 of the Code of Conduct for a description of disciplinary sanctions.

**7.2 Written Decisions; Delivery.** The Judicial Board shall render its decisions in writing within ten (10) school days after the conclusion of a hearing. Each decision shall contain findings of fact as well as the Board's disposition of the proceeding and shall be delivered to the office of the Dean together with the verbatim record of the Judicial Board hearing. A copy of the decision shall be mailed within one school day to the student or organization accused of misconduct at the address of record as verified at the hearing.

In disciplinary proceedings involving crimes of violence, the judicial officers of NCTA will, if requested by the victims, disclose to the victims whether charges against students violating the Student Code of Conduct were upheld. The disciplinary sanctions imposed on the offenders may be disclosed to the victims at the discretion of the judicial officers. Violations of the Student Code of Conduct and Disciplinary Procedures which may be considered crimes of violence include: physical abuse, sexual assault, dangerous conduct, and hazing.

#### 8. SUPPLEMENTAL RULES

The Judicial Board may adopt supplemental rules and regulations, not in conflict with the provisions of these Disciplinary Procedures, which the Board shall determine to be necessary for the fair and impartial conduct of its proceedings.

# 9. REHEARING

A student or organization found guilty of misconduct by the Judicial Board may petition the Judicial Board to rehear the proceedings upon the discovery of new evidence within 90 days from the date of the decision of the Judicial Board, except that in cases of suspension a petition for rehearing request may be filed anytime during the term of suspension, and in cases of expulsion there shall be no time limit on the filing of a petition for rehearing. The Judicial Board will judge the sufficiency of the new evidence, and no appeal may be taken from its decision to either grant or deny the request to rehear the disciplinary proceedings. If a rehearing is granted the verbatim record of the original hearing shall be fully admissible as evidence. In the rehearing of a case the student or organization must bear the burden or proving that the original decision should be modified or rescinded because of the new evidence.

#### 10. JUDICIAL BOARD MEMBERSHIP AND TERM OF OFFICE

**10.1 Membership.** The NCTA Judicial Board shall have one staff member and two faculty members and three student members. The NCTA Student Senate shall provide the Dean with nine recommendations from which he or she will select three regular student members and three alternate student members to serve on the Judicial Board. The Supporting Staff Association President shall provide the Dean with six recommendations from which he or she will select one regular staff member and two alternate members to serve on the Judicial Board. The Faculty Chair shall provide the Dean with seven recommendations from which he or she will select two regular faculty members and four alternate faculty members to serve on the Judicial Board. Members shall attend a Judicial Board orientation session prior to serving on the Board.

**10.2** Vacancies. Vacancies on the Judicial Board, including temporary vacancies, may be filled by the Dean or his or her designee from the list of alternate members appointed by the Dean. Should the need arise, the Student Senate, the Faculty Chair and the Supporting Staff Association President shall at the request of the Dean submit additional lists of alternate members to the Dean. Should the Student Senate, the Faculty Chair or the Supporting Staff Association President refuse or for any reason fail to submit any of the above- mentioned lists of alternate members to the Dean when requested, the Dean shall directly make any appointment required to fill a vacancy on the Judicial Board.

**10.3 Term of Office.** Members of the NCTA Judicial Board shall be appointed for a term of one academic year from the first day of classes extending through the last day of classes. Members may be re- appointed provided their names are included on the lists submitted to the Dean pursuant to Section 10.1. Members may not serve more than two consecutive terms.

**10.4** Chairperson. The Judicial Board shall select a chairperson who will preside at Judicial Board hearings.

**10.5** *Removal from the Judicial Board.* If any of the following situations occur, a member may be removed from the Judicial Board by the Dean

- a. A member fails to respond to meeting notices more than twice in a single semester.
- b. A member is found to be in violation of the privacy rights of any member of the College community who is involved in a disciplinary proceeding.

# 11. APPEALS AND NCTA APPEALS BOARD PROCEDURE

**11.1 Right of Appeal.** A student or organization found guilty of misconduct by the NCTA Judicial Board shall have the right to appeal to the NCTA Appeals Board which has exclusive appellate jurisdiction in all disciplinary proceedings.

**11.2** *Timeliness.* Any appeal <u>must</u> be submitted in writing to the NCTA Appeals Board and received in the Office of the Dean within seven (7) calendar days after the date of mailing the Judicial Board decision to the student or organization accused of misconduct.

**11.3** Issues to be Considered on Appeal. The Appeals Board will only consider one or more of the following four issues on appeal:

- a. That the evidence received by the Judicial Board was not sufficient to establish the misconduct found.
- b. That the Judicial Board did not conduct its proceedings in a manner which permitted the student or organization accused of misconduct an adequate opportunity to present a defense.
- c. That sanctions imposed by the Judicial Board are not in keeping with the gravity of the misconduct.
- d. That the Judicial Board failed to follow the applicable disciplinary procedures and that as a result of such failure the student or organization did not receive a fair and impartial hearing.

An appeal which does not clearly raise in writing one or more of the four issues listed above shall be dismissed without further consideration. The Appeals Board shall limit its review to the issue or issues raised in the written appeal and shall not address any issue not raised. The Appeals Board shall complete its review of the written appeal within 20 school days after its receipt, and shall promptly issue written notice of its decision to the student or student organization.

**11.4** Oral Arguments. In considering an appeal, the Appeals Board may ask both student or organization making the appeal and the Judicial Officer to make an oral presentation. In this case the student or organization making the appeal shall first make an oral presentation followed by an oral presentation by the Judicial Officer. The Appeals Board may ask questions of both parties.

**11.5 Record of Proceedings Before the Judicial Board.** Upon request by the Appeals Board, the Judicial Officer shall deliver to the Appeals Board the record of the Judicial Board proceedings, including the tape recording or written transcription of the Judicial Board hearing.

**11.6** Disposition by Appeals Board. After reviewing an appeal complying with the requirements of Section 11.3, the Appeals Board may decide as follows:

- a. Affirm the Judicial Board decision; or
- b. Order a re-hearing before the Appeals Board following the hearing procedures applicable to the NCTA Judicial Board if the Appeals Board finds (i) that the evidence received by the

Judicial Board was not sufficient to establish the misconduct found, or (ii) that the proceedings of the Judicial Board were not conducted in a manner which allowed the student or organization an adequate opportunity to present a defense, or (iii) that the Judicial Board failed to follow the applicable disciplinary procedures and that as a result of such failure the student or organization did not receive a fair and impartial hearing; or

c. Modify any sanction imposed by a Judicial Board if the Appeals Board finds that the sanction is not in keeping with the gravity of the misconduct found.

