3.12.2 - **Disability Retirement**.

An employee, regardless of age, is eligible for a disability retirement should a physical or mental disabilities prevent such employee from satisfactorily performing work. A Disability Retirement will allow a

disabled employee to receive university retiree benefits.

Approval of a A Disability Retirement is predicated on 1) the disabled employee's obtainment of a Social Security Disability Award, or 2) long term disability benefits approval by the group long term disability insurance company. In addition, university administration may also approve a Disability Retirement when good cause is otherwise established. in certain situations. In addition, Disability Retirements for academic/administrative staff and faculty must be

approved by the Board of Regents.

SUBJECT: NU Educational Broadband Services (EBS) License Lease

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve 30 year lease of University owned Omaha EBS Licenses.

PREVIOUS ACTION: None.

EXPLANATION: The University of Nebraska owns EBS licenses in Omaha, Lincoln,

Grand Island/Hastings and Kearney. These EBS licenses are Federal Communications Commission (FCC) controlled, "licensed" airwave frequencies restricted to the University's designated use. These licenses are only given out to educational institutions and the University must provide a minimum level of "substantial educational use", currently defined as 20 hours of use per channel per week, otherwise, the channels revert to the FCC. There are also requirements for the holders to make certain investments to retain the licenses, investments that are not feasible for the University to make as these channels have no/low usage value to the University and other technologies provide better throughput for our needs. However, telephone companies can use these channels to provide extensive data services provided they are willing to invest in the necessary equipment.

Due to the extensive investment needed to provide 4th generation data services on these licenses/frequencies, the FCC extended the maximum lease period to be 30 years as vendors were not able to recover their investment within shorter lease periods. Current University plans do not include an extensive investment in these technologies that would compete with the services provided by the cell phone industry. This is especially true in the rural states assigned to these licenses.

These agreements have been reviewed by the General Counsel and by specialized external "subject matter expert" counsel.

University will earn approximately \$2,200,000 plus data services over the 30 year period.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

July 18, 2013 – The Board of Regents approved the project budget and authorized the President to execute related agreements for the CRES system.

September 14, 2012 – The Board of Regents approved the Property Transfer Agreement between the Board of Regents, the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation (NICDC), and Nebraska Nova LLC and allow the Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, in consultation with the President and General Counsel to enter into the condominium documents, the Owner's Representative Agreement and the other Closing Documents referenced in the Property Transfer Agreement.

January 27, 2012 – The Board of Regents authorized the President to approve an Exchange Agreement on terms and conditions approved by the General Counsel between UNL, the City and the NICDC to better facilitate the development and operation of NIC and the Theresa Street Treatment Plant Site.

September 10, 2010 – The Board of Regents approved the Master Lease between the Board and the NICDC for the land to be formally designated the Nebraska Innovation Campus.

November 20, 2009 – The Board of Regents approved the Master Plan and Business Plan for Nebraska Innovation Campus (NIC).

EXPLANATION:

The Centralized Renewable Energy System (CRES) is an innovative approach to providing heating and cooling to buildings at Nebraska Innovation Campus (NIC). The CRES is a novel concept that is in use in only a handful of locations and this project would rank as one of the largest in the United States.

Under this concept, the City of Lincoln's treated wastewater normally discharged to Salt Creek is captured and used as a source to provide cooling or heating. The wastewater is from 57° to 75° depending on the season. Using heat exchangers, the thermal energy (i.e., cooling or heating) is transferred from the "gray water" piping to a clean "tenant water" pipe system in each tenant building. The gray water and tenant water do not mix. The circulating tenant water then heats and cools the building. Per estimates by engineering consultants, CRES provides 30% greater efficiency and electrical energy savings compared to geothermal. The system will have the capacity to heat and cool approximately 1.8 million square feet of office and lab space.

