RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve amendment to *Board of Regents' Policy 6.3.1, 4. v.*, which requires semi-annual reporting of technology licenses to a single annual report from University Technology Development Corporation

PREVIOUS ACTION: December 10, 1994 - The Board of Regents adopted *Board of Regents' Policy 6.3.1*, which provides regulation and guidance with respect to contract administration and execution. This policy has been updated a number of times since its adoption, most recently on January 27, 2012, to meet the evolving contract administration needs of the University.

EXPLANATION: Current *Board of Regents' Policy 6.3.1* requires a semi-annual report of certain contracts and licenses. The method of reporting these licenses and contracts has historically been a listing of contracts.

The Board of the University Technology Development Corporation, the entity created by the Board of Regents to exercise oversight of the respective campus' technology transfer operations, receives an annual report that benchmarks the licensing of technology. The report contains year-over-year comparators and other information that is deemed an improvement when compared to the current reporting. That report is included under the reports section of this agenda and is in the proposed format to be used henceforth to provide an annual reporting to the Board (versus the current bi-annual report). This format better demonstrates progress and trends in this strategic area.

Accordingly, in order to better meet the Board of Regents' reporting needs related to technology transfer licenses, reporting requirements under *Board of Regents' Policy 6.3.1, 4.v.* is amended as shown below.

4. President's Administrative Authority to Approve and Execute Contracts

Pursuant to Section 6.4 of the *Bylaws*, the President shall have authority to approve and to execute the following types of contracts....

v. Any contract (1) granting a license or assigning the right to grant a license in any University technology as part of the transfer of such technology for commercial purposes, or (2) granting a sponsorship of any intercollegiate athletic sport or activity of the University for a total fee not exceeding \$4,000,000, including the grant of a license or right to use University trademarks, trade names, or logographics in connection

therewith, provided that an ~~semi~~-annual written report of all such contracts shall be made to the Board of Regents at a public meeting of the Board, in such format and including such information as may be requested.

PREVIOUS ACTION: June 13, 2008 – The Board of Regents approved a 13-year media rights agreement between UNL Athletics and IMG by superseding and replacing IMG’s contract which expired July 31, 2011.

August 3, 2003 – The Board of Regents approved an exclusive license of certain media rights with Pinnacle Sports Productions, including radio broadcast, distribution of coaches’ television shows produced by UNL’s HuskerVision studios; and rights to sell advertising in the football programs distributed at home UNL football games through July 31, 2011.

EXPLANATION: Per *Board of Regents Bylaws 3.4.5*, Board approval of employees’ outside employment is required under certain circumstances. Mr. Jeff Griesch is employed by UNL Athletics Media Relations as an Operations Director. He is the primary media contact for the Nebraska women’s basketball and women’s golf programs and he also is the Director of Media Relations with student athletes.

In addition to his position at UNL, Mr. Griesch is also employed by IMG Husker Sports Network as a radio color commentator for UNL Women’s Basketball and as a TV show host for The Connie Yori Show. IMG Husker Sports Network is an affiliate of IMG, a company under which UNL Athletics has a media rights agreement. Mr. Griesch’s outside employment with IMG does not interfere with his primary UNL duties and responsibilities and Mr. Griesch is not involved in the contract negotiations or daily oversight of the IMG contract.

EXPLANATION: Following the 1999 purchase of and prior to razing the Sigma Alpha Mu house, UNL had a survey conducted in preparation for redeveloping the newly purchased area as part of UNL’s City Campus. The survey identified various areas of encroachment within Lot 12, Fairfield’s Sub of Lot 11, S.W. Little’s Sub from the neighboring fraternity (Delta Tau Delta). The encroachment areas were identified as a portion of the fire escape stairwell, a portion of the fraternity house structure (northwest corner), a wooden fence, and an outdoor fire place structure. At the time of the purchase, UNL and the neighboring property owner, Delta Tau Delta, did not resolve these property issues.

The Delta Tau Delta Fraternity has offered to purchase a portion of Lot 12, Fairfield’s Sub of Lot 11, S.W. Little’s Sub, to address the encroachment issues and the University has agreed to sell approximately 0.05 acres of said lot to the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity for \$12,500 with covenants, restrictions and agreements outlined in the Quitclaim Deed.

A map showing the area being sold to the fraternity is attached.

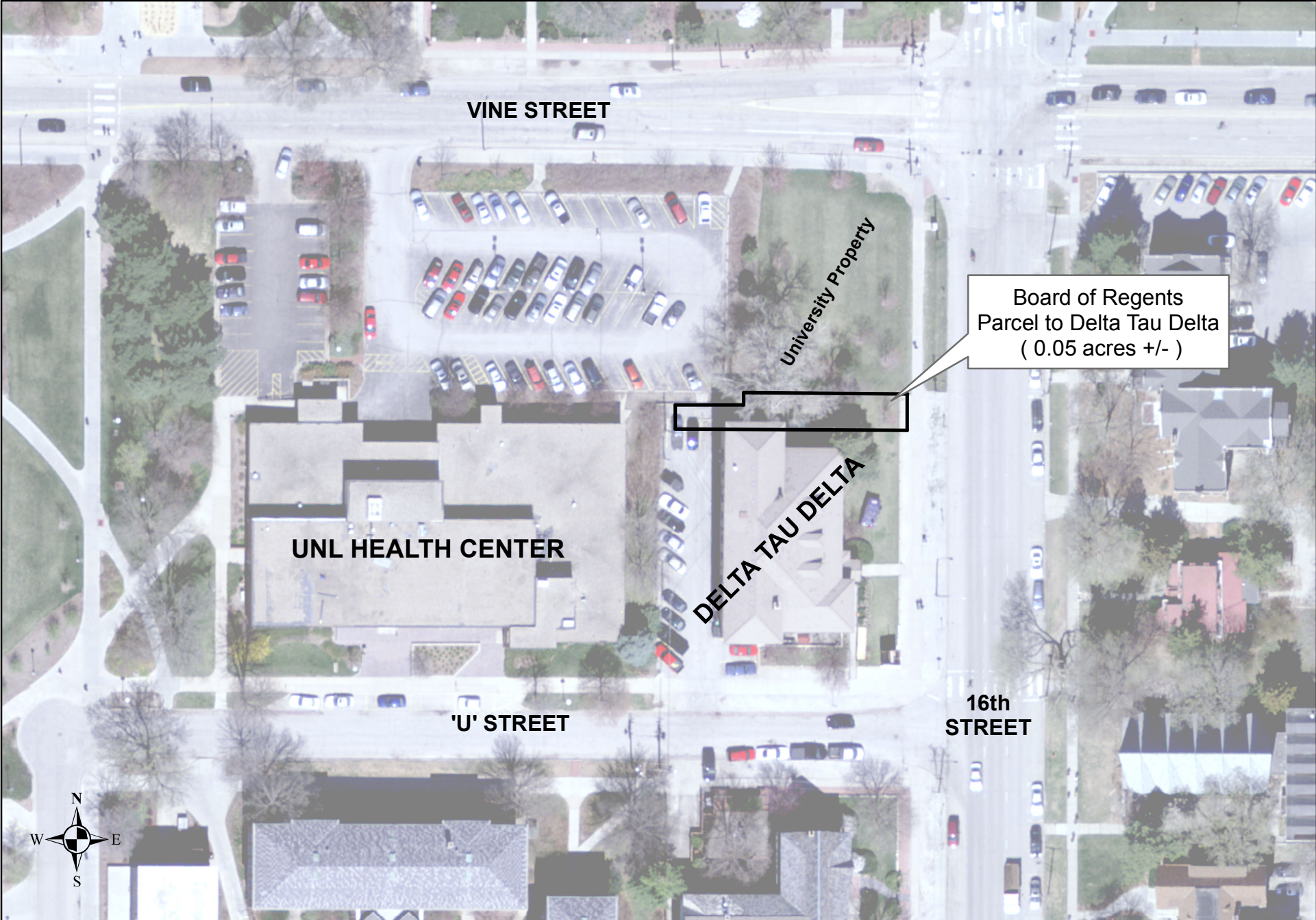

SUBJECT: Provision of Official Residence of the President

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the return to the practice of providing an Official Residence of the President from support received from the University of Nebraska Foundation.

(a) The Board of Regents supports re-establishing the Official Residence of the President, to be supported by non-state funds.

(b) The Board delegates to the Executive Committee authority for agreement with the University of Nebraska Foundation regarding an official residence, to be supported by funds provided by the University of Nebraska Foundation. Any such agreement, together with conforming changes, such as elimination of provision for housing allowance and related benefits in the president's contract, shall be reported to the Board.

PREVIOUS ACTION: January 19, 1996 – Official President's Residence destroyed by fire; had not been used as Official Residence for nearly two years and occasionally used for University events.

February 13, 1993 – Board policy amended to provide for housing allowances for president and chancellors in place of official residences.

EXPLANATION: It has long been the policy of the Board of Regents to provide support for housing to carry out functions of president of the university. Until the Official Residence was destroyed by fire in 1996, the university provided such an official residence.

After consideration of current and future university needs as well as review of the practices of comparable universities, the executive committee of the Board recommends the university to return to the practice of providing an Official Residence for the president. A survey of practices with regard to presidential housing at comparable institutions is attached hereto as Appendix A.

Upon agreement with the Foundation and the Board of Regents Executive Committee, this action will constitute the approval of the Official Residence of the President and also authorize other conforming changes to the current President's Contract of Employment as recommended by legal counsel, approved by the Chair and agreed to by the President. The Board has determined that the duties performed by the President at the Official Residence are clearly significant, not merely incidental, and the Official Residence is considered to be on the premises

of the University of Nebraska for any related business purposes. The Official Residence is to be provided in lieu of the provision of a housing allowance and related benefits in *Board of Regents Policy* RP-6.2.6.

EXPLANATION: The University of Nebraska proposes to renovate 31,200 gross square feet of the United States Property and Fiscal Office (USPFO) Building. The building is located at 1234 Military Road, Lincoln, Nebraska, on the former state Military Property.

The renovated building will allow for co-location of the functional and technical teams of Computing Services Networking (CSN), the Administrative Systems Group (ASG) and the Nebraska Student Information System (NeSIS) group. The three groups are responsible for the maintenance and continual improvement of the University's SAP R/3 financial system as well as the central repository of all student data.

The building renovation will include a new sprinkler system and fire main, HVAC equipment, ductwork and controls, lighting, roof, gutters and downspouts, new finishes, including carpet, tile, paint, and acoustical ceilings and flood-proofing the lower level. The site provides adequate parking, which will be resurfaced along with demolition of the existing fence, out-building and gate-house.

The program statement and budget have been reviewed and are recommended for approval by the Business Affairs Committee.

Funds for this project were requested as part of the University's 2013 capital budget request.

1. Introduction

a. Background and History

The university has looked for a permanent placement for administrative computing since its inception in the early 1980s, while locating the units in subleased space in Nebraska Hall and now at 56th and O. Various options have been pursued, but in the final analysis none provided permanency for a reasonable cost. When the opportunity arose to purchase the Military Property, the buildings were toured. The United States Property and Fiscal Office (USPFO) Building would allow the university to not only find a permanent ‘home’ for administrative computing, bring together the functional and technical teams serving the four university and three state college campuses, but do so at an auction price.

Executive Memorandum No. 11 outlined the Goals and Policies for Computing at the University of Nebraska (NU), separating academic and administrative computing. The administrative arm of computing and intercampus data communications provider for the University of Nebraska developed into what is known as Computing Services Networking (CSN).

CSN partners with the campus Information Technology offices to provide reliable, experienced and secure information services and support, as well as maintains efficient and cost-effective technology in support of University-wide decision-making, reporting and planning processes.

July 1, 1999, Computing Services implemented SAP in response to Y2K and aging financial systems. In 2001, the Administrative Systems Group (ASG) was formed as a separate group to prioritize and implement business initiatives. The ASG project team is tasked with maintenance and continual improvement of the University’s SAP R/3 system.

In 2008, the governor signed an appropriation to fund a joint student information system as well as a resource planning system for the state colleges. As part of the implementation of the resource system, ASG worked closely with their counterparts at the Nebraska State College

System (NSCS) to migrate and improve financial and HR practices. At the same time, the Nebraska Student Information System (NeSIS) group was formed to develop, implement and manage the central repository of all student data, shared in common by NU and NCSC.

b. Project Description

The proposed project will renovate approximately 31,200 gross square foot of the “USPFO Building” located on Military Road to allow co-location of the functional and technical teams of CSN, ASG and NeSIS. In addition, site work including fence, out-building and gate-house removal and parking lot resurfacing will be undertaken.

The USPFO Building is a 42,722 gross square foot (gsf) structure that includes a 10,800 square foot open warehouse that will be used by UNL and is not part of the project. The remaining 31,922 gsf consists of a ‘split level’ structure; the original office portion constructed on three levels and enclosed warehouse constructed on one. The basement level (722 gsf) of the original office portion houses the boiler and is not included in the project.