**11.7** Status Pending Appeals Board Proceedings. Any sanctions imposed by a Judicial Board shall be suspended until an appeal is decided by the NCTA Appeals Board. The status of a student shall not be altered and the right of a student to be present on campus and to attend classes shall not be suspended during the time of any appeal proceeding unless the Dean determines that suspension of the student is required for compelling reasons in order to protect the student's physical or emotional health or safety or for compelling reasons in order to protect the health, safety, or welfare of other members of the College community. The status of an organization shall not be altered during the time of any appeal proceedings unless the Dean determines that suspension of the student is required for compelling reasons in order to protect the health, safety, or welfare of other members of the College community. The status of an organization shall not be altered during the time of any appeal proceedings unless the Dean determines that suspension of the student of the College is required for compelling reasons in order to protect the health, safety or genization from the College is required for compelling reasons in order to protect the health, safety or welfare of the College community.

**11.8** *Quorum.* A quorum will consist of one faculty member, one staff member and one student member. If a quorum is not present, the student or student officer of the organization, as the case may be, and the Judicial Officer may stipulate and agree in writing that the appeal may be heard by those Appeal Board members present even though a quorum has not been established.

**11.9 Disqualification of an Appeals Board Member.** If any member of the Appeals Board feels that his or her relationship with either a disciplinary proceeding to be heard or any individual or organization involved in the proceedings would affect his or her ability to render a fair and impartial decision, such Appeals Board member shall disqualify himself or herself from participation in the proceeding. Additionally, a member may elect not to serve on the Appeals Board for a particular appeal proceeding if the member in the exercise of reasonable discretion believes there may be an appearance of impropriety by his or her serving as a member of the Appeals Board for that appeal proceeding. The foregoing shall not relieve the Appeals Board from the requirement of maintaining a quorum as required by Section 11.8 above.

**11.10** Attorney or Advisor Not Allowed to Participate. An attorney or other advisor for a student or organization may be present at any proceedings of the Appeals Board to counsel the appellant student or organization, but may not directly participate in the proceedings.

**11.11 Verbatim Record.** The Appeals Board shall make a confidential verbatim record of its proceedings. Such verbatim record shall be made by tape recording or verbatim transcription by a court reporter and shall be the property of the College.

**11.12** Appeals During Finals Week and Summer Sessions. Appeals Board hearings may not be available during the last week of each semester (Finals Week) and during summer school sessions. During these time periods the Dean may designate one or more hearing officers who shall be authorized to hear appeals and render decisions in accordance with the procedures governing the Appeals Board.

11.13 Appeals Board Proceedings Closed. All proceedings of the Appeals Board shall be closed to the public.

**11.14** Appeals Board Decision Final. Decisions of the Appeals Board shall be final and may not be further appealed within the College or the University of Nebraska.

# 12. APPEALS BOARD MEMBERSHIP AND TERM OF OFFICE

**12.1** Membership. The NCTA Appeals Board shall have one staff member and two faculty members and two student members. The Supporting Staff Association President shall provide the Dean with four recommendations from which he or she will select one staff member to serve on the Appeals Board. The Faculty Chair shall provide the Dean with five recommendations from which he or she will select two faculty members to serve on the Appeals Board. The Student Senate shall provide the Dean with five recommendations from which he or she will select two faculty members to serve on the Appeals Board. The Student Senate shall provide the Dean with five recommendations from which he or she will select two student members to serve on the Appeals Board. The Student Senate shall provide the Dean with five recommendations from which he or she will select two student members to serve on the Appeals Board. Members shall attend a Judicial Board orientation prior to serving on the Board.

**12.2** Term of Office. Members of the NCTA Appeals Board shall be appointed for a term of one academic year. Members may be re- appointed provided their names are included on the lists submitted to the Dean pursuant to Section 11.1. Members may not serve more than two consecutive terms.

**12.3** *Chairperson. The Appeals Board shall select a chairperson who will preside at Appeals Board hearings.* 

**12.4** *Removal from the Appeals Board.* If any of the following situations occur, a member may be removed from the Appeals Board by the Dean.

- a. A member fails to respond to meeting notices more than twice in a single semester.
- b. A member is found to be in violation of the privacy rights of any member of the College community who is involved in a disciplinary proceeding
- c. A student member is found to be in violation of the Student Code of Conduct.

# 13. DISCIPLINARY RECORDS

Transcripts of NCTA academic records will not include information concerning disciplinary action, except in cases of expulsion. Information from disciplinary and counseling files will not be made available to unauthorized persons without the express written consent of the person involved or as otherwise authorized or required by law. Disciplinary records shall be destroyed seven years after the last sanction was imposed, except in case of expulsion, where disciplinary records shall be permanently maintained.

# 14. READMISSION AFTER EXPULSION

Any student who has been expelled from NCTA under these Disciplinary Procedures may at any time after three (3) years from the date of expulsion request readmission to NCTA by written petition to the Dean. If the Dean, in the exercise of his or her discretion grants readmission, the student's prior disciplinary record of expulsion shall be destroyed.

	Each major has been analyzed using these criteria and the appropriate productivity thresholds established by the NCCPE.
	NCCPE has determined that a total of 66 existing degree programs at the University of Nebraska were to be reviewed during 1999/00. This report includes all programs reviewed at the University of Nebraska at Omaha (28) and the University of Nebraska at Kearney (9). Reviews of degree programs at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (28) and the University of Nebraska Medical Center (1) were approved by the Board of Regents in November and forwarded to the Commission.
	As a result of the reviews, it is recommended that all of the degree programs be continued. The Board of Regents is asked to approve these recommendations and approve the forwarding of the entire report to the NCCPE.