The project will be funded by a combination of a loan from the University of Nebraska Foundation, UNL cash funds, and bond financing through Nebraska Utility Corporation (NUCorp). The project qualifies for special federal bond financing program called Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds (QECB's).

Under the QECB program, bonds floated for defined conservation "demonstration projects," like the CRES, will have interest costs rebated back to the governmental entity/owner who issues the debt up to 70% of a benchmark rate (currently 5.2% equating to a 3.6% rebate). The project qualifies for about \$5,500,000 million of QECB financing. Accordingly, this action would approve the issuance of up to \$5,500,000 million of such bonds by NUCorp. The Foundation loan or cash funds advanced will bear interest up to 5.25% on balances outstanding and will be repaid to the extent of free cash flows after required sinking fund payments on the bonds.

NUCorp (taxable) bonds funding the project, not to exceed \$5,500,000, at a total interest cost not to exceed 6%, will be issued with a final maturity of up to 23 years. Current bond market conditions would provide an average interest rate of approximately 5%. The Bonds will be sold by Ameritas through either negotiated sale or be privately placed.

Operationally, rates will be determined annually by NUCorp and the accounting for the CRES, which is in essence a utility, will be performed by Lincoln Electric System, who performs a similar function for the existing NUCorp operations. Energy use will be metered and monitored at each tenant building and billed to tenants by the developer or NUCorp. The City of Lincoln will be reimbursed their costs of system monitoring as will UNL who will manage the NIC portion of the CRES.

Once all indebtedness has been repaid and provision has been made for future capital improvements and operating and maintenance needs, one-third of free cash flow goes to the City for payment for effluent while the remaining two-thirds will be paid to UNL.

The financing was reviewed and recommended for approval by the Business Affairs Committee.

EXPLANATION: The Centralized Renewable Energy System (CRES) is an innovative

approach to providing heating and cooling to buildings at Nebraska

Innovation Campus (NIC).

Under this concept, thermal energy is captured from treated waste water

using technology similar to geo thermal heat pumps. Using heat

exchangers, the thermal energy (i.e., cooling or heating) is transferred to

a clean circulating loop to heat and cool building sites at NIC.

Under the terms of the fifty year agreement, the City wastewater system adjacent to the Nebraska Innovation Campus will provide treated effluent from its Theresa Street Wastewater facility. In exchange for providing the treated wasterwater, net cash flow remaining after operating expenses, debt service and other costs will be shared with 33% payable to the city and the remainder to the University. NUCorp will have a role in financing the CRES project and will act as trustee of the CRES' physical plant until such time as the related bonds are retired.

Rates for the CRES will be benchmarked to comparable utility rates for gas in the winter and electricity in the summer.

The Agreement provides for the City to retain control of the reclaimed water and related CRES components, lines and equipment at all times including easements for the City's lines in the heat exchanger building where the BTU's are captured.

The CRES improvements will be completed under a Site Development Lease utilizing an Owner's Representative Agreement in a manner similar to the University owned portion of the former 4-H building. The July 18, 2013 Board of Regents approval authorized CRES-related agreements to be executed by the President. However, because of applicable law, this Agreement with the City requires the specific approval of the full Board of Regents

The University/Community Facility will be the new home to the UNO Mavericks hockey team, men's and women's basketball and volleyball

and serve as an assembly venue for 7,500 fans and patrons.

To be located south of Center Street between 64th Street and the Little Papio Creek, the facility will anchor the southern boundary of UNO's campus, establishing a focal point for the neighborhood and a destination for the community.

EXPLANATION:

The facility will be designed to serve multiple activities, weaving together a venue with a shared purpose of athletics and community functions.

The University/Community Facility will consist of a primary seating split-bowl surrounding an 85' x 200' NHL ice sheet with general seating, student seating, club and suite seating. The upper main bowl will also provide facilities for the press. Surrounding and adjacent to the bowl seating will be fan amenities including concessions, restrooms, and points of sale. The facility will also house support facilities for the home and visiting teams, as well as support elements for graduations, lectures, and concerts.