The National Guard facilities group was kind enough to share five years of maintenance orders as well as operating and maintenance costs with the university. Based upon that information, the life of existing systems and current codes, it was decided to budget for the following upgrades:

- Sprinkler system and new fire main
- New HVAC equipment, ductwork and controls
- New lighting
- New roof, gutters and downspouts
- ADA compliant restrooms and showers
- New finishes, including carpet, tile, paint, and acoustical ceilings
- Flood-proofing lower level exterior wall and flood protection gates

The new HVAC system will require a mechanical room and while potentially larger than needed, the 2,235 gsf second floor will be designated for that purpose, eliminating the need for an elevator to make the floor accessible. The end result is renovation of a 29,865 gsf floor plate that includes an existing breakroom, computer room, locker rooms, files/workroom and storage vault.

FEMA requirements dictate flood protection when renovation costs exceed 50% of appraised value. We will attempt to make the case that the majority of cost for this project are renewal of systems; mechanical and electrical, roofing and finishes, but have allocated \$275,000 for flood-proofing.

c. Purpose and Objectives

The purpose and objectives of the renovation are threefold; first to co-locate the functional and technical teams responsible for the university and state college's enterprise and student information systems, second to provide space for UNL's Information Technology and third to provide a recruiting and retention tool for administrative computing.

First, CSN and ASG work closely to ensure the maintenance and continual improvement of the University's SAP R/3 system. ASG focuses on functional enhancements and business process improvement and CSN focuses on the technical support for these services, including programming, infrastructure, and user support.

The same is true for collaboration between CSN and the NeSIS group. CSN provides the technical support to insure the integrity of data, while the NeSIS group facilitates student recruitment, admissions, advising and registration while helping seven campuses meet regulatory reporting requirements.

Second, approximately 9,000 square feet vacated by CSN and ASG will allow for contiguous location of UNL Information Technology services currently spread out across campus.

Finally, the newly renovated space will serve as a recruitment and retention tool for the best and brightest computer programmers, business analysts and special projects staff. CSN provides excellent opportunities for student workers, but finds once they complete their coursework, available salaries are not competitive. Add to lower pay, a congested and uninviting workplace, and the end result is loss of young talent.

2. Justification of the Project

a. Data which supports the funding request

CSN and the ASG project team are located on the 2nd and 3rd floor of Nebraska Hall. Over time CSN has outgrown the current location, with roughly 20 staff, including the NeSIS function team, residing in leased space at 56th and O Street at a cost of \$5,500/month, including utilities.

While UNL has worked with CSN and ASG to provide space, Nebraska Hall is prime real estate, not only for academic programs such as Engineering, but for consolidation and contiguous location of UNL Information Technology and Networking services.

Technical and functional teams working on complex, integrated projects and systems like SAP and NeSIS work best when they operate as a group.

The proposed renovation will allow teamwork as well as additional office space for 2-3 consultants, auditors, and temporary staff needed for upgrades or future enhancements to the systems.

b. Alternatives considered

Three alternatives were considered; staying in current locations, moving to the Cushman building and leasing additional space at 56th and O.

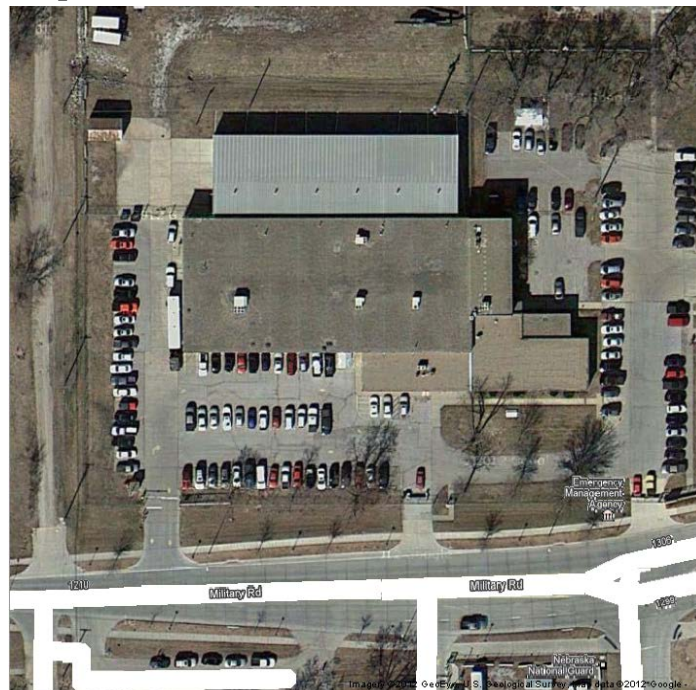
The first option was to stay in Nebraska Hall and continue to rent space at 56th and O. Both buildings provide less than optimal conditions for the collaboration needed between the functional and technical teams. In addition, CSN has outgrown available space in Nebraska Hall, supporting the need to find a permanent location for administrative computing.

Relocation into the Cushman building was considered prior to leasing space at 56th and O, but the cost to make the space habitable proved too expensive for a temporary location.

Finally, the third option reviewed was relocation to 56th and O. Currently an additional 14,000 net square feet could be obtained for a onetime cost of \$150,000 for renovation and a lease of \$22,000/month. This alternative was also deemed too expensive for a temporary location.

The proposed renovation will effectively accommodate space needs for the functional and technical teams of CSN, ASG and NeSIS, while allowing UNL Networking and Information Technology contiguous space in Nebraska Hall.

5. Analysis of Existing Facilities

a. Functions/purpose of existing programs

The current functions of CSN, ASG and NeSIS will be unchanged.

b. Square footage of existing areas

Existing NASF is 12,179; 7,984 in Nebraska Hall and 4,195 in 56th and O.

c. Physical deficiencies

Nebraska Hall and 56th & O have been reasonably well-maintained, but space in both is chopped up and maze-like. Neither offer space for future growth. The NeSIS functional and technical team space is ‘as is’ and not appropriately configured for use.

Specific deficiencies include:

- Insufficient number and size of conference and training rooms
- Cramped and overcrowded spaces
- Lack of space for temporary consultants, staff or students needed for upgrades
- Office configurations/ placement that do not allow for collaboration
- Lack of space for future growth

d. Programmatic deficiencies

Nebraska Hall does not offer enough space for the current CSN staff, little less room for expansion. Neither Nebraska Hall or 56th and O provide contiguous colocation of the three administrative computing groups. As noted earlier, UNL Information Technology services are scattered across campus.

6. Facility Requirements and the Impact of the Proposed Project

a. Functions/purpose of the proposed program

(1) Activity Identification and Analysis

The project will allow the teams responsible for supporting and enhancing the SAP and SIS systems for NU and NSCS to collaborate in a single space.

(2) Faculty/Staff Increase

Space is allocated for the following future positions:

CSN – 2 application developers, 2 business objects developers

ASG – 1 business analyst

NeSIS – 1 testing support, 2 analysts

Shared Space – 2 consultant, temporary staff or student worker spaces

c. Impact of the proposed project on existing space

(1) Reutilization and Function: Approximately 9,000 square feet in Nebraska Hall will be available for use by UNL Information Technology services currently spread out across campus.

(2) Demolition: No demolition is planned

(3) Renovation: It is unlikely renovation will be required, as much of the space is open office. Systems furniture will be needed.

7. Equipment Requirements

a. List of available equipment for reuse

All existing office systems furniture as well as workroom and files will be moved to the USPFO building.

b. Additional equipment

New office systems furniture may be needed for the NeSIS group as they are utilizing surplus stand-alone furniture in 56th and O. If possible, existing ASG systems furniture will be reconfigured for NeSIS use.

8. Special Design Considerations

a. Construction Type

The existing structure is a separated mixed occupancy. The office area is Type V-B due to the glue-lam and wood deck structure.

a. Heating and cooling systems

The existing boiler is in good shape, but needs to be supplemented with a new air handling system. New air handlers will be coupled with air cooled condensing units and economizers for free cooling. A direct digital control system will be installed for temperature control and building management.

b. Sustainability

The project will serve as a model of sustainable reuse and adaptation of a state facility and meet the requirements for sustainable design as set forth by the University of Nebraska President's Administrative Policy.

d. Life Safety/ADA

The renovation will be designed and constructed to satisfy all requirements of the currently adopted building, fire, and life safety codes, and will be fully accessible under the currently adopted ADA and Nebraska Accessibility Guidelines.

e. Security

Security System components shall include card access and control as well as video surveillance system and intrusion detection.

f. Historic or architectural significance

The existing building has no historical or architectural significance.

g. Artwork

No artwork is included in the budget as the renovation does not expand the existing structure and the building is not open to the public as guests.

h. Phasing

The project is planned to be constructed and occupied in a single phase.

i. Future expansion

There are no plans for future expansion of the facility. If additional office space is needed, it will be accommodated by renovating the existing locker rooms and storage rooms.

SUBJECT: Payment of a management fee to the University of Nebraska Foundation.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve an agreement authorizing payment of a fee to the University of Nebraska Foundation for the management of certain University Endowments known as Fund N.

PREVIOUS ACTION: April 20, 2007 – The Board of Regents approved an Agency Agreement with the State Investment Officer and The University of Nebraska Foundation for management and investment of funds in the University Trust Funds.
October 23, 1998 – The Board of Regents approved an Agency Agreement with the University of Nebraska Foundation providing for the management and investment of the Othmer-Topp Endowments.

EXPLANATION: The University of Nebraska Foundation (Foundation) is a separate nonprofit corporation with a separate board of directors and its Articles of Incorporation states that the Foundation exists and operates to raise, manage, and distribute private funds for the exclusive benefit of the University. The Foundation in 1980 was formally designated by the Board of Regents as the entity to most effectively receive, manage, and invest gifts and bequests for the University. Over \$1 billion dollars are currently under the management of the Foundation on behalf of the University.
Gifts made by will, deed, or other instrument directly to the University belongs to the University Trust Fund provided for in *Neb. Rev. Stat.* Sections 85-123 and 85-123.01. These statutes provide that the University Trust Fund shall be held and managed in such manner as the Board of Regents shall determine, and when the funds therein are to be invested, they shall be invested by the State Investment Officer, subject to controlling terms of any will, deed or other instrument applicable to a particular gift.
The Agency Agreement cited in the previous action section of this agenda item was created for the purpose of having the Foundation invest funds given directly to the University. It allowed the University to take advantage of the investment expertise at the Foundation, allowed access to a variety of fund managers, and provided a level of day-to-day oversight of the portfolio and markets that is not possible within the University.
The Agency Agreement first executed in October 23, 1998 allowed the transfer and management of the Othmer-Topp endowment. The 2007 amendment allowed the movement of other endowments gifted directly to the University that were previously managed by a third party and placed those funds with the Foundation. The funds covered by the Agency Agreement are collectively referred to by the Foundation as

Fund N, versus the Foundation's main endowment, which is referred to as Fund A. Fair market value of Fund N at July 31, 2012 was approximately \$260 million.

The compensation to be paid to the Foundation for its services in investment of the funds under the Agency Agreement is an annual fee of 1% of the average fair market value of Fund N. This compensation, net of the amount paid to outside managers of Fund N, is approximately .35% and does not provide adequate compensation for the fund-raising, accounting, distribution, donor compliance, alumni activities, and other functions that provide used and useful services to the University. By comparison, the management charge for the Foundation's Fund A is 1.85%, net of manager fees.

This action, if approved, would create the same rate for both Fund A and Fund N, a percentage not to exceed 1.75%, net of manager fees. This rate represents a decrease in Fund A charges and an increase in Fund N charges. There is no state-aided budgetary impact as the fees are paid out of income earned on the respective endowments. This new agreement would be effective retroactively to July 1, 2012.

The fee structure was reviewed and recommended for approval by the Business Affairs Committee.

EXPLANATION: The East and West Centennial Towers are part of the “Obligated Group” of facilities of the University covered by the Bond Resolutions surrounding the Master Trust Indenture. As such, the resolution requires the Board to keep the facilities in good repair and working order to that they may be operated in a sound and economical manner.

Centennial Towers were constructed in 1966. These improvements are part of the third phase of planned residential renewal at UNK. The original housing master plan outlining the renewals for residence hall operations was presented to the Board of Regents Business Affairs Committee on February 21, 2008.

Construction will be funded through the use of Bond Surplus Funds resulting from Kearney residence hall operations. Approval of this item allows expenditure of up to \$6 million from bond surplus funds to finance East Tower renovation.

EXPLANATION: Emboldened by UNL's goal to increase student enrollment to 30,000 by year 2017, the College of Business Administration (CBA) seeks to grow its current enrollment of 3,500 students to a total of 5,000. To continue to increase its level of competitiveness in research and scholarly activity, as well as its capacity to recruit and retain a top-notch faculty, the University must strive to provide quality facilities. The current CBA building is severely undersized to meet the needs of a growing faculty and student population. The proposed project will construct a new facility for the College of Business Administration, north of the Kauffman Academic Residential Center at the southeast corner of 14th and Vine Streets. The new building will provide space for offices, classrooms, class labs, and student and faculty collaboration in support of undergraduate, graduate, doctoral, and executive programs. The structure will be based on the concept of establishing collaborative spaces, the types needed to advance partnerships, both internal and external to UNL.

The College of Business Administration Replacement Building complies with the UNL Physical Master Plan 2006-2015 and addresses several goals and objectives of the University Strategic Planning Framework for 2010-2013.

The program statement and budget have been reviewed by the Business Affairs Committee and are recommended for approval.

Construction of the project will begin after commitments for all funding are in place and authorization to proceed is received from the President.