PREVIOUS ACTION:	The 2000 Session of the Legislature enacted the Minority Scholarship Program Act (Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 85-9,177 to 85-9,182) to replace the minority scholarship provisions of Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1,125 and to expand the Minority Scholarships Program to also serve students attending the State Colleges and the Community Colleges of Nebraska. An additional sum of \$800,000 was appropriated to the University to carry out the duties and responsibilities assigned to the Board of Regents in the Act.
	On November 22, 1997, the Regents approved a new agency agreement with the University of Nebraska Foundation that incorporated the legislative changes made by the 1997 Session of the Legislature for minority Scholarships.
	The 1997 Session of the Legislature appropriated an additional \$500,000 to be used as an endowment for minority student scholarships and amended Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1,125 to permit use of these funds for scholarships on all campuses of the University.
	The 1990 Session of the Legislature enacted Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1,125 which placed into statutory law the provisions of LR 97 of the 1989 Session of the Legislature.
	On June 23, 1989, the Regents approved an agreement with the University of Nebraska Foundation establishing the UNL-UNO Minority Scholarships Fund and providing for management and administration of this Fund by the Foundation.
	The 1989 Session of the Legislature adopted of LR 97 and appropriated \$800,000 providing for the establishment of an endowed scholarship fund to support a program of undergraduate scholarships for under-represented Black, American Indian and Hispanic students at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Section 3 of LR 97 provides that monies appropriated by the

	Legislature for minority scholarships shall be held, managed and invested as an endowed scholarship fund in such manner as the Board of Regents shall determine and as authorized by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 72-1246, which governs investment of University funds.	
EXPLANATION:	The attached Amended and Restated Agency Agreement between the Regents and the Foundation, if approved, would replace the existing agency agreement with the Foundation for the Minority Scholarships Fund and continue to designate the Foundation to manage and administer the University of Nebraska Minority Scholarships Fund comprised of a principal of \$2,100,000 from the 1989, 1997, and 2000 appropriations of funds by the Legislature. The most significant elements of this instrument are as follows:	
	(1) Establish the University of Nebraska Minority Scholarships Fund ("the Fund") as a temporary endowment to provide undergraduate scholarships for under-represented Black, American Indian and Hispanics in accordance with the Minority Scholarship Program Act. The Fund will be divided into three accounts as follows:	
	(a) \$800,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the UNL-UNO Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for undergraduate scholarships (called "Davis Scholarships") for full-time students attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln or the University of Nebraska at Omaha	
	(b) \$500,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the University System Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for undergraduate scholarships for full-time students attending any campus of the University of Nebraska.	
	(c) \$800,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the Community Colleges Transfer Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for (i) undergraduate scholarships (called "Davis-Chambers Scholarships") for students attending a Community College, who are enrolled in general academic transfer courses as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1503, with the intention of transferring to the University, and (ii) undergraduate scholarships for students attending one of the campuses of the University who have transferred from a Community College.	

(2) The Fund will be invested and re-invested by the Foundation in accordance with the investment policies provided in the Agreement with the net income generated from the Fund to be used for the purpose of minority scholarships authorized by law and the University's implementing policy.

(3) The Executive Vice President and Provost will promulgate an implementing policy specifying the academic performance standards and the financial need factors to be considered in awarding scholarships. In addition, the implementing policy of the Executive Vice President and Provost will specify the criteria to be utilized in determining whether a state of under-representation continues to exist for each of the specified minority groups.

(4) Net income from the Fund not needed in any academic year for the award of scholarships may be re-invested and carried over into future academic years and expended for scholarships.

(5) Decisions concerning the award of scholarships will be made by a Scholarships Committee established in accordance with the Minority Scholarship Program Act. This committee will be selected by joint resolution of the Board of Regents, the Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges, and the boards of governors of the community colleges. It will coordinate use of the Fund for award of scholarships with private funds donated to the Foundation by Dick C.E. Davis and others for the R.H. "Rick" Davis Minority Scholarships Fund.

(6) The Foundation is required to make quarterly and annual reports to the University, each community college, and the State concerning the status of the Minority Scholarships Fund and its activities with respect thereto.

The Agency Agreement may be terminated at such time in the future as the Legislature may determine that the Minority Scholarships Program should terminate. Upon termination the assets of the Fund will be distributed in such manner as the Legislature may direct, or in the absence of direction from the Legislature, the balance of the Fund will be paid to the State Treasurer.

# UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA MINORITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND AMENDED AND RESTATED AGENCY AGREEMENT Minority Scholarships Program

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2001, by and between THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA, a public body corporate and agency of the State of Nebraska, hereinafter called "the University", and THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA FOUNDATION, a Nebraska non-profit corporation existing for the exclusive benefit of the University of Nebraska, hereafter called "the Foundation".

#### RECITALS

A. The Ninety-First Legislature of Nebraska, 1989 Session, enacted LR 97 and LB 813, providing the sum of \$800,000 to establish an endowed scholarship fund to support a program of undergraduate scholarships for under-represented Black, American Indian and Hispanic students (the "Minority Scholarships Program") at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln ("UNL") and the University of Nebraska at Omaha ("UNO").

B. LR 97 concluded that "the State of Nebraska has a compelling interest in eliminating the statistically significant under-representation of Black, American Indian and Hispanic students in the student population".

C. The Ninety-First Legislature of Nebraska, 1990 Session, enacted § 1 of LB 543, codified as Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1,125, authorizing the Board of Regents to implement the Minority Scholarships Program at UNL and UNO.

D. The Ninety-Fifth Legislature of Nebraska, 1997 Session, enacted § 1 of LB 476, amending §85-1,125 to permit the MinorityScholarshipsProgram to serve students on all campuses of the University of Nebraska, and appropriated an additional sum of \$500,000 for this purpose.

E. The Ninety-Sixth Legislature of Nebraska, 2000 Session, enacted LB 1379, the Minority Scholarship Program Act ("the Act") to replace § 85-1,125 and to expand the Minority Scholarships Program to also serve students attending the State Colleges and the Community Colleges of Nebraska, and appropriated an additional sum of \$800,000 to the University to carry out the duties responsibilities assigned to the Board of Regents of the University in the Act.

F. The Act declares that the State of Nebraska has a compelling interest to provide access to all of the State's public institutions of postsecondary education for Black, American Indian and Hispanic minority students and that the financial requirements of postsecondary education often represent major obstacles to such students because of the lack of financial resources available to them.