A second sheet of ice, approximately 17,000 square feet, will highlight the facility. As a community amenity, the ice will be available for public use and will include support facilities for public skating. The community sheet may be programmed for activities such as open skate, lessons, and club hockey. The second sheet will also be available for the UNO Mavericks to use as practice ice, allowing the main bowl to be used for additional University and community activities.

The Project has strategic significance to UNO. It will provide an anchor on the Center Street campus and provide an on-campus venue for their Division 1 programs in hockey, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. It is also an important element in the campus' plans to grow to 20,000 students by the year 2020.

The original concept for the facility anticipated a single bowl design. Based on input by peers and the community, a more used and useful facility would be a double bowl design. The change in budget will be funded by donations, facilities revenues, and cash funds to cover the additional costs of the improved two-bowl facility. Additionally, the original budget approved by the Board included \$6,300,000 for City infrastructure. Since this will be paid for by the City and is not part of the Project, that cost and related funding has been removed from the amended budget.

The Project is being funded with facilities revenues, private donations, and cash funds that will be used to pay for Bonds issued for purposes of constructing the Project. The Bonds will have three major tranches as follows:

- A portion to bridge multi-year pledges by donors to the Project that will occur over the next five to ten years,
- a tranche up to thirty years to be repaid by net facilities revenues and
- although the cost of City infrastructure is not included in the project budget, a portion to bridge multi-year funding from the City that will occur over a number of years.

The University of Nebraska Facilities Corporation Bonds issued to fund the project will be issued with a final maturity of up to 30 years. Current bond market conditions would provide a true interest cost of approximately 4.32% on the Bonds. The annual debt service (principal and interest) for the Bonds will match the anticipated receipt of the donations, the portion funded by facilities revenues, and the anticipated funding to be received from the City.

The financing also has been reviewed and is recommended for approval by the Business Affairs Committee.

The University of Nebraska is a four-campus, public university which was created and exists today to serve Nebraskans through quality teaching, research, and outreach and engagement. We strive to be the best public university in the country as measured by the impact we have on our people and our state, and through them, the world. To do that, we must compete effectively with other institutions around the world for talented students and faculty. The future of Nebraska is closely tied to that of its only public university, and this framework guides university-wide and campus planning to help build and sustain a Nebraska that offers its citizens educational and economic opportunity and a high quality of life.

The framework consists of six overarching goals emphasizing access and affordability, quality academic programs, workforce and economic development, research growth, engagement with the state, and accountability. Each goal has a number of related objectives, strategies and accountability measures developed for Board and university-wide monitoring over a multi-year period. Companion documents include an implementation tool with metrics and the schedule for monitoring by the Board, as well as a dashboard reflecting progress.

The university's efforts will not be limited to these priorities, as we expect to be able to measure progress in other areas given the interrelatedness of the objectives, other priorities of the Board and the President, and the ongoing strategic planning efforts of the four campuses. Campus plans are consistent with this framework and operate within its broader goals. Each campus has established a set of quality indicators that provide a means to evaluate achievement and momentum related to its principal objectives.