1. Introduction

a. Background and History

The College of Business Administration (CBA) developed from a single course in political economy in 1869. In 1916, the College, with sixteen other universities including Harvard, became a charter member of the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB). The UNL College of Business Administration was reaccredited by the AACSB in 2011.

Undergraduate business programs include Accounting, Finance, Economics, Marketing and Management. In addition, masters programs are offered in Business Administration (MBA)/Executive MBA, Accounting, and Economics. The College also houses several outreach programs including the Center for Economic Education, National Center for Research on Economic Education, Nebraska Council on Economic Education, Nebraska Center for Entrepreneurship and Bureau of Business Research. Finally, CBA has plans for programmatic growth in several areas, including a Minor in Business beginning Fall 2012; Institute for Innovative Leadership; Center for Entrepreneurship; a CBA Honors Academy; and a growing major in Actuarial Science.

Enrollments have grown nearly 10% in the last six years, with a one-year increase of nearly 4% from 2010-11 to 2011-12. As of Fall 2011, CBA had 3,433 students, and led the campus in enrollment growth for international students (21%) and out-of-state (11%) undergraduates.

CBA generates approximately \$5.7 million annually through differential tuition, which has allowed the college to invest in additional faculty. In 2011, 5 tenure track faculty were added. Plans to add 13 in 2012, and another 8 in 2013, will enable CBA to decrease the student/faculty ratio of 45:1 to 35:1, still higher than the Big Ten average but a substantial improvement in quality instructional delivery..

The college is housed in the College of Business Building which underwent a renovation in 1993, at which time a new wing was added providing additional office and classroom space. The building consists of 119,817 gross square feet (67,821 net assignable square feet), with an average of 34 gross square feet per student.

b. Project Description

The proposed project will construct a new 240,000 gross square feet facility with approximately 156,000 square feet of assignable space for offices, classrooms, class labs,

and student and faculty collaboration in support of undergraduate, graduate, doctoral, and executive programs. The building will be flexible to meet the future needs of the various programs and changing teaching methods.

The project will contain:

- Space for interactive learning, collaboration, conferences, competitions and other events
- Program specific, state of the art classrooms
- “One Stop” student support services, including advising and career services
- Strategic placement of offices, conferencing areas, student support services and technology to enhance communication and collaboration among faculty
- Improved and expanded technology
- A “sense of place” for students, partners and other visitors, faculty and staff

c. Purpose and Objectives

A new facility will support current and future business programs, students, faculty, and staff, as well as offer the type of space needed to sustain outreach activities and vital partnerships among business, information systems, engineering, public administration, health sciences, and the Nebraska Innovation Campus.

2. Justification of the Project

a. Data which supports the funding request

At the direction of the CBA dean, needs of the program were studied by a 7-member faculty task force. Members visited new business facilities at Purdue, Illinois, and Indiana and researched the facilities of all Big Ten business schools where they found square foot per student averaged 72 square feet, more than double the current space available in the existing building.

As part of the campus enrollment goal of 2017, CBA plans to grow by 1,500 students through expanding undergraduate and graduate programs and adding an executive program, all of which require space that cannot be provided in the current facility. New and expanding research projects, including the successful grant collaboration in leadership with the U.S. Army, also require additional space.

A new facility will not just provide space; it will create a new entity. A new building will present a unique opportunity for the College to advance and expand its academic outreach, and research programs. More importantly, a new facility will allow students to attend class, study, work on group assignments and participate in business student organizations, as well as interact with the business community; leading to development of life and career skills necessary for leaving college.

The sense of excitement created by the new building, coupled with the strength of programs, will result in increases in student enrollment at both the graduate and undergraduate levels, a significant rise in the visibility of the College in the state and the region, an advancement in the level of faculty research and external support for research, and a stronger sense that CBA is an integral part of the business community.

b. Alternatives considered

Two alternatives were considered.

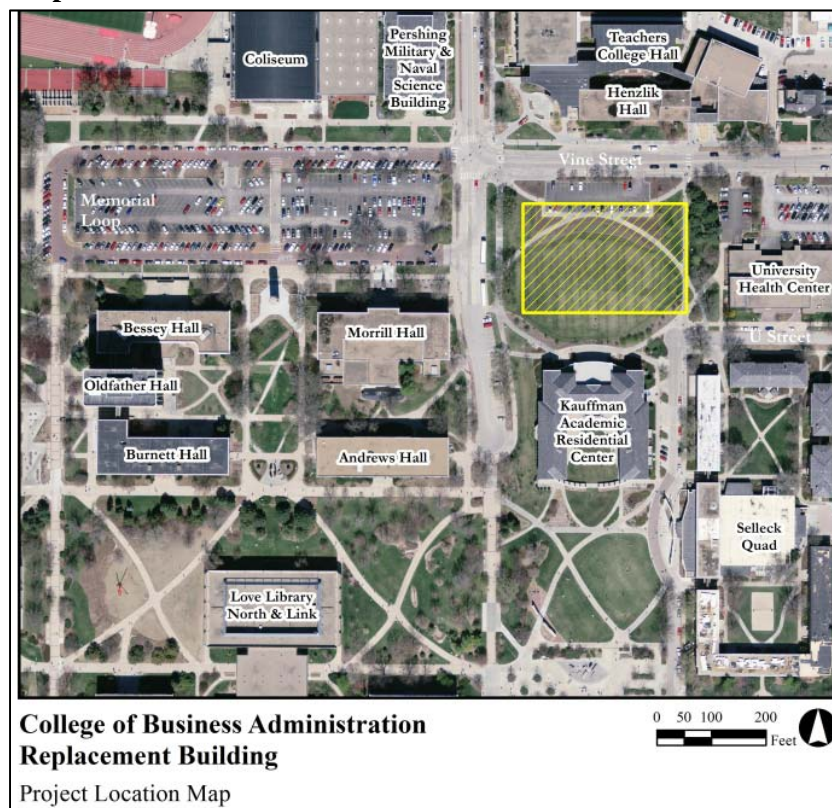
- (1) Expand the current College of Business Administration building. This alternative was not pursued due to site constraints and the difficulty of modifying the building structure to accommodate the changing mission of the college.
- (2) Construct a new facility at (a) the southeast corner of 17th and Vine streets or (b) the former Textron, Inc. plant site.

Reasons for not selecting the 17th and Vine and Textron locations include the following:

- Distance from the campus core
- Impact on existing recreation fields
- Impact of utilities and other easements on building footprint
- Costs for demolition of existing buildings and additional site work
- Pedestrian and vehicular circulation to and from the site

e. Influence of project on existing site conditions**(1) Relationship to neighbors and environment**

The new building will be located in the academic core. The UNL Physical Master Plan 2006-2015 calls for a future academic building to be constructed on the site.

(2) Utilities

Both city and campus utilities are present in the area with capacities sufficient to serve the new building. An active steam tunnel runs along the east side of the project site to the northeast corner of the Kauffman Academic Residential Center. Multiple utilities run in an east-west track directly south of the site.

The building will be connected to the campus electrical distribution system, and a new circuit will be provided to the transformer from the 14th and Avery substation. A separate emergency power electrical room and a new emergency diesel generator will be provided for emergency power to code-required life safety systems and other standby systems.

(3) Parking and circulation

The site is served by campus and city transit and is adjacent to a primary corridor for cyclists and pedestrians entering the core of City Campus from the north and east, via 14th and Vine streets. Improved pedestrian circulation is planned in the form of wider sidewalks and plazas around the new facility.

The project will displace 42 parking spaces, which serve the College of Education and Human Services. Both buildings will be served by the 14th and Avery and 19th and Vine parking garages and various surface lots in the area.

4. Comprehensive Plan Compliance**a. University of Nebraska Strategic Framework**

This project supports the following objectives set forth in *Investing in Nebraska's Future, the Strategic Planning Framework 2010-2013*:

“Nebraskans will advocate a physical environment for each of the state’s postsecondary institutions that support its role and mission; is well-utilized and effectively accommodates space needs; is safe, accessible, cost effective, and well maintained; and is sufficiently flexible to adapt to future changes in programs and technologies.”

The proposed new building will replace outmoded and inefficient space in the current facility and effectively accommodate space needs for the expanded College of Business Administration.

c. Physical deficiencies

The current CBA building has been reasonably well-maintained. Its age and original planned use render it wanting with respect to needed features and amenities. It has both quantitative and qualitative deficiencies:

- Lack of appropriately-sized, configured and technologically equipped classrooms
- Insufficient number of conference and breakout rooms
- Cramped quarters and overcrowded conditions
- Lack of outreach space
- Shortage of computer laboratories
- No Trading Room
- Narrow hallways and lack of student space
- Office access not conducive to interaction/collaboration
- Lack of space for visiting faculty and executives, part-time and emeritus faculty
- Lack of flexibility for future growth and building modification
- Inadequate restrooms and mechanical and electrical systems which cannot support additional information technology

d. Programmatic deficiencies

Classrooms

With the shift towards team-based learning and more break-out/collaboration sessions during classroom time, the existing traditional, small, inflexible classrooms are unusable by the college. Because of a change in teaching style— from a stage-like, student note-taking setting to facilitation of interactive discourse – classrooms must be more flexible. In addition, they must be innovative to support the wide variety of pedagogies that are evolving in the university and adult teaching facilities. This new teaching atmosphere will provide the business students with the knowledge of how to work in groups and collaborate with each other, something businesses indicate recent college graduates lack.

Offices

The College continues to invest in adding to its faculty. In 2011, five tenure track faculty were added. In 2012, ten new faculty will join CBA and an additional ten will likely be recruited in 2013. Given CBA's role in growing enrollments, continued expansion of faculty will occur. The current building is not large enough to house the existing faculty, let alone a growing faculty. In addition, moving to the Big Ten is allowing the College to compete for faculty formerly beyond its reach. However, these instructors are also interviewing for positions at schools with newer facilities with greater technological support for research and teaching, and better opportunities for collaboration. Other current and future office needs that cannot be accommodated in the existing building include the following:

- 17 Student Organizations
- Career/Life Skills Services
- Advising Services
- New and growing programs, especially research

- Expansion of undergraduate and graduate recruitment
- Executive MBA
- Honors Programs
- Leadership Center
- Future Program Start-up areas

Informal Learning and Collaboration Spaces

Learning is no longer contained in the classroom. Learning happens in cafés, hallways, and out-of-the way places where students and faculty gather to interact. The existing building does not have informal learning and collaboration spaces or social gathering spaces. Most of this activity is limited to a few small and inefficient commons areas and even hallway floors. A lack of available space combined with a poor layout limits student-student and faculty-student interaction as well as program expansion.

e. Replacement cost of existing building

The Facilities Management Information Report for June 2011 lists the replacement cost for the existing College of Business Administration building as \$36,012,530. The replacement cost is calculated for insurance purposes and does not include foundations, site work, utilities beyond the five foot line, equipment, moving costs, or land acquisition.

6. Facility Requirements and the Impact of the Proposed Project

a. Functions/purpose of the proposed program

(1) Activity Identification and Analysis

The new building will specifically serve the programmatic requirements of the College, including expansion of the College’s undergraduate and graduate programs; new programs in executive education, leadership, entrepreneurship, and supply chain management;

(2) Projected Occupancy/Use Levels

The building will be constructed to accommodate a projected enrollment increase to 5,000 students by 2017. New faculty and staff will be added as program growth requires.

c. Impact of the proposed project on existing space

(1) Reutilization and Function

An evaluation of the best reuse of the space in the existing CBA building will be conducted by Institutional Research and Planning as part of the campus master planning effort currently underway. The analysis will be tied to the goals of increasing enrollment and research funding, and the strategies and priorities that are developed to achieve these goals.

(2) Demolition

No demolition is planned for the existing CBA building. Except for the removal of some surface parking and sidewalks, no demolition is needed for construction of the new building.

(3) Renovation

Renovation will be required for the current CBA building to be utilized as a general classroom facility, or to accommodate other programmatic functions. No funding has been identified to renovate the existing building at this time.

7. Equipment Requirements

a. List of available equipment for reuse

The majority of the existing office furniture is not suitable for reuse. Existing equipment and furnishings that are less than 5 years old will be evaluated for relocation to the new facility.

b. Additional equipment

(1) Fixed equipment

Fixed equipment includes marker boards, tack boards, built-in display cabinets, shelving, display furnishings, and fixed wood seating.

(2) Movable equipment

Moveable equipment includes lounge, conference and office furniture, coffee and side tables, lamps, display cases, tables and chairs for social gathering, special furnishings for forum and donor alcove.

(3) Special or technical equipment

Special equipment includes large screen televisions, multi-media station, sound and speaker systems, recording/broadcast system, kiosks, security cameras, computers and monitors, stock tickers and dual projection, multimedia stations, and access security.