G. The purposes of the Act are (i) to provide total and partial undergraduate scholarships for tuition, fees and books to students from Black, American Indian and Hispanic groups which are underrepresented in the student populations of the State's public institutions of postsecondary education and who cannot afford such educational expenses due to lack of financial resources available to them, and (ii) to develop a more racially diverse student body at each of the State's public institutions of postsecondary education are education.

H. The Act provides:

- (1) That funds appropriated by the Legislature for the Minority Scholarships Program in years prior to fiscal year 2000-01 shall be used, administered and distributed only for the benefit of students at the University of Nebraska in such manner as the Board of Regents of the University shall determine.
- (2) That funds appropriated by the Legislature for the Minority Scholarships Program for fiscal year 2000-01 and each fiscal year thereafter shall be used for the benefit of students pursuant to the Act at all of the State's institutions of public postsecondary education.
- (3) That funds appropriated by the Legislature for the benefit of students at the University and students attending any Community College who are enrolled in general academic transfer courses, as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1503, with the intention of transferring to the University, shall be used, administered and invested in such manner as the Board of Regents of the University, inconsultation with the boards of governors of each participating Community College shall determine.
- (4) That awards of all scholarships under the Act shall be determined by a committee selected by the Board of Regents of the University, the Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges, and the Community College boards of governors, which committee shall include under-represented minority groups and private donors to the endowed scholarship funds created by the Act.
- (5) That awards of scholarships shall be consistent with the intent of the Act.
- (6) That funds appropriated by the Legislature for scholarships pursuant to the Act shall be used in coordination with private donations for such scholarships and in consultation with the major donors thereof and in coordination with federal grant funds available to minority students so as to maximize the level of benefits and accomplish the purposes of the Act.
- (7) That funds appropriated by the Legislature for scholarships pursuant to the Act shall be used to support endowed scholarship funds which shall be held, managed, and invested

as authorized by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 72-1246 with only the income therefrom expended for scholarships.

I. The Foundation has established the R.H. "Rick" Davis Minority Scholarship Fund from private donations to provide funds for minority students scholarships similar to the Minority Scholarships Program provided for in the Act.

J. By written agreements between the University and the Foundation, dated October 5, 1989, and January 8, 1998, the Foundation has managed and administered the University's Minority Scholarships Fund as a temporary endowment and the income thereof has been used for the purpose of providing scholarships to under-represented minority students as authorized by legislation prior to the Act in coordination with the R.H. "Rick" Davis Minority Scholarship Fund and other private financial resources administered by the Foundation available to minority students for the expenses of an undergraduate post-secondary education.

K. By this Agreement, the University intends to establish the Minority Scholarships Fund as a temporary endowment comprised of the \$800,000 appropriated in the 1989 Legislative Session, the \$500,000 appropriated in the 1997 Legislative Session, the \$800,000 appropriated in the 2000 Legislative Session, and any funds which may be appropriated to the University in future Legislative Sessions for use pursuant to the Act, to provide for the management and administration of said Fund by the Foundation as required by law and in accordance with the Act, as amended.

#### AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, the University and the Foundation agree as follows:

# Section 1. Appointment of Foundation as Agent; Management as Temporary Endowment; Scholarships Accounts.

(a) The University has appointed the Foundation as its agent and has transferred to the Foundation the total principal sum of TWO MILLION ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,100,000), the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged by the Foundation, which, together with both accumulated and future income therefrom, and future appropriations of funds by the Legislature for scholarships pursuant to the Act, shall constitute **THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA MINORITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND**, hereinafter called "the Fund". The Fund shall be held and managed by the Foundation as a temporary endowment fund to be used as required by the Act and other applicable law, this Agreement, and the University's implementing policy. The Foundation shall manage and keep continually invested the Fund. The income earned on the Fund, including any appreciation over and above the original amounts of principal received from the University, shall be available to provide the scholarships authorized herein.

(b) The Fund shall be divided as follows into three accounts called the UNL-UNO Scholarships Account, the University System Scholarships Account and the Community Colleges Transfer Scholarships Account.

- (1) \$800,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the UNL-UNO Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for undergraduate scholarships for qualifying Black, American Indian and Hispanic full-time students attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln or the University of Nebraska at Omaha
- (2) \$500,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the University System Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for undergraduate scholarships for qualifying Black, American Indian and Hispanic full-time students attending any campus of the University of Nebraska.
- (3) \$800,000 of the principal of the Fund together with accumulated income therefrom shall be maintained in the Community Colleges Transfer Scholarships Account, and the income therefrom shall be used exclusively for (i) undergraduate scholarships for eligible Black, American Indian and Hispanic students attending a Community College, who are enrolled in general academic transfer courses as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1503, with the intention of transferring to the University, and (ii) undergraduate scholarships for eligible Black, American Indian and Hispanic students attending one of the campuses of the University who have transferred from a Community College.

(c) From time to time the University may transfer or cause to be transferred to the Foundation any future appropriations of funds by the Legislature for scholarships pursuant to the Act, which appropriations shall be added to the principal of the Fund and credited to one or both of the forgoing described scholarship accounts as the Legislature may direct.

#### Section 2. Powers of the Foundation as the University's Agent.

(a) The Foundation shall have, with respect to the Fund, power in its discretion:

- (1) To invest and re-invest the Fund in such securities and property as are from time to time legal investments for funds of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 72-1246;
- (2) To retain property at anytime received by it;
- (3) To exercise all conversion and subscription rights pertaining to any property;

- (4) To exercise upon instruction from the University all voting rights with respect to any investment and to grant proxies, discretionary or otherwise;
- (5) To cause any investments to be registered and held in the name of one or more of its nominees, or one or more nominees of any system for the central handling of securities, without increase or decrease of liability;
- (6) To collect and receive any and all money and other property due to the Fund and to give full discharge therefor;
- (7) To commence or defend suits or legal proceedings to protect any interest of the Fund; and to represent the Fund in all suits or legal proceedings in any court or before any other body or tribunal;
- (8) To employ agents and depositories, to delegate to them discretionary powers, to compensate them for their services and to reimburse their reasonable expenses; and
- (9) Generally to do all acts, whether or not expressly authorized, which the Foundation may deem necessary or desirable for the protection of the Fund.

(b) Persons dealing with the Foundation shall be under no obligation to see to the proper application of any money paid or property delivered to the Foundation or to inquire into the Foundation's authority as to any transaction.