- 1. The University of Nebraska will provide the opportunity for Nebraskans to enjoy a better life through access to high quality, affordable undergraduate, graduate and professional education.
 - a. The university will strive to increase affordability and ensure qualified students are not denied access based on economic circumstances.
 - i. Secure state funding sufficient to support access to high quality programs.
 - ii. Keep tuition increases moderate and predictable for students and families, consistent with goals of both access and quality.
 - iii. Expand need-based financial aid and effectively market opportunity and major aid programs (e.g. Collegebound Nebraska, Buffett Scholars, Thompson Learning Communities).
 - b. Increase the percentage of Nebraska high school graduates (the state "college-going rate") who enroll at and graduate from the university.
 - i. Increase enrollment, consistent with quality imperatives, to serve Nebraska's goals for increased educational attainment.
 - ii. Increase each campus's undergraduate freshman-to-sophomore retention rate each year, with a goal of exceeding the average of its peer institutions.
 - iii. Increase each campus's undergraduate six-year graduation rate, with a goal of exceeding the average of its peer institutions.
 - c. Increase the diversity of those who enroll at and graduate from the university, employing measures permitted by state and federal law.
 - i. Engage in partnerships with other higher education institutions, K-12, and the private sector to increase diversity of students who seek a post-secondary education, employing measures permitted by state and federal law.
 - d. Expand lifelong educational opportunities, including those for non-traditional and transfer students.
 - e. Promote adequate student preparation for success in higher education.
 - i. Engage in pilot programs with Nebraska high schools for development of high school academies in partnership with the university.
 - *ii.* Provide timely and usable information to middle school students, parents, teachers and school administrators.

- f. Promote ease of transfer to the university from other higher education institutions.
 - i. Improve programs for transfer from community colleges, state colleges and other higher education institutions.
- g. Expand distance education programs, taking advantage of university-wide marketing and efficiencies and campus role and mission, strengths and entrepreneurship.
 - i. The University will offer a variety of its academic programs by distance education through Online Worldwide in an effort to provide access to the University of Nebraska to the people of the state and beyond the boundaries of the state who are unable to enroll in programs offered only on campus.
- 2. The University of Nebraska will build and sustain undergraduate, graduate and professional programs of high quality with an emphasis on excellent teaching.
 - a. Recruit and retain exceptional faculty and staff, with special emphasis on building and sustaining diversity.
 - i. To help ensure competitiveness, faculty salaries and incentives (awarded on the basis of merit) and fringe benefits should exceed the average of peer institutions.
 - ii. Develop and maintain programs to enhance work/life conditions of faculty and staff, including overall campus climate.
 - iii. Each campus shall endeavor to meet the university's ongoing commitments to faculty diversity, employing measures permitted by state and federal law.
 - iv. Increase support for professorships and named/distinguished chairs.
 - b. Pursue excellence through focus on targeted programs in areas of importance to Nebraska where the university can be a regional, national and/or international leader (e.g. agriculture and natural resources, life sciences, information technology and architectural engineering).
 - i. Programs of Excellence funding shall be increased when practicable and results of allocations shall be periodically reviewed for impact.
 - ii. Resource allocation shall take advantage of distinct campus roles and missions to achieve overall university goals.
 - iii. Campuses are encouraged to collaborate to achieve overall university goals.
 - c. Provide opportunities for global engagement of faculty through international teaching, research and outreach exchanges, fellowships and collaborations.
 - i. Increase faculty participation in Fulbright and related programs.

- 3. The University of Nebraska will play a critical role in building a talented, competitive workforce and knowledge-based economy in Nebraska in partnership with the state, private sector and other educational institutions.
 - a. Work to stem and reverse the out-migration of graduates and knowledge workers.
 - b. Increase proportion of the most talented Nebraska high school students who attend the University of Nebraska.
 - i. Increase enrollment of Nebraska students ranked in top 25% of their high school class.
 - ii. Increase support for merit-based scholarships.
 - c. To attract talent to the state, increase the number of nonresident students who enroll at the university.
 - i. Increase enrollment of nonresident undergraduate students at UNL, UNO and UNK
 - d. To adequately prepare students for the global economy, significantly increase opportunities for international study and engagement.
 - i. Significantly increase the number of undergraduates studying abroad, with the goal of ultimately providing the opportunity for every undergraduate to study abroad.
 - *ii.* Significantly increase the number of international undergraduates and graduates studying at the university.
 - e. Encourage and facilitate the commercialization of research and technology to benefit Nebraska.
 - f. Develop and strengthen internship and service learning opportunities with business, education, government, military, and nonprofit organizations.
 - g. Engage in partnerships with government and the private sector to develop regional economic strength.
 - h. Pursue excellence in educational attainment aligned with the long-term interests of the state.
 - i. Analyze areas of future workforce demand, including job and self-employment opportunities in non-growth rural communities and economically disadvantaged urban areas, and strengthen or develop curricula and programs appropriate to the university in alignment with those areas.
 - ii. Develop educational programs that prepare students for the flexibility required to respond to the uncertainty of future workforce demands.