8. Special Design Considerations

a. Construction Type

The construction type for the new building will be non-combustible.

b. Heating and cooling systems

The new CBA building will be divided into a series of zones, with multiple air handling units (AHU's) designated to serve specific areas of the facility. The building will be served by hot water heating, steam/condensate, and chilled water cooling systems. All equipment (fans and pumps) will be provided with variable frequency drives. Temperatures throughout the building shall be monitored by a direct digital control (DDC) system, provided by the UNL Control Systems Group per UNL Design Guidelines.

c. Sustainability

The project will meet the requirements for sustainable design as set forth by the University of Nebraska President's Administrative Policy.

d. Life Safety/ADA

The building will be designed and constructed to satisfy all requirements of the currently adopted building, fire, and life safety codes, and will be fully accessible under the currently adopted ADA and Nebraska Accessibility Guidelines.

e. Security

Security System components shall include card access and controls, as well as video surveillance system and intrusion detection.

f. Historic or architectural significance

It is anticipated the new CBA building design will convey an image of progressive and innovative thinking and ideas as well as reflect the character of the surrounding area, the academic core of City Campus.

g. Artwork

A total of \$87,000 has been allocated for artwork in the new CBA facility.

h. Phasing

The project is planned to be constructed and occupied in a single phase.

i. Future expansion

There are no plans for future expansion of the facility at this time. While no future expansion is planned, the building will be designed to accommodate potential growth, dependent upon increases in student enrollment and addition of new programs.

9. Project Budget and Fiscal Impact

a. Cost estimates criteria

(1) Identify recognized standards, comparisons, and sources used to develop the estimated cost
 The estimated probable costs of construction of the project were developed by reviewing R.S. Means Square Foot Costs Guides and reviewing costs of similar recent local projects in size, scale and type. Environmental controls, fire alarms, card access, security systems, telecommunications, A/V, and landscaping were based on estimates developed by University staff.

(2) Identify the year and month on which the estimates are made and the inflation factors used
 The estimate was prepared in June 2012 and escalated at 3% per year to the midpoint of construction, December 2014.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the First Amendment to the Master Lease between the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska and the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation for Nebraska Innovation Campus.

PREVIOUS ACTION: September 9, 2011 – The Board of Regents approved the program statement and budget for the 4-H Building Renovation at the Nebraska Innovation Campus (NIC).

September 10, 2010 – The Board of Regents authorized the President to execute, approve, and administratively process the Nebraska Innovation Campus Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions.

September 10, 2010 – The Board of Regents approved the Master Lease between the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska and the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation for the land to be formally designated the Nebraska Innovation Campus.

April 16, 2010 – The Board of Regents approved the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

December 9, 2009 – The Board of Regents approved the transfer of title of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds in Lancaster County from the State of Nebraska to the Board of Regents as provided by law.

November 20, 2009 – The Board of Regents approved the Master Plan and Business Plan for Innovation Campus and authorized the President to submit the same as required by law and provide a commitment for the President to provide an annual update of the plans on behalf of the University to complete the University's obligations under Neb. Rev. Stat. § 2-113(2) (Supp. 2009).

EXPLANATION: Approval of the Master Lease for the land designated as the Nebraska Innovation Campus (NIC) between the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska and the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation (NICDC) was the initial step to authorize the NICDC to commence build out operation and development of NIC in accordance with the NIC Business Plan and Master Plan. As development of the NIC continues, proposed changes to the Master Lease include: (1) a revised Exhibit A site map to reflect the addition of the City exchange parcel, (2) redefining University subleases and University and NIC option sites, and (3) clarifying the University's right to remove property from the development.

The President is authorized to approve, execute, and administratively process the Nebraska Innovation Campus First Amendment to Master Lease Agreement and related documents, directives, and approvals required by its terms notwithstanding any other provision of the Board's bylaws or policies.

The Amendment to the Master Lease has been reviewed by the Business Affairs Committee and recommended for approval.

December 9, 2009 – The Board of Regents approved the transfer of title of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds in Lancaster County from the State of Nebraska to the Board of Regents as provided by law.

November 20, 2009 – The Board of Regents approved the Master Plan and Business Plan for Innovation Campus and authorized the President to submit the same as required by law and provide a commitment for the President to provide an annual update of the plans on behalf of the University to complete the University's obligations under Neb. Rev. Stat. § 2-113(2) (Supp. 2009).

EXPLANATION: The original Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&R's), dated December 2, 2010, provided for focused implementation of the Master Plan recommended Site Design, Architecture and Infrastructure principles, frameworks, and character requirements for the land designated as the Nebraska Innovation Campus (NIC). The proposed changes are to update the CC&R's to reflect changes since 2010 including: (1) the clarification that if the University

leases or removes portions of the property from the scope of the Master Lease, these parcels remain subject to the CC&R's, (2) the addition of provisions addressing parking implementation and maintenance, access rights, the infrastructure improvements assessment structure, developer's ability to assert assessment liens, and indemnification and insurance provisions to reflect and implement the parking management roll and increased infrastructure obligations of developer, and (3) the clarification of the maintenance and management structure. The amended CC&R's have been approved by the NICDC Board.

University funded improvements at the site will continue to comply with applicable Nebraska law, and bylaws and policies of the Board of Regents, including Board approval under the Capital Planning and Development Policies.

The President is authorized to approve, execute, and administratively process the CC&R's and related documents, directives, and approvals required by its terms notwithstanding any other provision of the Board's bylaws or policies, including, but not limited to the approval, execution and administrative processing of the Management and Parking Agreement contemplated by the CC&R's.

The Amended and Restated Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions been reviewed and are recommended for approval by the Business Affairs Committee.

EXPLANATION: The first phase of development at NIC includes the creation of the 4-H Innovation Complex and the Life Sciences Collaboration Center. In order to meet the University's needs for leased space within the first phase of the NIC development, the University is proposing to lease wet and dry lab facilities, greenhouse space, headhouse and high bay facilities, as well as office space in both the 4-H Innovation Complex and the Life Sciences Collaboration Center. A summary of the University's

proposed lease program is attached hereto. The lease program anticipates a lease commitment in the form of the following four separate letters of intent (LOIs):

- SDL I LOI – Contemplates the lease by the University of approximately 31,375 gross rentable square feet (25,100 useable square feet) of space in Unit 2 (Nebraska Nova’s half of the 4-H Wing) and Unit 3 (the NIC Wing) of the 4-H Innovation Complex.
- SDL II LOI #1 – Contemplates the lease by the University of approximately 24,000 gross rentable square feet (20,000 useable square feet) of space in the Lab Wing (wet and dry lab facilities) of the Life Sciences Collaboration Center.
- SDL II LOI #2 – Contemplates the lease by the University of approximately 12,000 gross rentable square feet (10,000 useable square feet) of space in the Lab Wing (wet and dry lab facilities) of the Life Sciences Collaboration Center. This lease has been split out to facilitate assumption by a key tenant.
- SDL II LOI #3 – Contemplates the lease by the University of approximately 53, 650 gross rentable square feet (37,000 useable square feet) of space in the Greenhouse Wing (greenhouse, headhouse and high bay facilities) of the Life Sciences Collaboration Center.

The President is authorized to approve, execute, and administratively process the University lease program, including the Letters of Intent to Lease and related documents, directives, and approvals required by their terms notwithstanding any other provision of the Board's bylaws or policies. The Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, in consultation with the President and General Counsel, is authorized to approve, execute and administratively process the Leases contemplated by the Letters of Intent to Lease (the LOIs), provided the Leases are materially consistent with the terms of the approved LOIs.

The program and related documents have been reviewed by the Business Affairs Committee and recommended for approval.

SUBJECT: Ticketing Software for the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Athletics Department

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve a sole source five year contract extension with Paciolan Systems, Inc. for ticketing software.

PREVIOUS ACTION: November 7, 2008 – The Board of Regents approved a sole source four year contract extension with Paciolan Systems, Inc. (PSI) for ticketing software.
November 3, 2006 – The Board of Regents approved a sole source three year ticketing software contract with PSI that includes the option for subsequent renewals.

EXPLANATION: UNL Athletics is requesting approval of a five-year contract extension to their existing ticketing system agreement with PSI, covering the period November 2013 through November 2018. As a result of this contract extension, PSI will hold constant the current annual fee for each of the next five years.
Under the proposed contract extension, the UNL Athletic Department pays a flat fee of \$233,000 through November 2018. This fee has not increased since 2006. Paciolan’s software and services includes Ticketing, Fundraising (Advantage), Marketing Services, Server Hosting and Payment Card Industry compliance.
Given the seating and ticketing changes in 2013 for additional seats in Memorial Stadium, relocation of Volleyball to the Devaney Sports Center and Men’s and Women’s Basketball to the Pinnacle Bank Arena, migrating to another ticketing software company would pose significant implementation challenges along with the loss of branding opportunities and Athletics’ current ability to structure transaction fees.