## Section 3. Administration and Distribution of the Minority Scholarships Fund; Scholarships Committee.

(a) The Foundation shall administer and distribute the Fund in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

- (1) The principal of the Fund shall be considered a temporary endowment to accomplish the purpose of the Act and shall be kept intact and invested and re-invested in accordance with the investment policies set forth in Section 2 of this Agreement with only the income generated therefrom, including any appreciation over and above the original amounts of principal received from the University, to be used for the purpose of minority scholarships authorized by the Act.
- (2) The Executive Vice President and Provost of the University shall promulgate an implementing policy for the Minority Scholarships Program. This implementing policy shall specify the academic performance indicators and the financial need factors that shall be considered in awarding scholarships under this program. In addition, the implementing policy shall specify the criteria to be utilized in determining whether a state of

under-representation continues to exist for each of the specified minority groups. The net income of the Fund shall be used by the University and the Foundation in accordance with the Act and the implementing policy of the Executive Vice President and Provost for both total and partial undergraduate scholarships of tuition, fees, board, room and books for eligible Black, American Indian and Hispanic students as shall be awarded by the Minority Scholarship Committee established in subsection (b) of this section.

- (3) Any net income in any academic year of the University in excess of the amount needed to award scholarships from the Fund may be re-invested and carried-over into future academic years and used for scholarships authorized by the Act and the implementing policy.
- (4) Due to the fact that impetus for enabling legislation for minority scholarships prior to the Act came in large part from creation of the R.H. "Rick" Davis Minority Scholarship Fund in the Foundation, scholarships awarded in whole or in part from the UNL -UNO Scholarships Account or the University System Scholarships Account shall be called "Davis Scholarships."
- (5) Due to the fact that impetus for the Act and prior enabling legislation for minority scholarships at the University came in large part from the diligent work of Dick C.E. Davis of Omaha and the Honorable Ernie Chambers, State Senator from the 11<sup>th</sup> Legislative District, scholarships awarded in whole or in part from the Community Colleges Transfer Scholarships Account shall be called "Davis-Chambers Scholarships."

(b) There shall be established in accordance with the Act a committee ("the Scholarships Committee") which shall award scholarships from the Fund. The Offices of Scholarships and Financial Aid at each campus of the University shall provide administrative support to the Scholarships Committee in administration of this scholarship program, including receipt of all applications and nominations for scholarships at the University for evaluation by the Committee.

**Section 4. Compensation to Foundation.** The Foundation shall be reimbursed for its expenses as the University's agent pursuant to this Agreement in the same manner it is reimbursed for administration of other endowed scholarship funds of the Foundation.

#### Section 5. Settlement of Accounts.

(a) The Foundation shall keep full accounts of all of Minority Scholarship Fund receipts and disbursements. The Foundation's books and records with respect to the Fund shall be open to inspection by the University, any Community College, the State Department of Administrative Services, and the Office of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst at all reasonable times during business hours of the Foundation.

(b) At least quarterly the Foundation shall render to the University, each Community College, the State Department of Administrative Services and the Office of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst a written report listing the assets and liabilities of the Fund, the cost and fair market value of each investment held in the Fund at the close of such quarter, all purchases (with costs), all sales (with profit or loss), any other investment changes during such quarter and a summary of the investment performance of the Fund.

(c) Within 60 days after the close of each June 30 fiscal year, or any termination of the duties of the powers of the Foundation as agent of the University, the Foundation shall prepare, sign and mail in duplicate to the University, each Community College, the State Department of Administrative Services and the Office of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst an account of its acts and transactions as trustee hereunder, showing the balance of the Fund at the beginning of such year, including a separate accounting for expenses of the Foundation relative to administration of the Fund, and the balance of the Fund at the close of such year or upon such termination. If the University finds the account to be correct, the University shall sign the instrument of settlement annexed to one counterpart of the account and return such counterpart to the Foundation, whereupon the account shall become an account stated. If within 90 days after receipt of the account or any amended account the University has not signed and returned a counterpart to the Foundation, nor filed with the Foundation notice of any objection to any act or transaction of the Foundation, the account or amended account shall become an account stated. If any objection has been filed, and if the University is satisfied that it should be withdrawn, or if the account is adjusted to its satisfaction, the University shall in writing filed with the Foundation signify its approval of the account and it shall become an account stated. When an account becomes an account stated, such account shall be finally settled, and the Foundation shall be completely discharged and released, as if such account had been settled and allowed by a judgment or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction in an action or proceeding in which the Foundation, the University, and all persons having or claiming to have any interest in the Fund were parties.

(d) The Foundation or the University shall have the right to apply at anytime to a court of competent jurisdiction for judicial settlement of any account of the Foundation not previously settled as herein above provided.

**Section 6. Removal or Resignation of the Foundation.** The University may remove the Foundation as its agent at any time upon giving the Foundation at least sixty (60) days written notice of such action. The Foundation may resign as the University's agent at any time by giving the University at least sixty (60) days written notice of such action. Until the accounts of the Foundation are settled and the Foundation is discharged as agent, it shall continue to have all the powers and discretion granted to it hereunder or conferred by law. In the event of removal or resignation of the Foundation as agent, the University shall either administer the Fund and the scholarship program itself or by written instrument appoint a new agent. Such new agent upon executing a written acceptance of its agency and upon settlement of the accounts and discharge of the Foundation as agent, shall be vested, without further act on the part of anyone, with all the powers, duties and discretion granted to the Foundation as the original agent pursuant to this Agreement.

#### Section 7. Duration and Termination of Agreement; Amendment.

(a) The Act provides that the Minority Scholarships Program is a temporary measure to continue only so long as there exists a statistically significant under-representation of Black, American Indian and Hispanic students in the undergraduate student populations of the University. Accordingly, this Agreement shall continue for such time as may be necessary to accomplish the purpose for which it was created pursuant to the Act. At such time as the Legislature shall determine that the Minority Scholarships Program should terminate, this Agreement shall terminate. Notice of such termination shall be given to the Foundation by an instrument in writing executed by the University together with a certified copy of the action of the Legislature providing for such termination.