- iii. Develop distance education and other educational programs that permit Nebraskans to prepare for jobs and opportunities to meet future workforce demands.
- 4. The University of Nebraska will pursue excellence and regional, national and international competitiveness in research and scholarly activity, as well as their application, focusing on areas of strategic importance and opportunity.
 - a. Increase external support for research and scholarly activity.
 - i. Increase federal support for instruction, research and development, and public service.
 - ii. Inventory and forecast infrastructure (physical facilities, information technology, equipment) necessary to support continued growth in research activity and secure private and public support to eliminate deficiencies.
 - b. Increase undergraduate and graduate student participation in research and its application.
 - c. Encourage and support interdisciplinary, intercampus, inter-institutional and international collaboration.
 - d. Improve the quantity and quality of research space through public and private support.
 - e. Focus resources on areas of strength in research where the university has the opportunity for regional, national and international leadership and in areas of strategic importance to the health and economic strength of Nebraska (e.g. agriculture and life sciences; natural resources, especially water; prevention and cure of diseases such as cancer; and early childhood education).

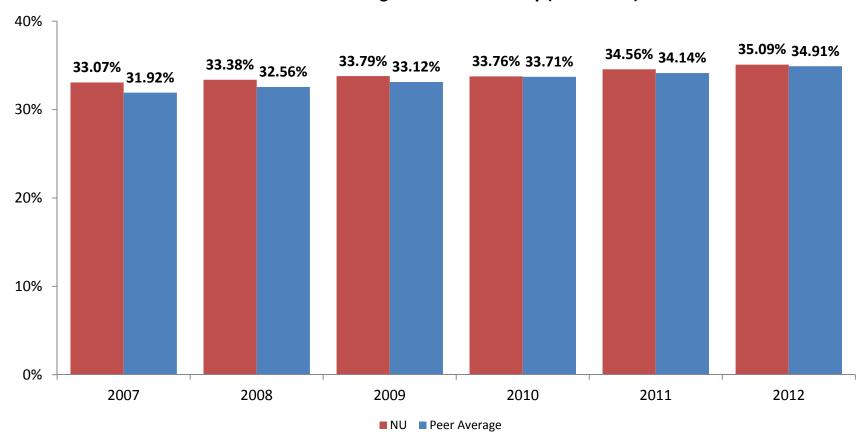

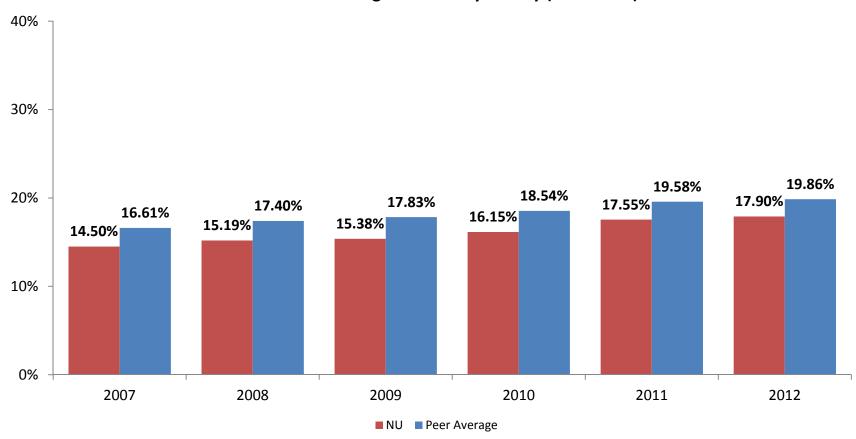
NU-Wide Percentage of Women Faculty (2007-2012)