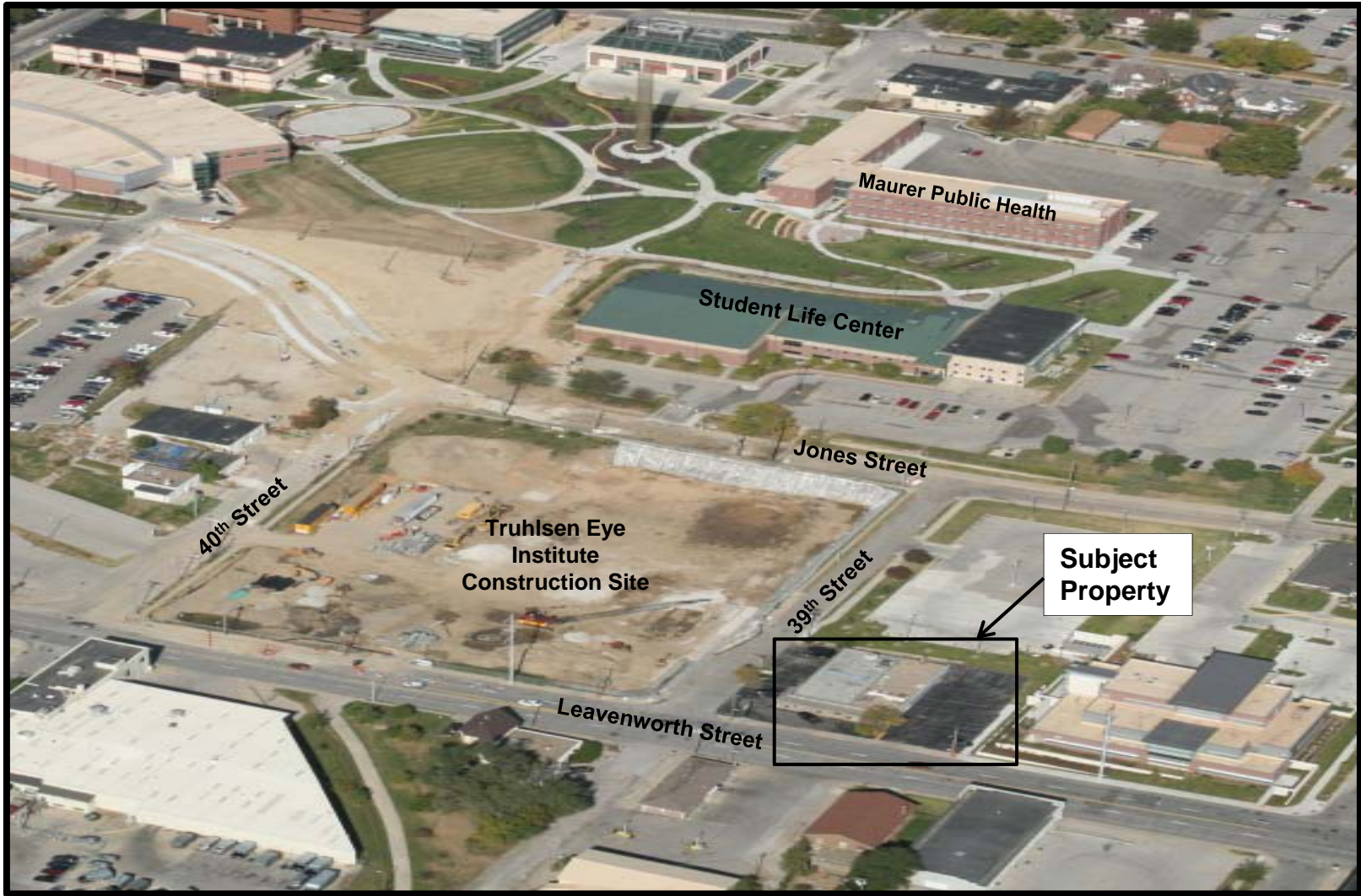

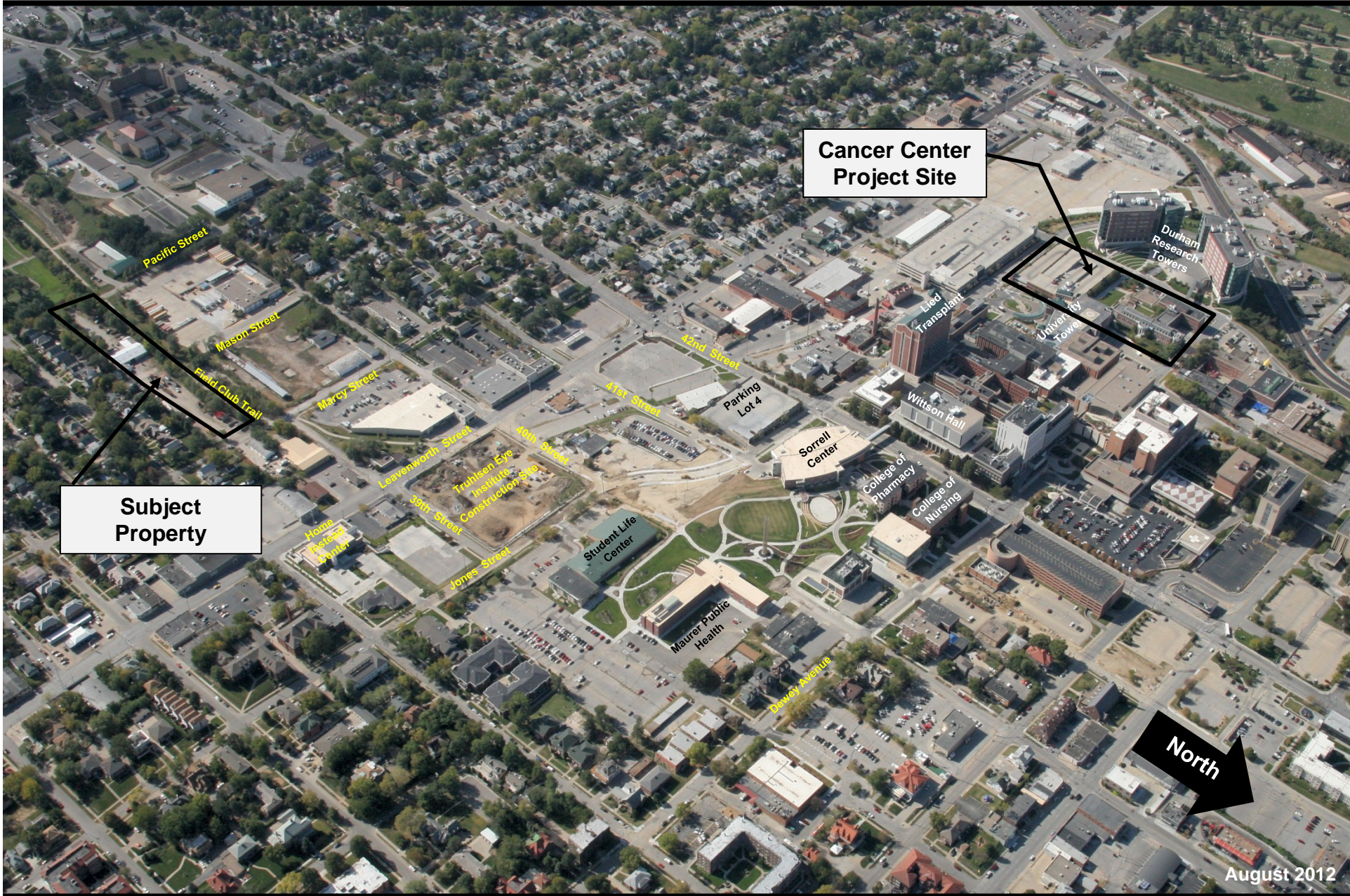

SUBJECT: Sole source purchase of liquid handling robotic workstations for the UNMC Biobank

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the sole source purchase of liquid handling robotic workstations for the UNMC Biobank.

PREVIOUS ACTION: None

EXPLANATION: UNMC is proceeding with the establishment of its Biobank laboratory. The Biobank is a strategic priority and positions the Medical Center in this rapidly advancing area of research. The Biobank will be overseen by Drs. James Wiscarver (Pathology) and James Eudy (Genetics, Cell Biology, Anatomy).

The Biobank will be processing up to 2,000 tubes of blood, serum, and plasma per day. This volume requires specialized robotics to efficiently and effectively handle these sensitive samples.

This agenda item seeks approval of a sole source purchase of two robotic systems, EVO 100 and EVO 200. These instruments are unique in that they provide a seamless, customizable, fully-interfaced solution between liquid-handling and automated DNA extraction. The physical dimensions and modular structure is also scalable and allows for future growth and increased throughputs.

SUBJECT: Development team selection and project scope for the mixed-use component of the 18th and R Parking Garage at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL).

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the development team of America First Real Estate Group, LLC and the project scope for the mixed-use component of the 18th and R Parking Garage at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL).

PREVIOUS ACTION: June 8, 2012 – The Board of Regents approved the Program Statement and Budget for the 18th and R Parking Garage at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL).

EXPLANATION: The Program Statement approved by the Board of Regents on June 8, 2012 contemplated a 1,250 stall parking garage, to be located at the corner of 18th and R Streets (the “Site”). UNL would construct, own, operate and maintain the new garage similar to the parking garage at 17th and R Streets.

However, during the planning process, UNL considered the feasibility of a mixed-use facility on the site, similar in concept to the newly constructed Larson Building located on “Q” Street between 13th and 14th Streets in Lincoln. The Larson building is a mixed-use facility including 17,000 square feet of first-floor retail, six floors of City-operated parking, and 52 residential units and associated parking on the top three floors of the building.

UNL evaluated the potential of adding a mixed-use component to the planned 18th and R parking garage, taking into account the current surrounding uses in the area, as well as the potential benefits for the campus and the community. The landscape of the area has changed dramatically since the construction of the 17th and R parking garage. Redevelopment of the Antelope Valley Parkway corridor has transformed the landscape of many areas of East Downtown Lincoln, but none more significantly than the area around Q Street. From construction of the new Assurity Center to development of new student and private housing and park and recreational amenities, demand for convenient goods and services exists in an area that was once dominated by commercial uses. As more office space is built in and around this area in the future, a creative means for providing retail space will be needed, especially as land in the area becomes scarce. In addition, with a charge to grow UNL enrollment by 5,000 students by 2017, more students will be seeking housing in the area, increasing the demand for residential as well as retail conveniences and parking. These factors support the addition of residential and possible retail/office components

to the parking garage facility.

UNL issued a request for proposals to identify a developer to construct housing and possible retail/office space along with the original project of at least 1,250 parking stalls to be owned and operated by UNL. There were two respondents to the proposals. After evaluation of the responses, each of the respondents was asked to make, and did make, a best and final offer to the campus, including a guaranteed amount of return plus a percentage of gross income. UNL is recommending America First Real Estate Group, LLC based in Omaha, Nebraska as the developer for this project (the “Developer”).

The proposed project will construct a 123-foot tall, mixed-use facility on the 1.7 acre site, consisting of:

- A multi-level parking structure with 1,270 spaces to be owned, operated and maintained by UNL under a condominium regime
- 130 residential units with a total of 475 beds, owned and operated by the Developer
- 384 additional parking stalls dedicated to the residential and retail/office components, with income therefrom to the Developer.

Under the agreement with the Developer, the UNL parking garage is required to be completed by August 1, 2014, in order to enable the campus to meet the additional parking demands resulting from two new suite-style student housing projects, totaling 1,034 beds, and projected enrollment growth. UNL will contribute to the construction project the cost of the parking garage component only, up to \$16,700,000, the amount approved by the Board of Regents on June 8, 2012. All remaining construction costs shall be paid by Developer, with Developer owning, maintaining, managing and operating the residential (and associated residential space parking), possible retail and office spaces.

In order to secure ownership of the entire Site, the University must acquire title to the City’s surface parking lot, which Lincoln Fire and Rescue uses to park passenger vehicles and hazardous materials trailers. In consideration for the City’s transfer of this property to the University, UNL has agreed to provide 26 staff parking spaces and parking for two 35-foot hazardous materials trailers for Lincoln Fire and Rescue. The details and location of the City’s future parking is still under review, but may utilize a portion of 18th Street, which is intended to be vacated and closed to vehicular traffic, except intercampus route buses.

In return for the right to own and operate the residential (and associated residential space parking), possible retail and office spaces and collect rents therefrom, America First has agreed to pay a minimum of \$120,000 per year to UNL (with inflation at 2% per year) plus 80% of gross revenue in excess of approximately \$3.7 million. Under this proposal, the housing and other mixed use components become the property of the University at the earlier of 35 years or the pay-off of the indebtedness.

The selection and project scope have been reviewed by the Business Affairs Committee.

The University of Nebraska is a four-campus, public university which was created and exists today to serve Nebraskans through quality teaching, research, and outreach and engagement. We strive to be the best public university in the country as measured by the impact we have on our people and our state, and through them, the world. To do that, we must compete effectively with other institutions around the world for talented students and faculty. The future of Nebraska is closely tied to that of its only public university, and this framework guides university-wide and campus planning to help build and sustain a Nebraska that offers its citizens educational and economic opportunity and a high quality of life.

The framework consists of six overarching goals emphasizing access and affordability, quality academic programs, workforce and economic development, research growth, engagement with the state, and accountability. Each goal has a number of related objectives, strategies and accountability measures developed for Board and university-wide monitoring over a multi-year period. Companion documents include an implementation tool with metrics and the schedule for monitoring by the Board, as well as a dashboard reflecting progress.

The university's efforts will not be limited to these priorities, as we expect to be able to measure progress in other areas given the interrelatedness of the objectives, other priorities of the Board and the President, and the ongoing strategic planning efforts of the four campuses. Campus plans are consistent with this framework and operate within its broader goals. Each campus has established a set of quality indicators that provide a means to evaluate achievement and momentum related to its principal objectives.

1. The University of Nebraska will provide the opportunity for Nebraskans to enjoy a better life through access to high quality, affordable undergraduate, graduate and professional education.
 - a. The university will strive to increase affordability and ensure qualified students are not denied access based on economic circumstances.
 - i. Secure state funding sufficient to support access to high quality programs.*
 - ii. Keep tuition increases moderate and predictable for students and families, consistent with goals of both access and quality.*
 - iii. Expand need-based financial aid and effectively market opportunity and major aid programs (e.g. Collegebound Nebraska, Buffett Scholars, Thompson Learning Communities).*
 - b. Increase the percentage of Nebraska high school graduates (the state “college-going rate”) who enroll at and graduate from the university.

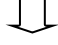

PREVIOUS ACTION: On December 10, 1994, the Board of Regents amended Section 3.2 of the *Bylaws of the Board of Regents* to delegate to the President, or administrative officers designated by the President, authority to make appointments in the Academic-Administrative staff to faculty positions and to administrative positions below the rank of Dean and equivalent ranks. Executive Memorandum No. 13 subsequently delegated authority to the Chancellors to make Academic-Administrative appointments below the level of Dean. SUBJECT: Amendments to *Board of Regents' Policy 6.4.2, Religious Activities*

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Report

PREVIOUS ACTION: April 19, 1980—The Board of Regents adopted Board of Regents Policy 6.4.2, Religious Activities.

EXPLANATION: Pursuant to Regents Bylaw 1.12(b), the Corporation Secretary is authorized to remove from any Regents Policy obsolete matter and language that conflicts with any lawful and controlling statute or regulation of the State of Nebraska or of the United States, or that has been determined to be unlawful as a result of a controlling decision of a court of the State of Nebraska or of the United States.

Since the adoption of this policy over thirty years ago, court rulings interpreting the U.S. Constitution have rendered this policy obsolete and in some respects unclear in its application to current issues. In order to avoid the obsolescence which is present in the policy, while remaining mindful of the current state of the law, each University campus administers its own properties and activities, implementing policies and practices that prohibit discrimination based upon religious viewpoint. As such, this policy no longer serves its purpose as it did when enacted. Campus concerns related to this issue are often situational; legal advice and interpretation regularly depend on the particular set of facts at hand. Therefore, campus representatives are encouraged to continue to contact the Office of the Vice President and General Counsel for legal advice with respect to questions concerning the interpretation of the law and its application to particular situations involving religious activities.

Board of Regents Policy 6.4.2 is corrected as follows:

RP-6.4.2 Religious Activities

The Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Nebraska require that the University of Nebraska refrain from activities which either inhibit or promote any particular religion or sect. As a public institution the University has, on the one hand, a legal duty to refrain from excessive entanglement with religion. On the other hand, the University, as one of the State's leading institutions of advanced learning, has a public duty to be at the forefront of our society in providing an open forum for the free expression and exchange of thoughts and ideas. It is the purpose and intent of the Board of Regents in this policy to encourage and promote the latter duty to the maximum extent possible within the parameters of the law. Campus concerns related to this issue are often situational; legal advice and interpretation regularly depend on

the particular set of facts at hand. Therefore, campus representatives are encouraged to continue to contact the Office of the Vice President and General Counsel for legal advice with respect to questions concerning the interpretation of the law and its application to particular situations involving religious activities.