(b) Upon termination of this Agreement, the Foundation upon written direction of the University shall liquidate the Fund to the extent required for distribution, and, after its final account has been settled as provided in Section 5, shall distribute the net balance of the Fund in such proportions and manner as the Legislature shall have directed, or in the absence of such direction, the Foundation shall distribute the net balance of the Fund to the State Treasurer. The powers of the Foundation hereunder as agent for the University shall continue so long as any assets of the Fund remain in its hands.

(c) By an instrument in writing delivered to the Foundation executed and acknowledged in the same manner as this Agreement, the University shall have the right at anytime and from time to time to amend this Agreement in whole or in part except that the duties and responsibilities of the Foundation shall not be increased with out its written consent; provided, however, that no such amendment shall divert any part of the Fund to purposes other than as provided in the Act. Any such amendment shall become effective upon (1) delivery to the Foundation of the written instrument of amendment, together with a certified copy of the resolution of the Board of Regents of the University authorizing such amendment, and (2) endorsement by the Foundation on such instrument of its receipt thereof, together with its consent thereto, if such consent is required.

**Section 8.** Prior Agreement Canceled. This Agreement replaces the prior Minority Students Scholarship Fund Agency Agreement, dated January 8, 1998, between the University and the Foundation, which prior agreement is hereby terminated and canceled.

#### Section 9. Miscellaneous.

(a) Communications to the University concerning the Fund or this Agreement shall be sent to the Vice President for Business and Finance, 3835 Holdrege, Lincoln, Nebraska 68583, or to such other address as the University may specify. Communications to the Foundation concerning the Fund or this Agreement shall be sent to the President of the Foundation,1111 Building, 1111 Lincoln Mall, Lincoln, Nebraska 68508, or to such other address as the Foundation may specify.

(b) This Agreement shall be construed and regulated by the laws of the State of Nebraska.

(c) The headings of sections in this Agreement are placed herein for convenience of reference only, and in case of conflict, the text of this Agreement, rather than such titles or headings, shall control.

#### **RP-6.6.7 Gifts, Grants and Bequests**

#### 3. Acceptance and Acknowledgment of Gifts

Basically, two types of gifts are received — those for which a specific use is designated and those for which the donor has not made any specification as to use. Any single gift in excess of \$200,000 \$400,000 must be presented to the Regents for acceptance. All other gifts may be accepted by the President, the Chancellors, or their designee provided the aforementioned criteria for award acceptance are met. Gifts so accepted must be reported to the Regents according to sections of this policy.

#### 4. Acceptance and Acknowledgment of Bequests

Bequests are received by the University of Nebraska via wills and/or trust agreements. Any single bequest of \$200,000 \$400,000 or more must be presented to the Regents for acceptance as a separate a action item. All other bequests may be accepted by the President provided the aforementioned criteria for award acceptance are met. Bequests so accepted must be reported to the Regents according to sections of this policy. All bequests are to be publicly acknowledged, and such acknowledgment is to be conveyed to the testator's family (or to the attorney handling the estate if there is no family) on a timely basis.

#### 5. Acceptance and Acknowledgment of Grants

These are awards granted in response to successful applications for such purposes as research, instruction, public service, and student aid. All grants may be accepted by the President, the Chancellors, or their designee provided the aforementioned criteria for award acceptance are met. Grants so accepted must be reported to the Regents according to sections of this policy. Grants must be acknowledged only if such acknowledgment is required as part of the award.

#### 7. Reporting of Gifts, Grants, and Bequests

All awards accepted by the President, the Chancellors, or their designee, must be reported to the Board of Regents on a quarterly basis:

a. Grants under \$50,000 \$100,000 will be reported in aggregate; those \$50,000 \$100,000 and over will be separately itemized;

b. Gifts under \$1,000 \$2,500 will be reported in aggregate; those over \$1,000 \$2,500 will be separately itemized;

c. Bequests will all be separately itemized;

d. Gifts and Bequests of \$200,000 \$400,000 and more previously accepted by the Regents during the reported quarter will be aggregated and included in the grand total so as to reflect an accurate picture of award funds flowing into the University;

e. Awards pertaining to research only will be summarized into a separate central report. This information will be reported to the Regents on a corresponding quarterly basis.

- 7. Competitive Bidding
  - e. Competitive bidding shall not be required for the following types of purchases:
    - 5) Purchases from another governmental agency or political subdivision (i) any purchasing cooperative or consortium of which the University or a major administrative unit thereof is a member, (ii) the U.S. Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof, (iii) the State of Nebraska or any agency or instrumentality thereof, (iv) a political subdivision of the State of Nebraska, (v) any governmental or public entity created by an interlocal cooperation agreement pursuant to the Nebraska Interlocal Cooperation Act, (vi) any private or public postsecondary educational institution, or (vii) any vendor pursuant a U.S. Government General Services Administration (GSA) pricing agreement; provided, however, under no circumstances shall the University be contractually obligated or liable for any purchase by another educational institution or governmental entity, or by any other member of a purchasing cooperative or consortium.

#### 12. Cooperative Purchasing

Subject to the limitations of this section, cooperative procurement and purchasing action is encouraged (a) among the major administrative units of the University, (b) with other educational units of the University, and (c) with political subdivisions and other state agencies when such action is in the best interest of the University; provided, however, under no circumstances shall the University be contractually obligated or liable for any purchase by another institution, political subdivision or state agency.

17. Prior Policy Repealed

The purchasing policies of the Board of Regents approved by the Board on February 10, 1979, are hereby repealed.

#### **RP-6.3.1 Administrative Approval of University Contracts**

#### 1. Policy References

- a. Section 6.1 of the *Bylaws of the Board of Regents <u>of the University of Nebraska</u> relating to University obligations.*
- b. Section 6.4 of the Bylaws of the *Board of Regents <u>of the University of Nebraska</u> relating to delegation of authority to the President to approve and execute certain types of University contracts.*

#### 3. Definitions

- a. Bylaws. Bylaws shall mean the Bylaws of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska.
- <u>ab</u>. <u>Contract</u>. Any deliberate written or oral engagement between the University and one or more other parties, upon a legal consideration, to do, or to abstain from doing some act.
- bc. Emergency. Circumstances where it is in the public interest for the University to immediately approve and execute a contract (a) to avoid the loss of life, health, safety, or property, (b) to respond to time limits established by persons or entities external to the University, or (c) to obtain cost savings for the University.
- ed . <u>Personal Property</u>. Any item of property which is not real property.
- <u>de</u>. <u>Procurement</u>. Any acquisition of property, equipment, goods or services by the University by purchase, lease or license from a contractor or vendor in exchange for payment of money or other consideration.
- ef . <u>Real Property</u>. Refers to land, and shall include any right, title or interest in land or any building, structure or other improvement permanently affixed to land or a building or structure.
- fg. <u>Regular Course of Business</u>. That which is required on a recurring basis in the normal day to day operations of the University.
- <u>gh</u>. <u>University-Related Use</u>. A use of University owned real property under a lease or license contract which is directly related to and supportive of a teaching, research, public service, administrative or student service function of the University. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing sentence, a University-related use shall include a licensed student service or public service concession in a University building or facility, a lease of agricultural land for a use directly related to a University teaching or research function, and a lease of space in a University building to an incubator company for the transfer of University owned technology.