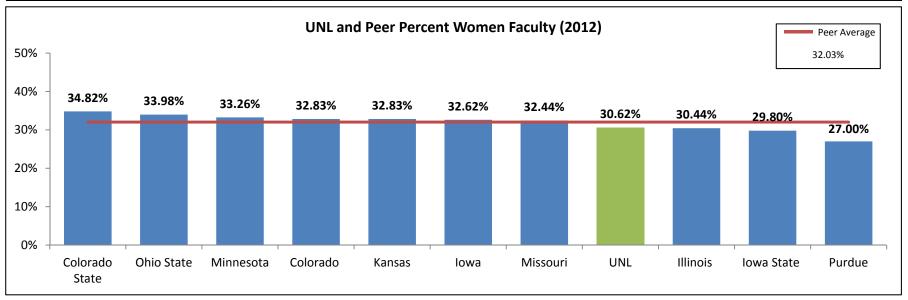

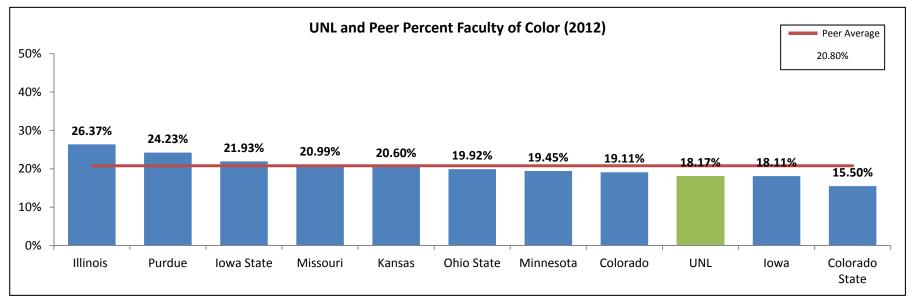

NU-Wide Percentage of Minority Faculty (2007-2012)

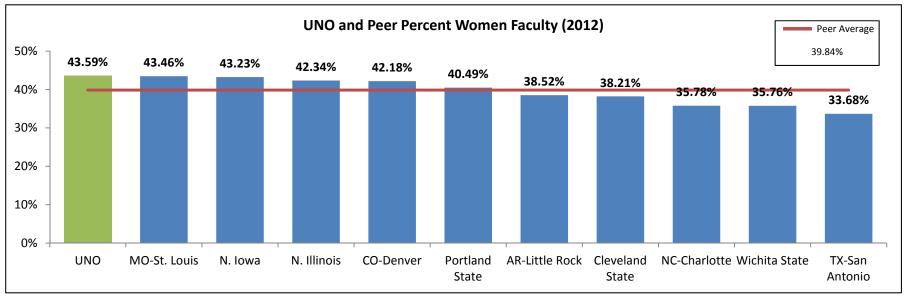


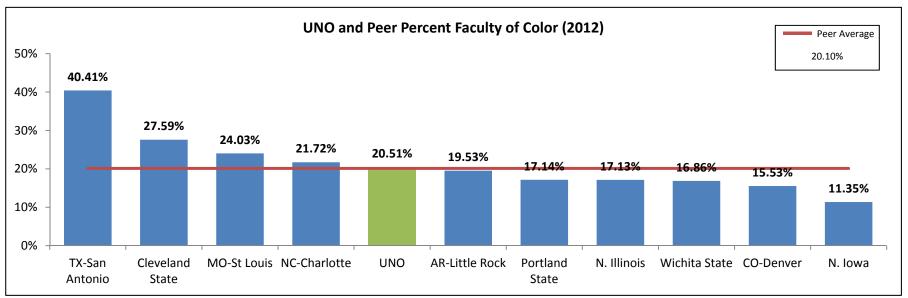