- ~~1. Teaching and study involving religions in a secular, philosophical, historical, or cultural context are appropriate within the University community.~~
- ~~2. Non-sectarian invocations, benedictions, or moments of silent meditation shall be permitted at University functions.~~
- ~~3. The University shall not discriminate on the basis of religion in its personnel policies, and reasonable efforts shall be made by the University to accommodate work schedules to meet the needs of employees in their personal religious activities.~~
- ~~4. There shall be no interference with personal religious activities which are confined to private living quarters within the University housing facilities, or which are confined to patient rooms within University hospital and health facilities.~~
- ~~5. University buildings and facilities shall not be used for religious services, except for the rental of space in University buildings for occasional religious services as provided in Paragraph 6 of this policy. The foregoing shall not be construed to prohibit or interfere with the regular use of appropriate University buildings and facilities by any student organization or other University organization for social, cultural, educational, philosophical, business, entertainment, artistic, musical, or athletic activities. The term "religious services" as used in this policy shall be narrowly construed and shall refer only to the use of University buildings or facilities by any group or organization for the primary purpose of conducting religious ceremonies, religious exercises or religious rituals.~~
- ~~6. The Chancellors may designate space within buildings under their respective jurisdictions which may be rented by any group or organization for occasional religious services when such space is not required for institutional purposes; provided that such space shall not be rented for the regular recurring religious services of any particular group or organization.~~
- ~~7. The authority and jurisdiction for administration and enforcement of this policy is vested in each Chancellor.~~

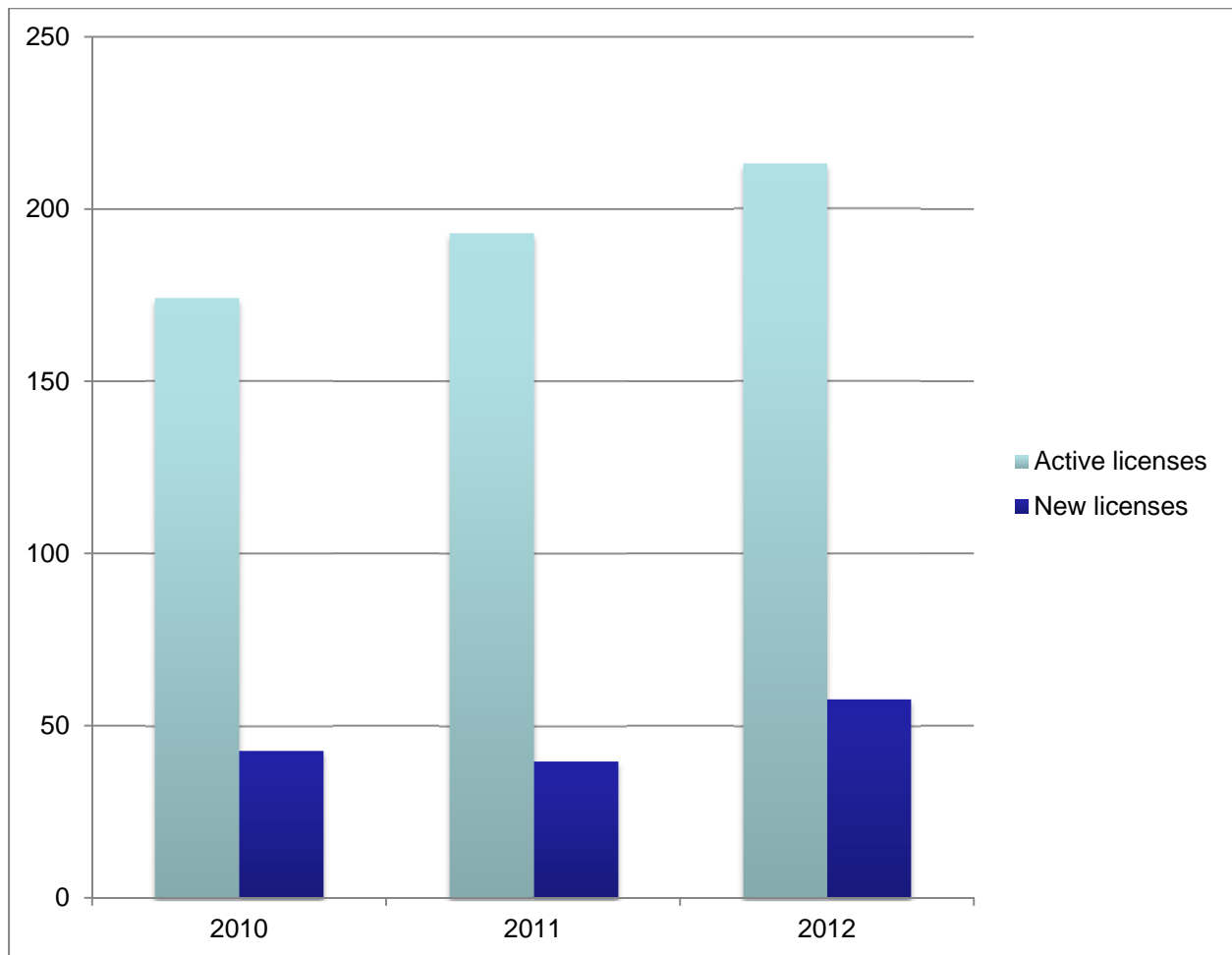

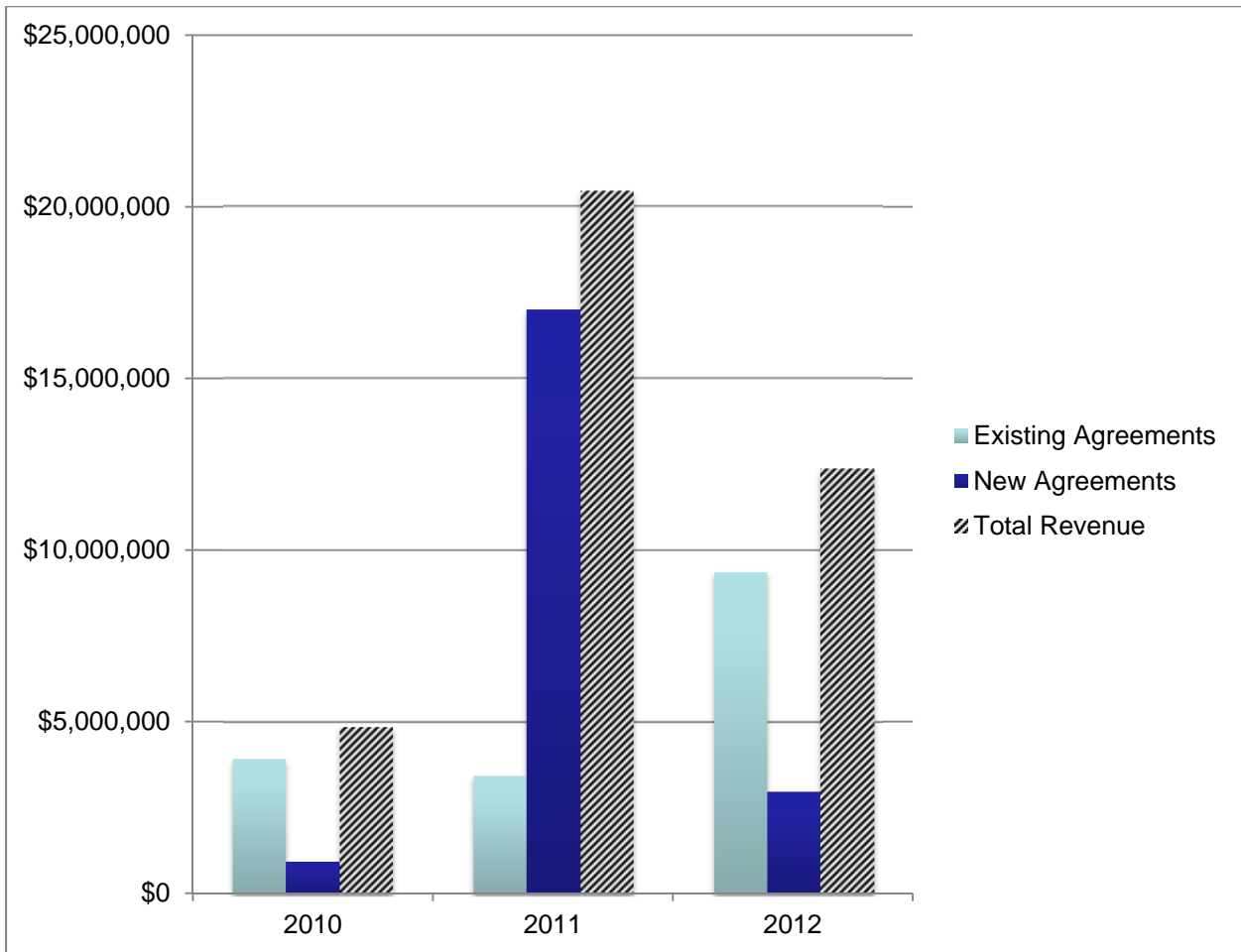

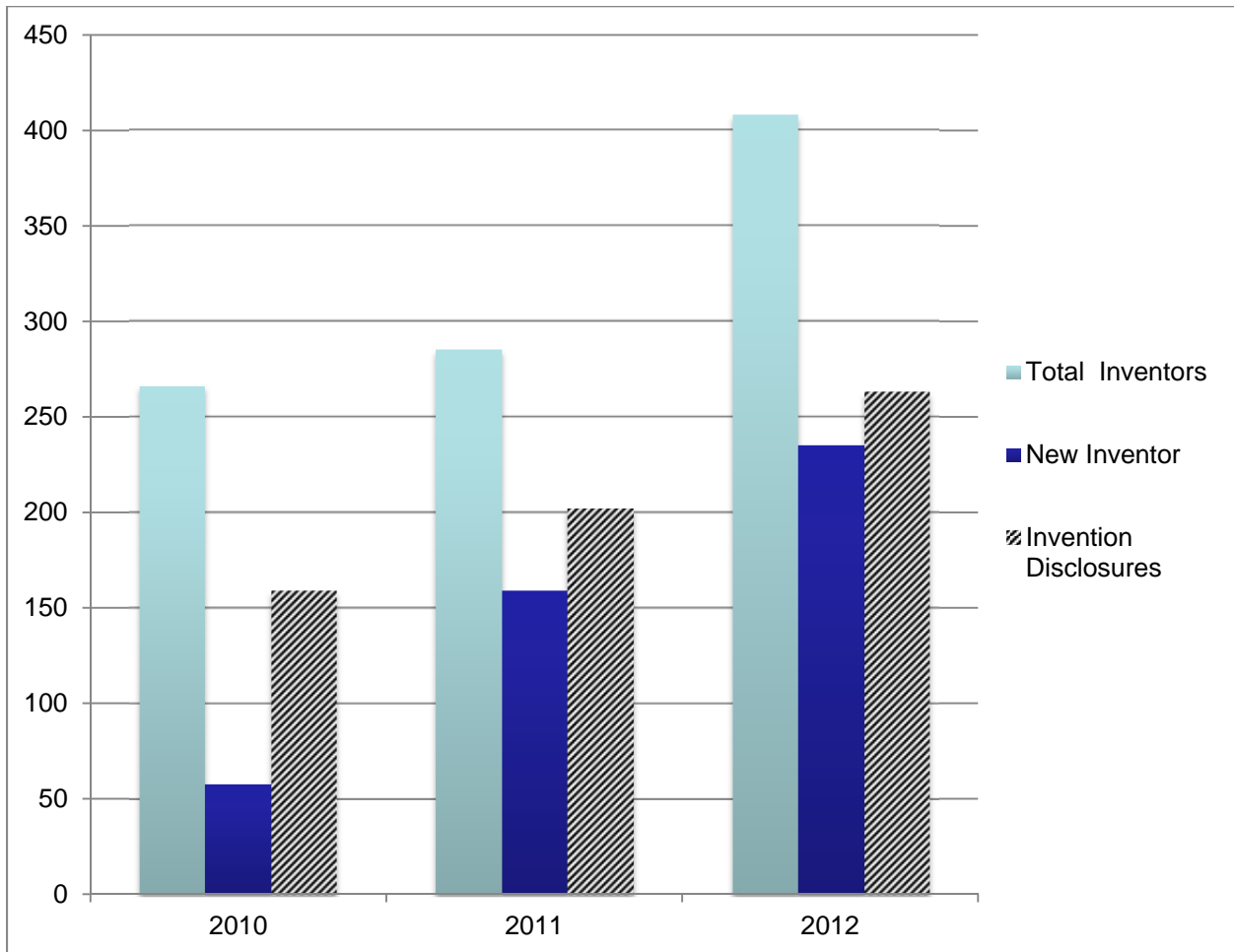

(with comparative data for 2010 and 2011)