#### 4. President's Administrative Authority to Approve and Execute Contracts

Pursuant to Section 6.4 of the Bylaws of the Board of Regents, the President shall have authority to approve and to execute the following types of contracts.

- a. Any contract for the procurement of services, for the procurement of non-capital goods or for the procurement of consumable supplies or commodities routinely, all used in the regular course of business in operation of the University. <u>"Non-capital goods used in the regular course of business" shall mean and include any article of personal property to be procured by the University that in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles is not carried as a capital asset of the University.</u>
- i. Any contract for the procurement, <u>deaccession or sale</u> of material to be added to <u>or removed</u> <u>from</u> the collection of any University gallery, library or museum facility in the regular course of business in operation of any such facility.

- Any contract for the procurement of personal property which (1) has a total contract price of \$250,000 \$400,000 or less, and (2) is awarded in accordance with the requirements of RP-6.2.1; provided that a written report of any such contract in excess of \$50,000 \$100,000 shall be made to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting subsequent to the award of such contract.
- n. Any contract for the procurement of personal property which (1) has a total contract price in excess of \$250,000 \$400,000, (2) is competitively bid as required by RP-6.2.1, and (3) is awarded to the lowest responsible bidder for a total contract price not exceeding the budget for such procurement as specifically approved by the Board of Regents; provided that a written report of each such contract shall be made to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting subsequent to award of the contract.
- w. Any contract of employment with a University faculty or staff member, including UNMC Terms of Employment Agreements with clinical faculty and UNMC Supplemental Compensation Agreements, for appointments and salary obligations that may be approved by the President or his or her designees under Section 3.2 of the Bylaws-of the Board of Regents; provided that a written report of the compensation and length of term of each appointment to an administrative position and to a faculty position at the rank of assistant professor and above shall be made quarterly to the Board of Regents.

#### 8. Previous Policy Repealed

The Policy of the Board of Regents entitled, "Authority to Execute Contracts," approved by the Board on November 15, 1985, is hereby revoked and repealed in its entirety.

EXPLANATION:	A projection of revenues and expenditures for the operation of residence halls was made. The rates above will generate the income required to cover obligations and modest physical enhancements for the 2001-2002 year, subject to further adjustment in March, 2001 to cover projected energy costs. If the current surge in natural gas prices does not subside by March, an upward rate adjustment will be necessary to recover energy costs. The proposed new rates (exclusive of the projected energy cost			
	increase) represent a 4.0% increase for first time residents selecting the 20-meal plan, a 4.3% increase for first-time residents selecting the 15			

meal plan, and a 4.4% increase for first-time residents selecting the 10-meal plan.

The \$72 surcharge for cable TV will cover the cost of providing cable TV service to all rooms. Students have requested this service, which all peer institutions but one provide to their students with room charge revenue. Approximately 25% of the students expected to live in residence halls next year will be returning students who will pay \$72 more because of the returning student incentive plan adopted in 1999-2000. When students move into UNK residence halls their room and board rates remain constant for each successive academic year, unless a major enhancement is provided. The cable TV initiative is such an enhancement. The average proposed rate increase for all students (new and returning) is 2.2% excluding surcharges.

The rates reflect increased costs of employee salaries and wages, employee benefits, raw food costs, telephone rates, materials and supplies, and debt service requirements. The current double room charge (20 meals/week) is the third lowest among institutions in the UNK peer group, \$833 (19%) below the average annual charge at the other ten schools.

The rates submitted for Board of Regents approval are the basic room and board charges to which all other rates are related — single rooms, family housing, etc. The percentage increase in rates for these other special contracts may be higher or lower than those stated above for the standard plans, depending upon the unique features that call for a special rate and contract.

The surcharge for wiring begun in 1999-2000 allowed the residence halls to be wired for Internet access. The surcharge of \$100 per year will end with the 2003 Fiscal Year.



EXPLANATION:	The Genoa Foundation Seed Farm near Genoa, Nebraska, in Nance County (NW ¼ Section 28-18-4 & NE ¼ Section 29-18-4), is isolated from the main Foundation Seed production activities on the Agricultural Research and Development Center (ARDC) in Mead, Nebraska. The distance between the two farms causes duplication of machinery and labor. In order to increase the economic efficiency of this auxiliary unit the operations on the farm have been closed. Seed production at this facility will be moved to the ARDC, other Research and Extension Centers, or contracted to private seed producers. The Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources wishes to dispose of the property using the sale proceeds for needed capital purchases for Foundation Seed as well as improve yearly cash flow.	
	The Genoa Foundation Seed Farm is located northwest of Genoa, Nebraska on Highway # 39. Highway #39 crosses the farm at a diagonal forming an East parcel and a West parcel.	
	The East parcel consists of 131.73 acres of dryland farm with a large mature shelterbelt located along the north and south property lines. An area located in the west central part of the parcel that parallels the highway also has mature trees and grass.	
	The West parcel consists of 180.39 acres with an irrigation well. This parcel has a set of improvements on the property consisting of a metal building used as an office, shop and seed storage and handling area; a pole type building used for machinery storage; and five smaller permanent grain storage bins.	
	A professional appraisal has been made of the property, with recommendations of selling the farm as two separate parcels.	
	Prior to the Board of Regents meeting, a report of the estimated value of the property as shown in the appraisal will be made to the Board by a privileged and confidential attorney-client communication from the General Counsel as authorized by Neb. Rev. Stat. 84-712.05 (4)(6).

PREVIOUS ACTION:	No previous action has taken place.
EXPLANATION:	The University of Nebraska Medical Center proposes to remodel approximately 4,000 square feet of the College of Dentistry located on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus. The proposed project will relocate the central sterile and dispensing functions to the first level of the college, relocate and remodel space for those displaced, and provide a service elevator for the transport of dental materials to the second level clinics.
	The goal for this proposed project is to provide a central sterile and dispensing area to meet current code requirements and infection control standards. ## I. GENERAL INFORMATION

#### A. Brief Project Description

The proposed project will remodel approximately 4,000 gross square feet of the College of Dentistry located on the University of Nebraska at Lincoln campus. This project will relocate the Central Sterile and Dispensing facility to larger quarters on the First Level of the college, relocate those functions displaced by the move and provide a new service elevator for the transport of sterile materials between the first and second levels of the college. The new location will allow for separation of soiled and sterile materials and a dedicated dispensing area.

#### B. Summary of Major Project Goals and Objectives

The goal for this project is to provide a Central Sterile and Dispensing area that meets accreditation requirements, and current code and infection control standards. Relocation and remodeling will correct current deficiencies and facilitate continued accreditation of the College of Dentistry. The new service elevator will provide direct access for the transporting of equipment, materials and supplies to all clinics.

## C. Project Need and Justification

## 1. Personnel Projections

It is anticipated that one part-time (.5) employee will be added to provide help for the preparation and transport of materials between floors and the dental clinics.

## 3. Information About Similar Projects at Peer Institutions

Members of the UNMC College of Dentistry Steering Committee have visited the following institutions:

- Saint Louis University Graduate Dental Clinic, St. Louis, Missouri.
- NOVA College of Dentistry, Fort Lauderdale, Florida.
- Creighton University College of Dentistry, Omaha, Nebraska.

The site visits were an invaluable opportunity to see first hand how these institutions were solving the same type of issues and problems. They also were an opportunity to see new methods and see state of the art facilities for delivering dental care.

## D. Summary of the Background and History of the Project

The current initiative to improve the College of Dentistry Central Sterile was first conceived in early 1999 as an outgrowth of the need to meet American Dental Association accreditation standards. Serious deficiencies have accumulated over the last 10 years. The original Central Sterile area and layout is essentially unchanged since it was constructed in 1967. Deteriorating equipment, changes in the sterilization process, clinical instrumentation and patient care combined with a shortage of floor space have precipitated the need to replace the Central Sterile and Dispensing facility. This situation has reached the point where action will need to be taken for the College to maintain accreditation. An accreditation review committee visited the Central Sterile and Dispensing areas.

## E. Master Plan Compliance

This project is not identified in the latest UNL Master Plan for the East Campus. However, this project is the first phase of a UNMC master plan for complete renovation of the College of Dentistry building which has now been in service for over 30 years.

## F. Describe Other Alternative(s) Considered

- Do nothing and risk loss of accreditation. This was deemed to be an unacceptable risk for the College and University.
- Remodel the existing Central Sterile in its present location. It would be very difficult and expensive to keep the present Central Sterile functioning during construction. The existing space would need to be totally demolished, expanded and reconfigured with no adjacent space available in the existing clinic spaces. Temporary relocation would be disruptive and expensive.

• Relocate Central Sterile to a new location on the upper level. There is already a serious shortage of space on the upper level. Additionally, locating the Central Sterile functions on this level would be incompatible with the long range master plan for renovating the clinical areas.

## G. Physical and Functional Facility Deficiencies

- The present Central Sterile and Dispensing areas are undersized and do not meet regulations and current guidelines.
- Soiled and sterile materials are currently handled in the same room and must be separated.
- Dispensing should be separate and distinct from sterile processing.
- The existing instrument washing and sterilizing equipment is obsolete and has reached the end of useful life. Breakdowns are common, parts are not available and some units must be replaced. Casework is worn and deteriorating.
- There is currently insufficient area for operations staff and for the storage of sterile materials.

Functionally, existing deficiencies are extensive and beyond reasonable repair. Presently, cleaning, decontamination, sterilization and dispensing are all occurring within a single 660 square foot area. The job of maintaining high quality processing of instruments according to current standards is impossible in the present configuration required by limited space.



Limited improvements in furnishings and floor coverings have commenced. However, expanding these improvement projects is essential to upgrade facilities that are seriously showing their age. Improvements are essential to maintaining the long-term viability of these residence halls as part of NCTA's student housing program. The \$157 increase (exclusive of the Special Enhancement Assessment) represents a 5% increase from 2000-2001. This increase will generate the revenue required to cover salary and ongoing general operating increases, including projected cafeteria cost increases in food and maintenance necessary to meet food service health and safety standards. All increases combined will take monthly room and board rates for next year from approximately \$349 per month to approximately \$392 per month.

# Project Scope

This project will add a new Central Utility Plant to University of Nebraska Medical Center campus to supplement the existing central utility plant in support of campus growth. This plant will increase existing system reliability, will provide opportunities for improvements in energy costs and efficiencies, and will provide capacity to serve new campus loads. The structure will house central chilled water generation and distribution equipment, emergency electrical generation and distribution equipment, and normal power switching and distribution equipment. This plant will be designed to expand in the future resulting in a facility that can grow with increasing campus needs. The facility will meet the near term increase in campus utility needs. The current facility construction generating the increase in load is the Research Center of Excellence Building. The facility will be connected to the camp us central distribution systems via extensions to existing utility tunnels and electrical ductbank systems. The siting of the plant will allow for significant campus and facility growth with minimal changes to the distribution infrastructure. The required new distribution infrastructure associated with this plant will be sized to accommodate significant future growth of the facility. These growing needs include greater utilization of utilities in existing facilities through the widespread use of electronics and increased utility loading due to new construction on campus.

# **Changes from Program Statement**

- ?? The overall size of the building has been increased from 13,000 gsf to 17,433 gsf to support optimal facility layout and modular future growth of the facility. This change did not effect the overall budget of the project.
- ?? Finishing of the Control Room, Locker room and Lunchroom is deferred until a future boiler plant addition project requires on-site personnel.
- ?? The initiation and completion schedule of the project was accelerated by 3 months.
- ?? The operational and maintenance budget was reduced from \$96,950 to \$57,510.