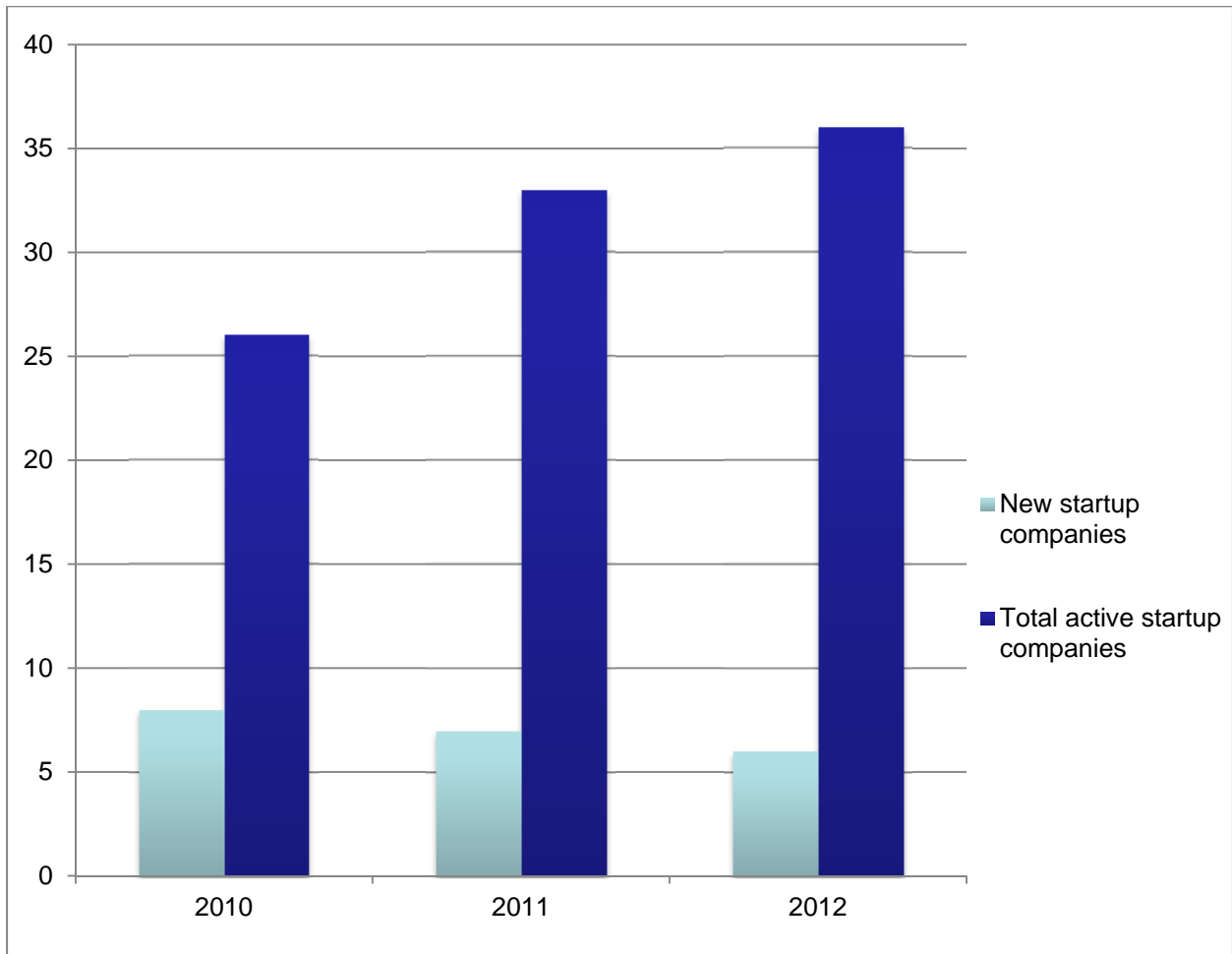

PREVIOUS ACTION: None

EXPLANATION: For over fifteen years, Nebraska Educational Telecommunications (NET) has held a ground lease with the Airport Authority of the City of Lincoln for a tract of land situated in the Southwest Quarter of Section Thirty-Six (36), Township Eleven (11) North, Range Five (5) East, Lancaster County, Nebraska. The site being 180 feet on the North-South dimension and 133.33 feet on the East-West dimension creates an area containing 23,999 square feet or 0.55 acres.

Within the leased area at LAA, NET installed and owned an antenna tower (approximately 75 feet), two (2) equipment buildings, one (1) backup generator, one (1) backup UPS, one (1) primary air conditioner and one (1) backup air conditioner. For approximately five (5) years NET has allowed UNL to use the antenna tower as a backup 2-way radio system should the antennas on Oldfather Hall (UNL City Campus) sustain damage due to a storm. Recently NET decided to not renew the antenna tower site lease with LAA.

Therefore, to ensure UNL continues to have backup communication capabilities for City Campus, NET and UNL negotiated a transfer of ownership of the personal property (antenna tower, buildings, backup generator, backup UPS and air conditioners) at no cost to UNL by way of a Bill of Sale. LAA agreed to enter into a ground lease with UNL that will continue to be occupied by the personal property now owned by UNL commencing August 1, 2012 and ending July 31, 2017. The lease rate is \$240/month or \$2,880/year.

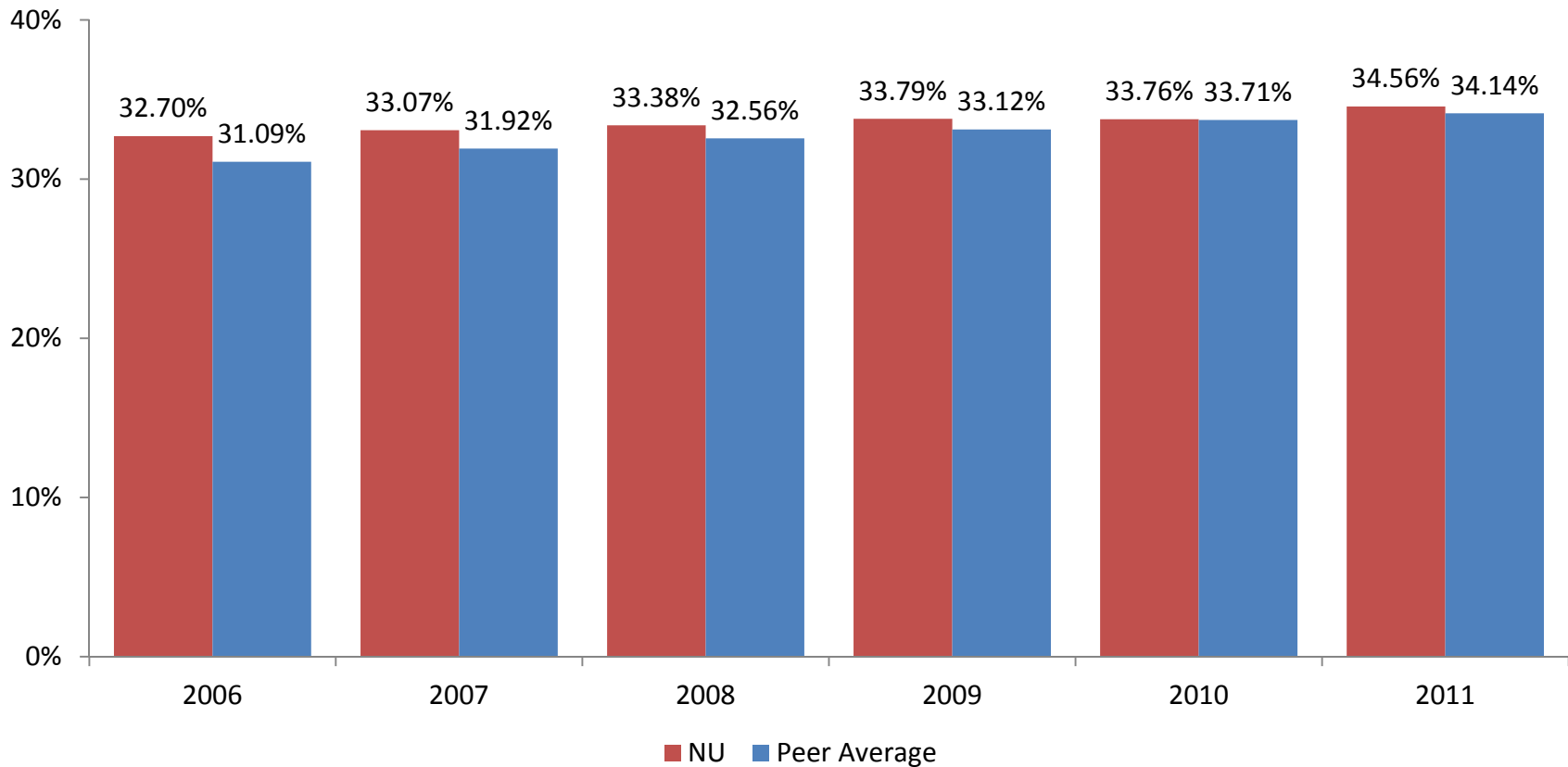

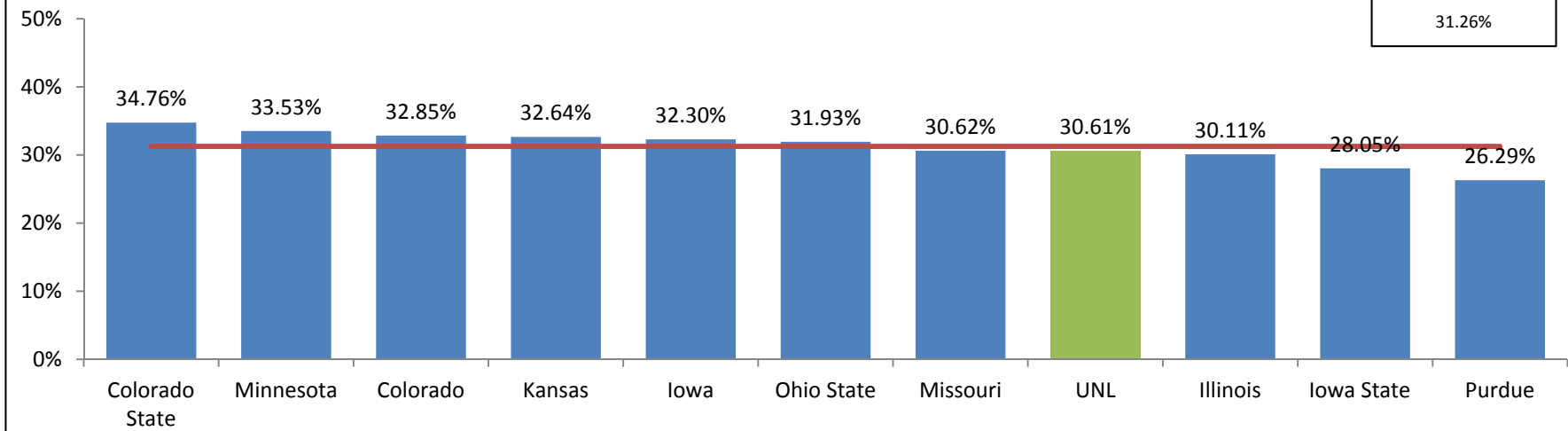
NU-Wide Percentage of Minority Faculty (2011)



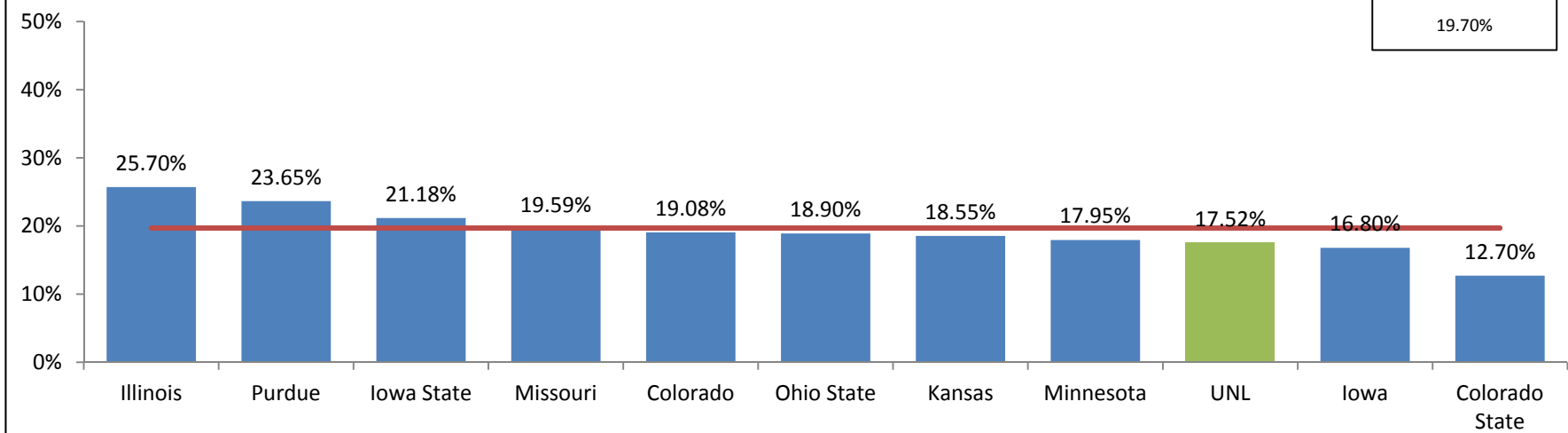

UNL and Peer Percent Women Faculty (2011)

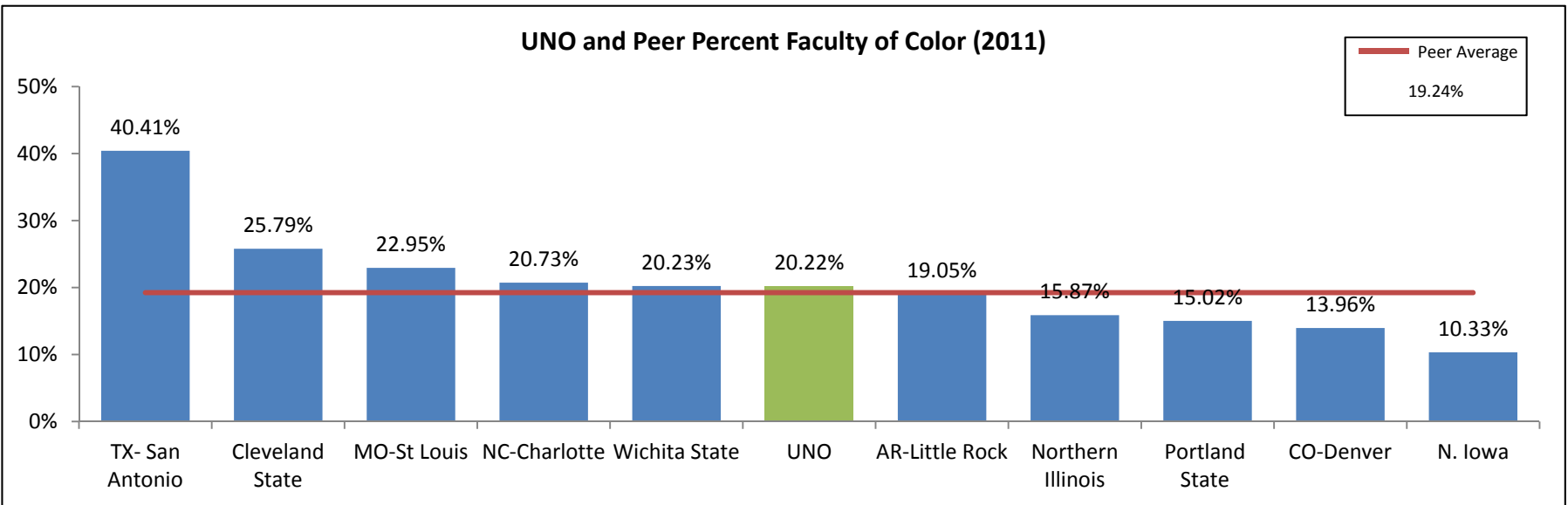
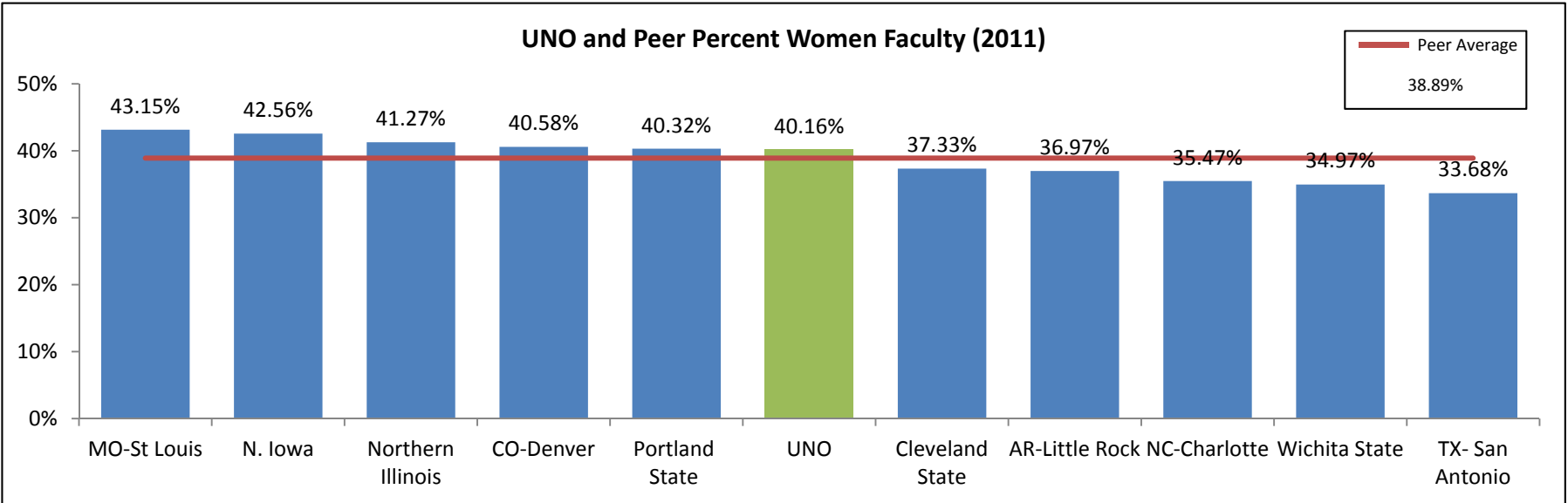


UNL and Peer Percent Faculty of Color (2011)



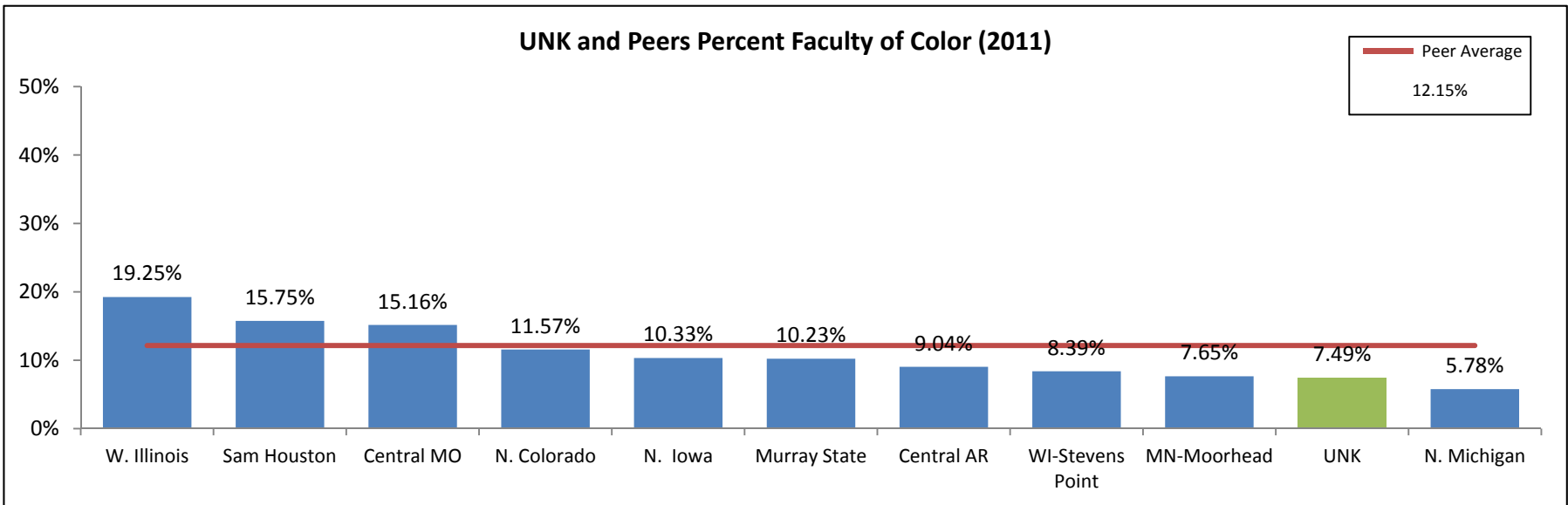
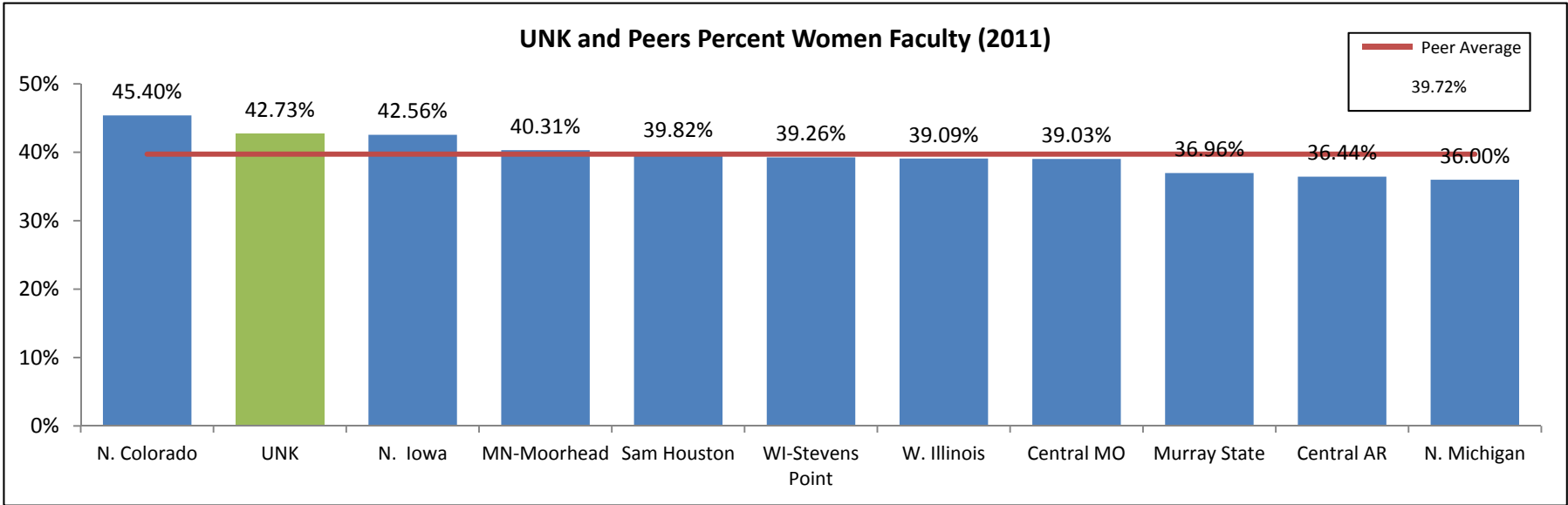

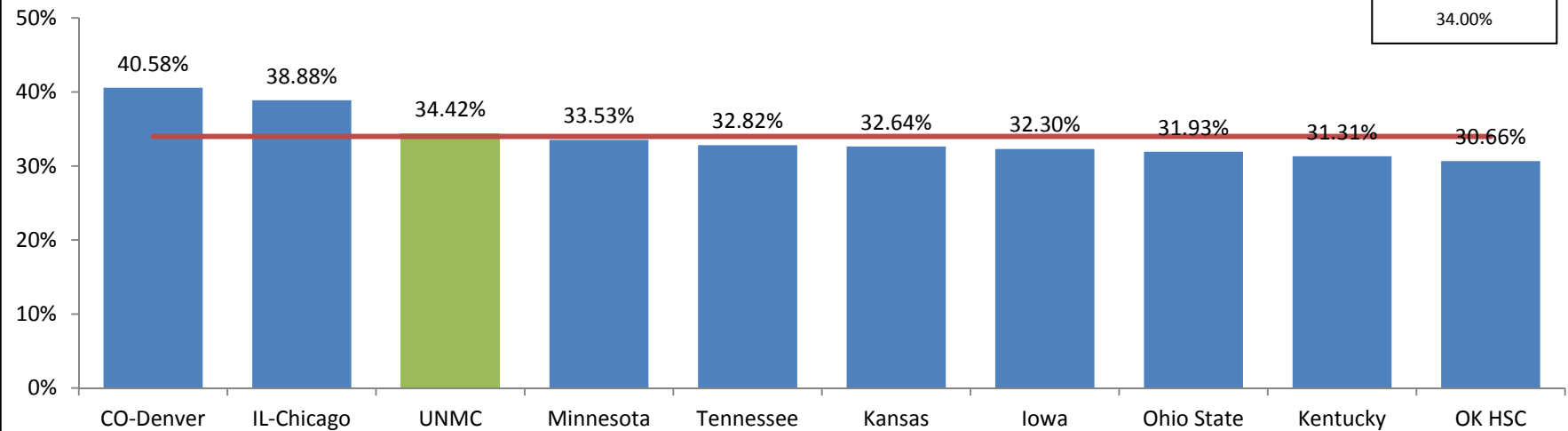
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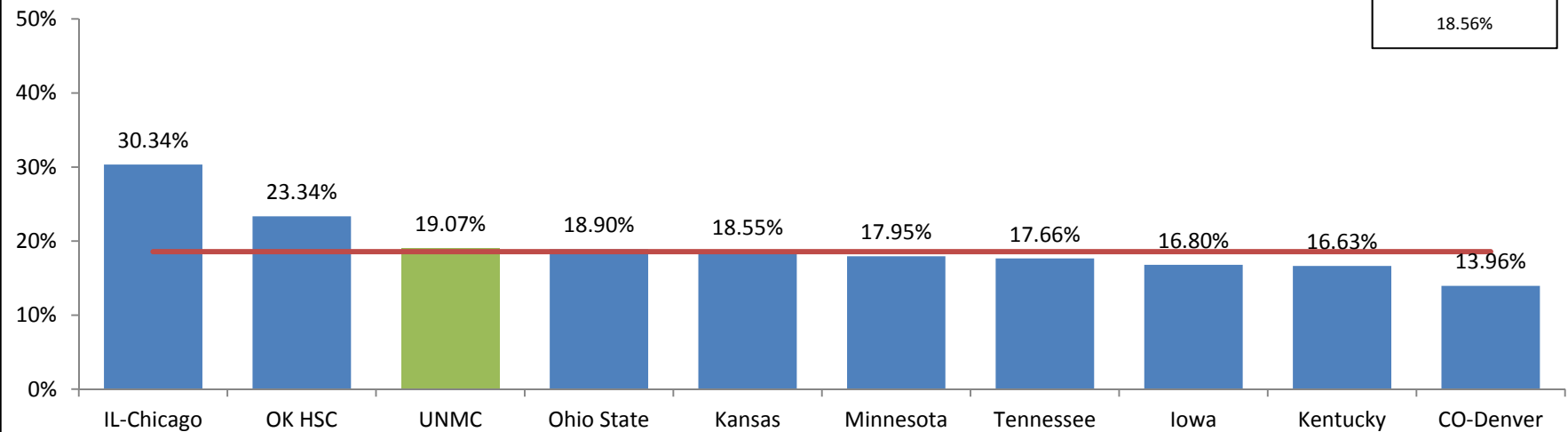
